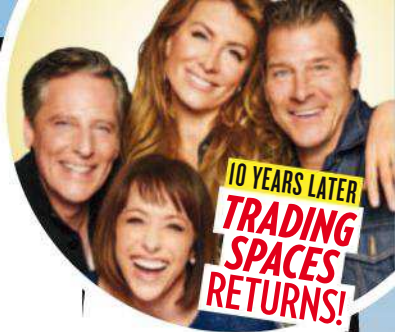

Michael Imperioli

The *Sopranos* alum, 51, stars in the new ABC comedy *Alex, Inc.*

Why did you want to do this series?

I liked the idea of doing a comedy. And a steady job is a really good thing when you're raising kids and sending them to college.

How was the production?

We shot in L.A. at Sony, which is the old MGM, where they shot *The Wizard of Oz*. It was cool being on a real Hollywood lot.

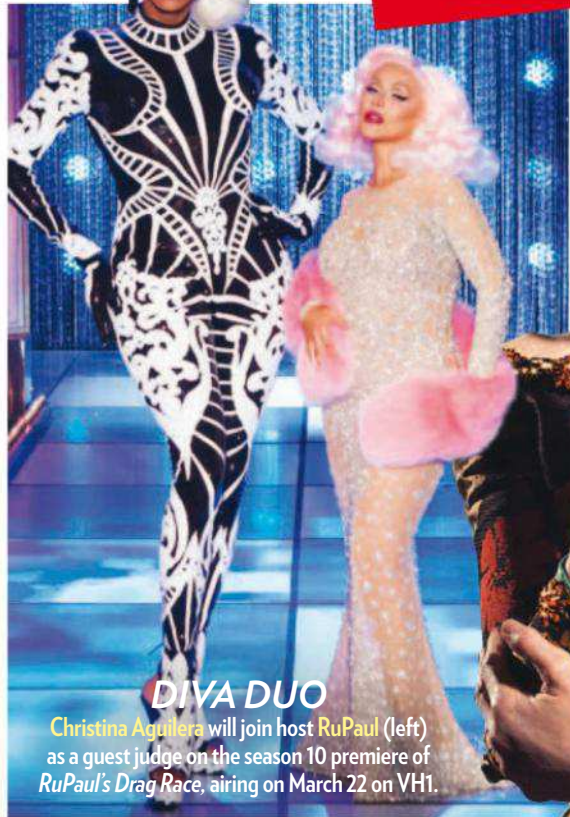

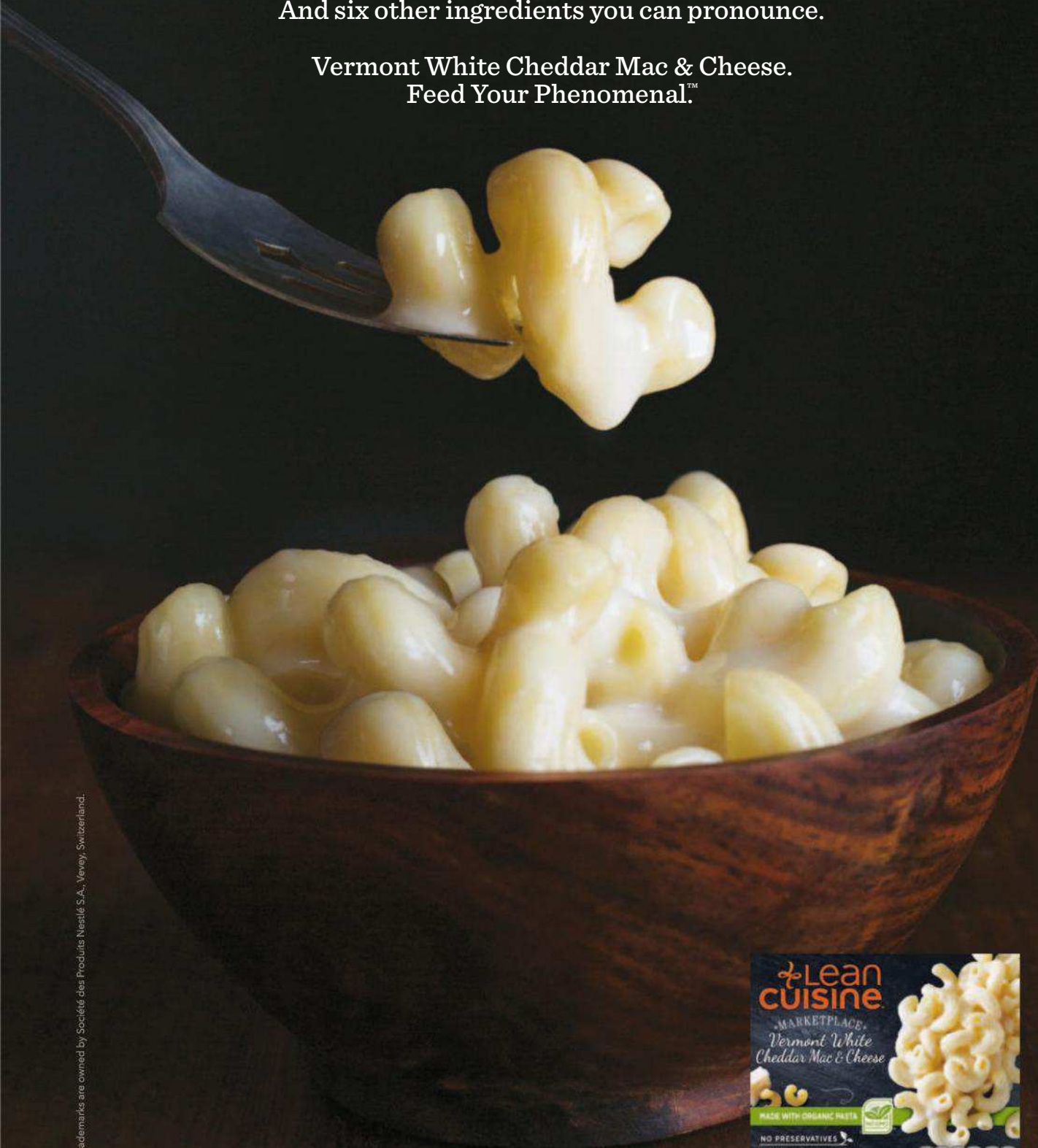

HER LIFE OUT OF THE SPOTLIGHT

LET'S GET ONE THING straight—Cameron Diaz is not retired. Fans freaked out after *Metro News U.K.* published an interview with Diaz's *The Sweetest Thing* costar Selma Blair in which Blair said that Diaz—who hasn't appeared in a movie since 2014's *Annie* remake—was done with acting. The next day Blair, 45, backtracked, tweeting, "Guys please, I was making a joke in an interview. CAMERON DIAZ is NOT retiring from ANYTHING."

While Diaz, 45, may not be done with Hollywood for good, she has stepped back from the spotlight significantly since marrying Good Charlotte rocker Benji Madden, 39, three years ago.



"I've never had anyone who supported me so much," Diaz (with Madden in L.A. in 2015) said of her husband during the Goop summit last June.

“Cameron and Benji are great,” says a source close to Madden. “They are very happy living a quiet life. She wanted this life for a long time.”

Once among the highest-paid actresses in Hollywood, the star of *There’s Something About Mary*, *Charlie’s Angels* and *Bad Teacher* wed Madden after high-profile romances with the likes of Justin Timberlake, Jared Leto and Alex Rodriguez. “Cameron needed something different in her life, more substance and a relationship where she felt loved,” a Diaz source says. “Her years with Benji have been

enlightening for her, very positive. She has become a new person with more self-confidence.” Says another movie-world source: “I can’t say whether or not she will go back to being a full-time actress, but for now she has other interests, causes she believes in and time to pursue them. And Cameron would love to have a family.”

She has dipped a toe into the lifestyle-guru world, coauthoring *The Body Book* and *The Longevity Book* and speaking at Gwyneth Paltrow’s Goop health summit in L.A. last June. She talked about how transcendental meditation “changed my life”—and gave Madden plenty of credit for her

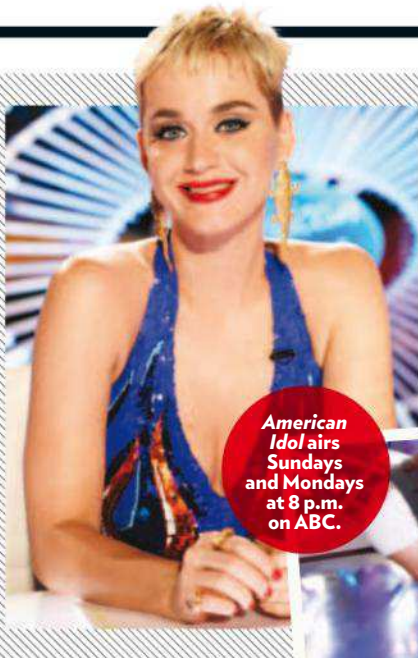

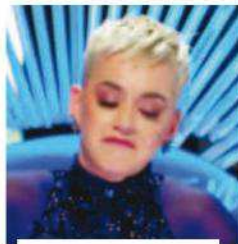

TALE OF THE TAT

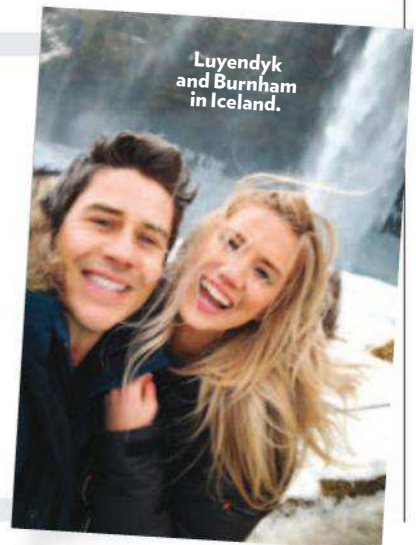

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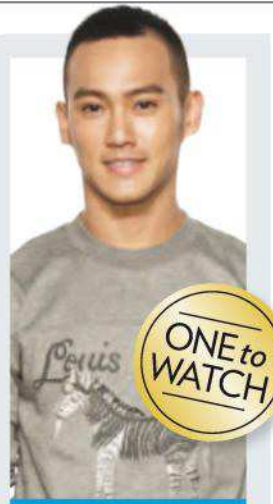

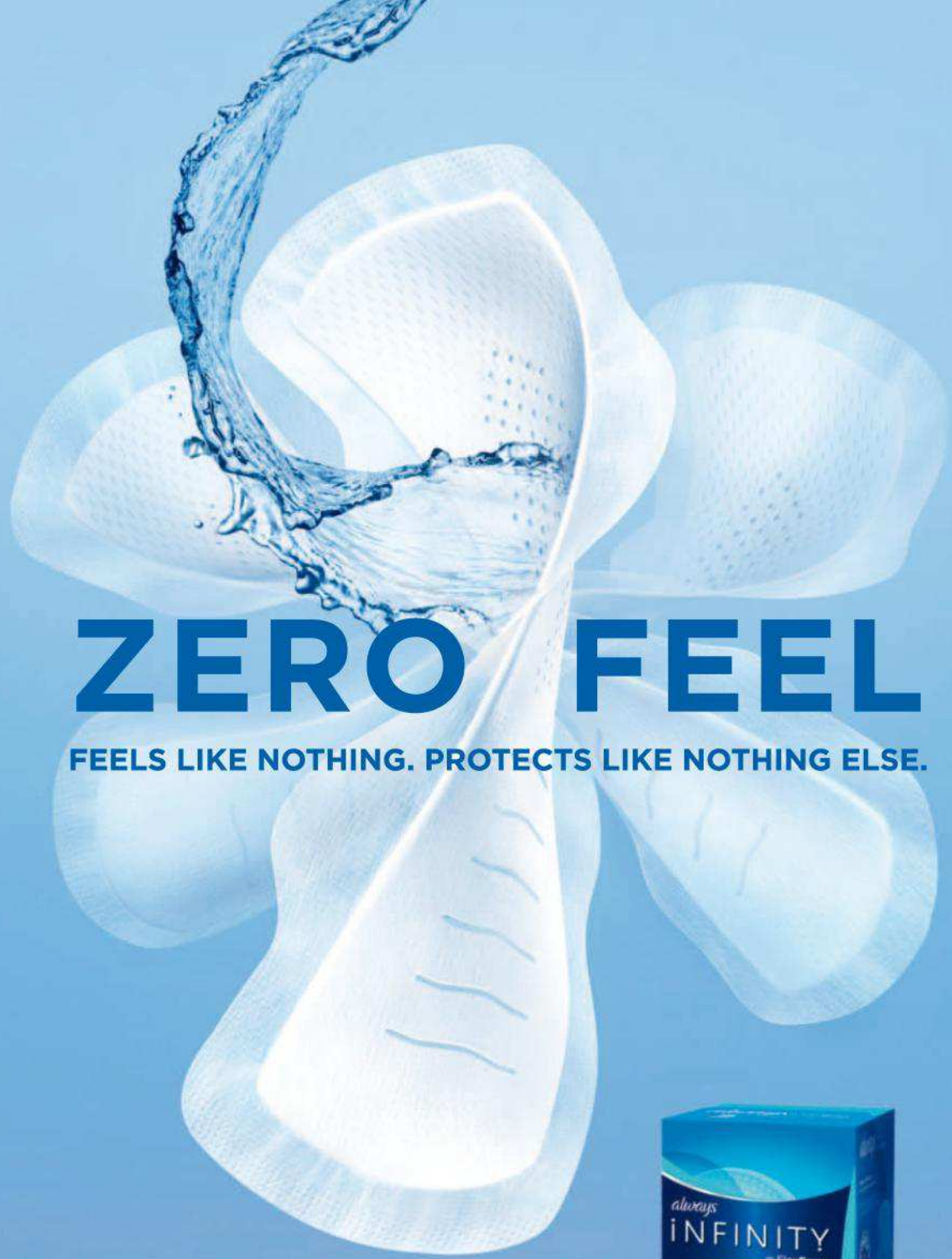

SPEAKING OUT FOR LEGAL POT

When Ricki Lake premiered her new documentary *Weed the People*, at the SXSW festival in Austin on March 11, she was overcome by emotion. The film was coproduced by her ex-husband Christian Evans before he killed himself in 2017 after a long battle with bipolar disorder. “The response has been amazing,” she tells *People*. “It’s a film that means so much to me.”

Lake, who won acclaim for *The Business of Being Born*, her documentary on childbirth and midwifery, has turned her camera on the issue of marijuana legalization, following several families as they try to obtain

cannabis oil from underground sources to treat children suffering from pediatric cancer.

“There’s a stigma to medical marijuana,” says Lake, 49. “There really shouldn’t be. [Christian] was searching for medication to help him with his issues.” Lake’s collaborator, director Abby Epstein, sees marijuana legalization as “a human rights issue. This is a moral issue.”

For Lake the movie’s warm reception has helped validate Evans’s work.

“This is the best legacy he could leave,” she says. “I’ll miss him every day for the rest of my life, but I’m so proud he left this film behind.”

The actress, 38, is on a mission to end child abuse in the U.S.

Eight years ago I was reading an article about a 6-year-old boy who was beaten to death by his parents. I was so affected by it that I was shaking. And last year I was in the car listening to a news feed on NPR about an 8-year-old boy whose mother and her boyfriend were charged with torturing and killing him. I was upset and knew I didn’t want to have that feeling again and do nothing about it. I had also received an e-mail from A Human Project, an organization whose mission is to end child abuse, and after meeting the founders, Wesley Chapman and Jodie Jensen, I became an ambassador. They created a program that goes into schools to counsel youth who are self-harming to cope with issues of abuse. I’m helping to plan a three-day fund-raising event in April, where speakers and activities will educate people on how to help kids in this situation. Our goal is to raise around \$400,000 and get into 5,000 schools. If we are not spotlighting the abuse, we’re never going to eradicate it. —REPORTED BY NICOLE SANDS

No. **TV COMEDY** When *Roseanne* started its run on ABC in 1988, it stood out as that rare thing: a realistic sitcom about a working-class American family. Now its star, Roseanne Barr, has revived the show—and once again it's that rare thing: a realistic sitcom about a working-class American family. Barr has shrewdly recognized the political moment—her character, Roseanne Conner, is a Trump voter—but this new *Roseanne* is not an easy, cynical attempt to milk the original. Much of the old, rock-solid cast is back, including Laurie Metcalf, Sara Gilbert and John Goodman (his character, husband Dan, was dead by the end of the first *Roseanne*, but it's hard to think of an actor more worthy of the Lazarus treatment). The show has been given a minimal, plausible update, not so much a reboot as a dusting-off. But nothing will ever change Barr's sharp, flat delivery. She sees through dialogue as if it were plywood. 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No. **2** **March of the Penguins 2: The Next Step**

Bringing up baby in the Antarctic

HULU NATURE A sequel to the popular 2005 documentary, *Step* fills you with wonder:

If penguins can be photographed with such intimacy in the Antarctic, surely we can find the right camera to spy on our neighbors 24/7. *Step* focuses on the upbringing of a baby emperor penguin while providing many valuable facts. (A penguin's coloring provides camouflage in the water: The dark back fools predators from above; the white stomach fools predators from below.) Morgan Freeman's narration can be a bit much—when the young penguin molts, it probably doesn't occur to him that “every bit of his gray down that floats away in the wind is a piece of his childhood gone forever”—but this is a fine film. (*Launches March 23*)

No. **3** **Unsane**

MOVIE

DRAMA Claire Foy, at the

moment best known as a brilliant actress paid less than her male costar on *The Crown*, gets locked away in a mental ward even though she's perfectly sane. Isn't she? Director Steven Soderbergh, who shot this on an iPhone, is mostly just amusing himself here—there's a twist that could be called certifiable—but Foy has an outburst of such volcanic hatred that you realize this woman, whatever her true diagnosis, is definitely not nice. No. **4** **The Americans**

TV

DRAMA This is the final season of FX's great series about Cold War espionage

in the days before the USSR's dissolution. Married spies Philip and Elizabeth (Matthew Rhys and Keri Russell), no longer of one heart in the cause of Mother Russia, are further at odds as Reagan and Gorbachev meet in 1987. She's determined to keep those Soviet missiles pointy and deadly. Disillusioned, he just wants to work at their travel agency. A husband and wife are supposed to be equals, but, as we know, some are more equal than others: Philip and Elizabeth can't both prevail. (*FX, March 28, 10 p.m.*)

No. **5** **Jack White, Boarding House Reach**

MUSIC

ROCK After taking a rootsy

turn on 2014's *Lazaretto*, the garage-rock kingpin has exploded his sound yet again on *Boarding House Reach*, the weirdest and wildest release of his two decades in music: The old-timey closer “Humoresque” derives from a musical manuscript gangster Al Capone penned while in Alcatraz. Donald Sutherland has the plum role of the boy's miserly grandpop J. Paul Getty and doesn't waste the opportunity: He's witheringly cruel and arrogant, treating everyone (including his mistresses) with disdain. The first episodes are stylishly nasty, like *Dirty Sexy Money* on a blowout budget. But the kidnapping saga has barely gotten started. (FX, March 25, 10 p.m.)

No. **7** **Isle of Dogs**
MOVIE **ANIMATED** Director Wes Anderson's wonderful new film is as great an exercise in stop-action animation as his *Fantastic Mr. Fox* (2009). But your child (and you) will really need to concentrate: Like Anderson's live-action masterpiece *Grand Budapest Hotel*, *Isle* is eccentrically inventive in narrative, whimsy and design. The story is about a Japanese boy, Atari, who steals a plane and flies to an island populated by dogs: They're quarantined because of a strain of dog flu, plus something called snout fever. In search of his own beloved Spots, Atari befriends dogs voiced by Bill Murray, Bryan Cranston and Jeff Goldblum. He also has to overcome an evil guardian, kidney trouble and poisoned wasabi. It would take six dog years to explain it all. (In limited release March 23, PG-13)

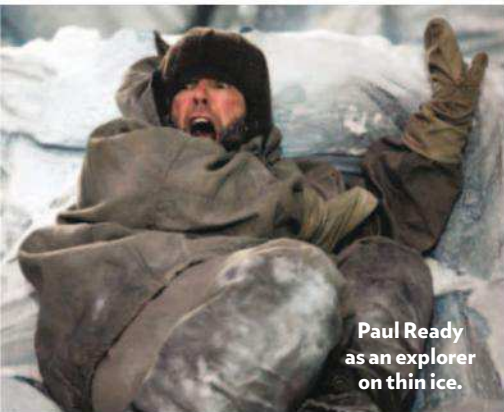

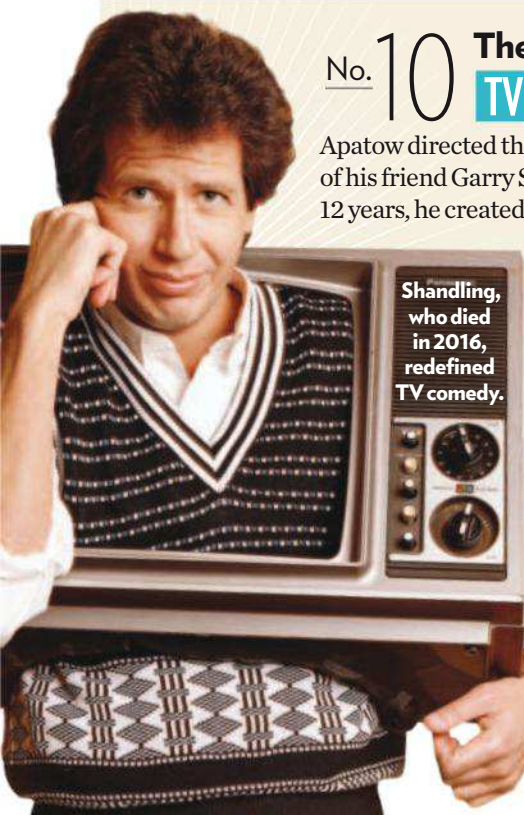

No. 9 **Pacific Rim Uprising**
Warrior robots to the rescue (again!)
MOVIE FANTASY The first *Pacific Rim*, directed by Guillermo del Toro, was a curious misfire, but it conveyed the towering scale of giant robots and monsters at battle. You felt like a pigeon looking up at the balloons in the Macy's Thanksgiving parade. *Uprising*, directed by Steven S. DeKnight, isn't ambitious enough to be a misfire, but it has plenty of mechanical-metallic thuds, screeches, clanks and crunches: It thunders along entertainingly. This time the robot army (like many military forces in peace time) has gotten a bit rusty. Then a rogue robot turns up, rudely swinging its fists, followed soon after by roaring monsters. It's *Wedding Crashers* of the apocalypse. John Boyega (*Star Wars: The Last Jedi*) is the hero this time, and he's excellent—no-nonsense and commanding. (*In theaters March 23, PG-13*)

No. 10 **The Zen Diaries of Garry Shandling**
TV DOCUMENTARY Judd Apatow directed this funny, sensitive appreciation of his friend Garry Shandling. In the course of 12 years, he created two classic series—*It's Garry Shandling's Show* and *The Larry Sanders Show*—before coming to a creative and emotional standstill. A student of Eastern religious philosophy, he may have found peace by the end.

But it's hard to forget his sad wince when he says: "I can be funny at the drop of a hat. Except sometimes you can't find a hat." (*HBO, March 26, 8 p.m.*)

She's a star on TV's hottest show, but Chrissy Metz has never been one to take herself too seriously. Posing for a People photo shoot on March 15, she mugs for the camera, acting as if she's being swept away by a fan's breeze while declaring, with a flip of her hair, "I'm not a model—I'm just a girl who pretends to be an actress."

It's that humility, authenticity and humor that have endeared her to fans since *This Is Us* hit the air in 2016. But "pretends" is more than a joke: It hints at the surprise she still sometimes feels about her success. Growing up in Gainesville, Fla., Metz, now 37, always felt she was "too much of this and not enough of that," as she puts it—an overweight, insecure girl who loved singing and making her family laugh but suffered abuse at the hands of her stepfather and never dreamed she'd find her way to fame. As an aspiring actor, she often felt dismissed because of her size; as a star, she still faces fat-shaming and is asked too often for her liking if she's planning to have weight-loss surgery. (For the record: She's content in her skin and says "I don't focus on numbers—it's all about how I feel.")

Her new memoir *This Is Me* traces her incredible journey from poverty to stardom and from self-doubt to finally "embracing the idea that people could be inspired by me." Despite her life's hardships, Metz says, "I've always had this happiness inside. I truly believe that everything that happened to me happened for me."

In an excerpt from the memoir she opens up about what did happen, beginning with the year her father, a former Navy officer, left her mother to raise Chrissy, 8, her sister Monica, 15, and brother Philip, 13, on her own.

After my parents divorced we moved into an apartment in what others told you, if you gave them your address, was "the ghetto." My mom worked as a checkout girl at the Food 4 Less. I was a latchkey kid in second grade.

I didn't want to be alone, so every day I would go to the grocery store and just walk around. This one was a bit fancier than Food 4 Less. I loved the brightness of the place, and the feeling of being safe. I looked at all the food my family could never afford.

Her mother, Denise, had a baby, Morgana, with a boyfriend, who skipped town. With money tighter than ever, the family moved to a trailer park. After Denise met Trigger, who had a good job at Coca-

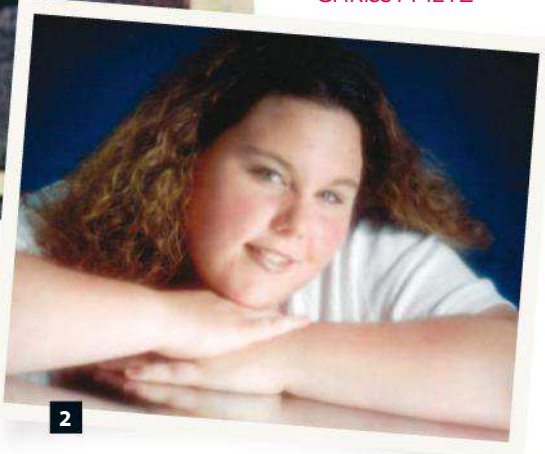

Cola, the family moved in with him and his daughter.

My mom married Trigger at the courthouse. Soon she was pregnant again, with another girl, Abigail. Trigger loved his two biological children, and was even welcoming to Morgana. Me, not so much. My mother was always at work, so she didn't see how he treated me.

My body seemed to offend him, but he couldn't help but stare, especially when I was eating. He joked about putting a lock on the refrigerator. We had lived with a lack of food for so long that when it was there, I felt like I had to eat it before it disappeared. Food was my only happiness.

And so, I began to hide my eating. I'd get up in the middle of the night and eat. I'd sneak food to eat in the bathroom. Cookies, chips. Things I could eat as fast as possible to avoid detection. Things that would give me the brief bliss of numbness.

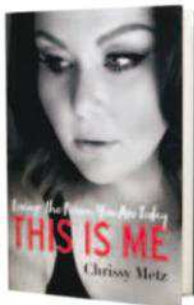


My other joy was entertaining my sisters. I had a boom box, and would record interviews with them. We would fall on the floor laughing. I loved entertaining, and the feeling I had when I could make them happy. I think I was trying to figure out what joy was.

I don't remember why Trigger hit me the first time. He never punched my face. Just my body, the thing that offended him so much. He shoved me, slapped me, punched my arm. He would hit me if he thought I looked at him wrong. I remember being on the kitchen floor after he knocked me over, and I was begging to know what I did. He just shoved me hard with his foot.

She found escape at friends' houses and at school, where she joined choir and band. And then came puberty.

I remember looking at my friends' bodies thinking, How? They were developing curves, and I felt that wasn't gonna happen for me. I was just round. I never wanted to draw attention to my body and

always wore oversized clothing. A lot of collared fake Izod shirts.

I had a different crush every hour. I was definitely the girl who was friends with all the guys. I always heard "You're so cool," but of course, no boys would want to date me because of how I looked.

Before long, boys began making their interest in her clear, but it only went so far. Her first love, Derek, the brother of her friend Mya, refused to acknowledge her in public.

Let me tell you, my first kiss with Derek was—to this day!—one of the most amazing kisses, if not the best of my life. The next time we were all at Mya's, I waited for him to acknowledge me in a real way, not just through his secret signals. When he didn't, I decided this was what I needed to settle for—a wink here and there. He couldn't let anyone know he liked the fat girl. Got it.

If I got too comfortable around him in front of our friends—meaning I said, "Hi, Derek"—he curled that perfect upper lip and looked away, exhaling in disbelief and disgust. The night before, he'd kissed me and told me I was beautiful.

By then I had started my pattern of acting like things simply weren't happening. I stuffed my feelings with food. I grew to a size 12, the heaviest girl in my grade. And I became one angsty teenager.

When I was fourteen, Trigger began weighing me. He'd get the scale from the bathroom and clang it hard on the kitchen floor. "Well, get on the damn thing!" Trigger would yell. "This is what you need to know."

He sat in a chair next to the scale as I got on. "Good God almighty!" he yelled every single time.

The number then was about 140 or 130. Most of my friends weighed about ninety pounds.

"Why are you getting fatter?" he demanded.

I look at pictures of me from that time, and I would be so fine with being that size now. But I thought I was gigantic. By then the beating had escalated. One time he hit me, and I looked right in his face. If I had a gun, I thought, I would shoot you.

Afterward, I was so upset with myself. How could I think that about this person I loved so much? Because I really did love him. This man did more for me than my father ever did. He was smart, and I was allowed to quietly join him in watching the Ken Burns Civil War documentaries on television. I clung to [these points of connection] because I needed to figure out why this person could do right by me as a provider, but be unable to love me.

She got out as soon as she could, moving to L.A. to pursue her dream of becoming an actress in 2003. At the recommendation of her then manager, she lost 50 lbs. But auditions were hard to come by.

can Horror Story. *And then the big break: the role of Kate on This Is Us.*

[Show creator] Dan Fogelman is solely responsible for changing my life. He wrote a role for someone we’d never seen before.

“It’s always going to be about the weight for me,” Kate says in the second episode. “That’s been my story ever since I was a little girl. And every moment that I’m not thinking about it, I’m thinking about it. Like, will this chair hold me? Will this dress fit me? And if I ever get pregnant, will anyone ever notice? It’s just at the core of who I am...”

I remember reading those lines and running to Dan, saying, “These are my fears.” And I love that now, Kate is evolving to a place where that is not her only storyline.

Metz has learned to live with the more painful parts of her own storyline and is seeing her life with clearer eyes.

What I have learned is that hurt people hurt people. I have come to terms with my feelings about Trigger. He wrote me a letter when I first moved to LA that I have kept with me. “I just want you to know,” he wrote, “that you do things I never thought I would see you do. You are so much more courageous than I’ve been in my whole life.” He talked about being hard on me, and he said he was sorry. And he said he loved me.

That’s all I have ever wanted him to say.

About five years ago, I went home to Gainesville for Christmas. I was at the mall when I saw a man with four kids. He was covered with tattoos on his arms and neck. He looked familiar.

“Sup,” Derek said.

I had frozen Derek in that summer. Now he had gold teeth and overplucked eyebrows, and he looked worn out.

“How are you?” he asked.

“Good,” I said. “You?”

“Good.”

And we kept walking. I turned around to take one last look. I wanted to ask if he was ever in love with me way back then. I wanted to ask what happened to him. Was he happy now?

I thought how much I had loved this man-boy. How I had pinned all of my dreams on him. Maybe he’s not the one that got away, I thought.

Maybe I am. ●

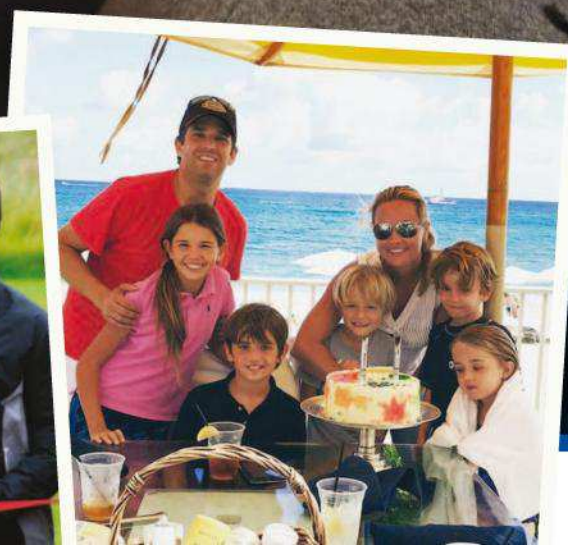

At his father's Mar-a-Lago resort on March 18, Donald Trump Jr. and his five children were a party of seven, as usual. But instead of the children's mother, Vanessa, it was a nanny rounding out the group for supper in the dining room where President Trump presides when he is in Palm Beach. Vanessa, 40, had filed for divorce on March 15—surprising even members used to seeing Don Jr., 40, at the private club without his wife. (He was solo on New Year's Eve and last fall was "riding his bike alone, hanging out alone," says one club source who knows the family well.) "They have so much money, it would be easy to live separate lives until the children are older and not go through this public embarrassment," the source says.

But for a homebody and hands-on mom like Vanessa, her father-in-law's Presidency and all the security, scrutiny and online trolls were a lot. "She told me on her wedding night that she hoped to have five children," says Christine Schott, Vanessa's former agent at Elite Model Management. "She wanted to make it work. But it can't be easy being a member of that family."

Months ago Vanessa confided to a Palm Beach friend that security fears "were stifling": Her kids, ranging in age from 10 to 3, needed armed Secret Service escorts even in the elevator of their New York City apartment building, she complained. Frustration turned to terror in February when she opened a

letter addressed to her husband that contained a white powder later identified as cornstarch. Meanwhile, Don Jr. was running the embattled Trump Organization with his brother Eric, battling on Twitter with their dad's detractors and facing uncertain legal jeopardy in Robert Mueller's investigation. "Don Jr.'s become isolated, distant and just plain angry," says the Mar-a-Lago source. "He has not been easy to be around." He also may have been looking elsewhere for companionship—sending suggestive Twitter messages to former model Melissa

Stetten, for example. ("It was entertaining to see his failed attempts at hitting on me," Stetten tells *People*.)

As Mueller's probe heats up—Don Jr.'s 2016 meeting with Russian agents is under

scrutiny, and Trump Organization records have reportedly been subpoenaed—some experts wonder if the uncontested divorce and Vanessa's hiring of a criminal defense attorney are at least partly designed to preserve assets for her and the children. "We often see a cooperative divorce in anticipation of criminal charges being brought against one spouse," says prominent divorce attorney Randy Kessler. But the Mar-a-Lago source contends money is not the object: "Vanessa is not one who seeks all the lavish living. Her life is the children."

As a series of deadly bombs rock the Texas capital, authorities scramble to find a motive for the attacks—and stop the next blast

At first police thought they were dealing with a single, terrible tragedy: a package left on a front porch in a northeast Austin, Texas, neighborhood exploded on March 2, killing the home's resident. But in the weeks that followed, something more sinister emerged. After two more packages detonated at nearby homes on March 12—killing another person and injuring two—Austin police chief Brian Manley came forward to appeal to the bomber directly. "We want to understand what brought you to this point, and we want to listen to you," he said at a press conference on March 18. Hours later a fourth explosion injured two young men walking through a neighborhood in southwest Austin. "I'm in shock," says Eliza May, who lives a few houses away from the fourth blast. "It's a beautiful, sunny day, but there's no motion outside, everyone is inside. People are traumatized."

Authorities say evidence connects the bombings, even as they scramble to identify a motive and avert further attacks. More than 500 federal agents, including investigators from the FBI and

the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, are helping local and state agencies in the case. None of the packages were delivered by the postal service or commercial carriers. Police, who've asked a jittery public to report anything suspicious—boxes, bags, backpacks—say they've already answered more than 700 calls around Austin, which had swelled by more than 200,000 people during the annual South by Southwest music and film festival in mid-March.

Perplexed and desperate, authorities have offered a \$115,000 reward for leads. "Serial bombers are a special ilk of violent offender," says

James R. Fitzgerald, a retired FBI agent and criminal profiler who worked on the infamous Unabomber case of Ted Kaczynski, arrested in 1996 after killing three people and injuring 23 others with homemade bombs. "The question is, why are they choosing these targets and where will they choose to go next?"



So far the deadly bombings have claimed the lives of two Austin residents: Anthony House, a 39-year-old father, was killed in the March 2 attack; 17-year-old Draylen Mason, a rising young musician, died from injuries sustained in one of the March 12 explosions. (Mason's mother was also seriously injured in the blast.) Because both men were African-American—and the third bomb injured a 75-year-old Hispanic woman—authorities voiced suspicions that the attacks might be hate crimes. But the fourth bomb, which Chief Manley said was remotely detonated, possibly "by someone either handling, kicking or coming in contact with a trip wire," injured two white males, ages 22 and 23. "Is this terrorism? Is this hate-related?" asked Manley. "We just don't know."

Whatever the motive, Austin residents are rallying around one another in support—and in an effort to stop the next blast. "People may have seen this package on their neighbor's doorstep, but they might not have had a connection and didn't say anything" says Chas Moore of the Austin Justice Coalition. "Now more than ever we're going to ask people to make a genuine effort to get to know the people next door."

Graves' Disease Won't Stop Me

THE POPULAR GOSSIP TALK SHOW HOST OPENS UP ABOUT THE HEALTH SCARE THAT BROUGHT HER TO A LIFESAVING REALITY CHECK

"I wasn't watching the show while I was off," says Williams, who announced her first-ever hiatus on Feb. 22, before Jerry O'Connell filled in. "I felt like I was disappointing my fans."

Wendy Williams will tell you that she's been called everything in the book—except lazy. “In nine years of doing my show, I've never taken a sick day, whether I had an aching back, a headache or the flu,” the popular talk show host says proudly. “Even when I was on the radio, I can't say I was the best deejay, but I showed up. I would always stay a double shift. That worker quality in me has gotten me to where I am today, and unfortunately, it had me laid out!”

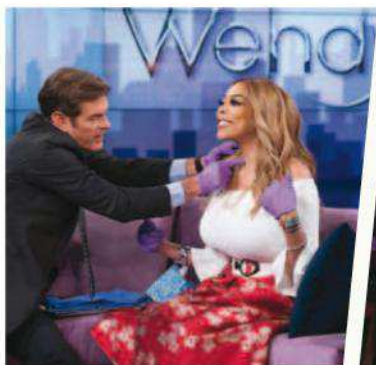
So it was, three weeks ago when the former radio shock jock and queen of daytime TV gossip announced an unexpected hiatus from her hit show. Following doctor's orders, she stepped away to address her Graves' disease—an autoimmune disorder that leads to overactivity of the thyroid (see sidebar)—which threw her usually healthy body into a tailspin. Speaking out for the first time since her departure, the star, 53, tells *People*, “I had a storm going in my body is the best way I can explain it.”

Known for jokingly asking her fans, “How you doin'?” Williams, it seems, had recently failed to ask herself that very question. Diagnosed with Graves' 19 years ago, she'd always been vigilant about taking her daily thyroid medication, but last year she fell behind on doctor's visits. “I noticed something toward the end of July,” she says, recalling when she first started feeling out of sorts. “But there were photoshoots and interviews and cities to go to, so I rescheduled appointment after appointment.” Then last Halloween, she collapsed on-set. “That day, when the EMTs got there, I had high blood pressure, which I never have,” she

says. “I can't believe I got up after the break and finished out the show.” When she finally saw her doctor in February, she says, “He looked at me and said, ‘Whoa, I can see it in your eyes. Your Graves' disease is way out of order.’” Menopause was another reason she didn't take her symptoms, including mood swings, more seriously. “With the menopause,” she says, “I wasn't pointing a finger at any particular thing. I just felt like, ‘Well, I'm 53, this is, I guess, how it's supposed to be.’”

Instructed to take time off, Williams spent the break avoiding phone calls (“I didn't want anyone going back to their all-girl crew to gossip about what's going on with Wendy”) and relaxing at the New Jersey home she shares with Kevin Hunter, her husband of 20 years, and son Kevin Jr., 17. “My husband was extremely concerned,” she says of Hunter, who's her manager and an executive producer on her show. “He's been there every step of the way. We're glued at the hip, and it's really been trying on him. I'm like, ‘Don't worry about me!’”

Instead, Williams plans to worry a lot more about herself—and a lot less about everybody else. “Women tend to put everything first before ourselves,” says Williams, who returned to TV on March 19 with a clean bill of health. “That's not happening anymore with me. I'm young in spirit, heart, movement and attitude. And I've got plenty of fun to spread to the world.” ●

disorder, Graves' ultimately disrupts the thyroid gland, which produces key hormones the body needs to function. “It's basically your body's thermostat,” says Williams. “If your thyroid is off, you're off.” Symptoms include weight loss, fatigue and bulging eyes. If untreated, Graves', which affects roughly 1 in 200 people, can be fatal. But it's often managed through surgery and hormone and iodine treatments.

The original cast of the original design hit open up about their lives now—and bringing the beloved show back to television

Before Chip and Joanna Gaines uncovered their first swath of shiplap, before the Property Brothers ever uttered the words “open concept” and back when house hunters got their kicks scanning the Sunday paper’s real estate section, there was *Trading Spaces*. Last March, Paige Davis, the host of TLC’s groundbreaking home-design show—in which two sets of neighbors, each paired with a designer, a carpenter and a \$1,000 budget, transform one room in the opposite couple’s home—was startled when her phone began to blow up with text messages and social media alerts. “I thought there was an emergency,” Davis recalls now. Instead it was the breaking news that *Trading Spaces* was returning to television after a 10-year hiatus. “Everybody was asking me if I knew. I said, ‘I’m hearing about it now, just like you!’” But Davis immediately sprang into action. “I called TLC and

said, ‘You know I want to host, right?’” she recalls. “I didn’t want anyone else to have my part!” Luckily Davis got her wish. She’s reprising her role in the much-anticipated reboot premiering April 7, along with eight members of the original cast and five new faces. When filming picked back up with the old crew, she says it was like the past decade never happened. “It felt like we had never left,” she says. “It just felt like home. I’m so excited; we all are.”

Of course much has changed since the show ended in 2008. As one of the first reality design shows ever, the surprising success of *Trading Spaces* paved the way for an entire new genre of television and created a booming home-renovation industry. “We were the first to actually put tools in homeowners’ hands and prove that people could do it themselves,” says carpenter Ty Pennington. “Good, bad or ugly, I think that idea

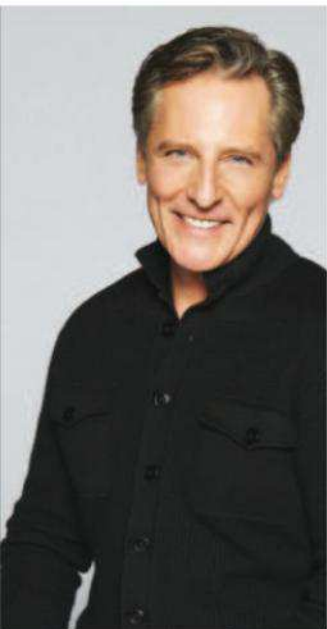

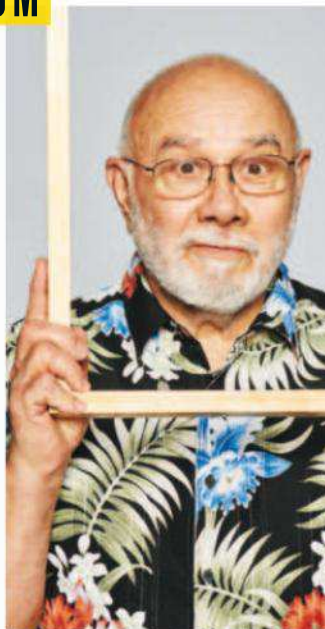

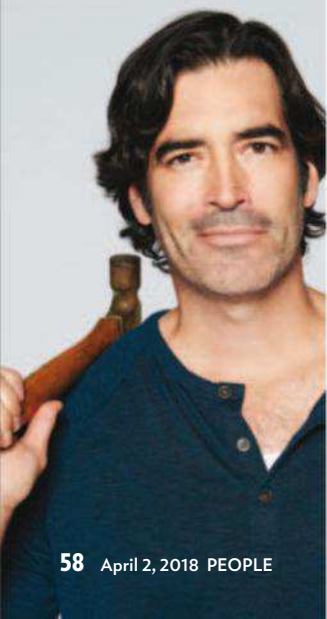

started a huge craze.” Still, no one could have predicted what a massive impact it would have on pop culture. “It was just this very zeitgeist-y moment,” says designer Vern Yip, who went on to success on HGTV after his *Trading Spaces* stint. “It’s incredible to see what’s happened since.”



Originally formatted after the British television series *Changing Rooms*, the *Trading Spaces* structure stayed identical throughout its run, with only a few slight tweaks. At the end of a two-day house swap, Davis would then reveal the couple’s makeover at the end of each episode. “So much of the time people loved it,” Davis says of the reveals. “But sometimes they hated it!” Those hated rooms often took on a life of their own, with a few legendary design fails (see sidebar) still living on in viewers’ memories. Davis adds there wasn’t much she could do when stuck revealing a fail. “You just talked them through it, listened to what they had to say, and then go, ‘Bye, Felicia.’” Yet the show wasn’t an instant hit. When it premiered on Sept. 29, 2000, it aired at 4 p.m. on Fridays and encored on Sundays at noon. It took three years and a new 8 p.m. time slot before it struck gold, eventually raking in more than 9 million viewers with a 100 Grand Special in 2003. “None of us were prepared for this to become what it did it,” says designer Genevieve Gorder of the show’s success and their overnight fame. “There was no one to guide us. Martha Stewart was doing something different; Bob Villa didn’t

do this. We were just kind of floating in the abyss, hoping we were all grounded enough to deal with it well. We all shockingly did.” The original cast says that going through the experience of being on a hit show together only brought them closer. “We really are all friends,” says designer Doug Wilson. “Yes, we fight and bicker sometimes, but it’s like one big dysfunctional family.” Viewers relished the creative and kooky ways designers took on each project. In a pre-smartphone world, finding furniture and decor was a constant challenge. As was adhering to the strict budget, which sometimes led to some interesting choices (think lots of homemade art and hastily sewn slipcovers, plus furniture built from cost-effective multiple-density fiberboard, a small step up from plywood). While the new season’s format will remain much like it was a decade ago, budgets have been increased from \$1,000 to \$2,000. “It’s all about balance,” says designer Laurie Smith, known for reworking thrift-store finds. “You’re always pushing and pushing to make something look sophisticated on a very tight budget, but that’s the beauty of it.” Yet fans from across the country applied in droves to be on the show, which even had celebrity episodes and a handful of spinoffs. In 2002 the series was nominated for an Emmy Award but lost out to a *West Wing* documentary special. “It’s interesting to look back, because no one knew what to do with us yet,” says Smith. After eight seasons the phenomenon gave way to other popular design shows like HGTV’s *House Hunters*, and in 2008 Davis announced it was ending. The

cast scattered around the country—some, like Yip, Gorder and Pennington, pursued television as well as design opportunities, while others left the industry completely. “I never realized the lasting impression it would have,” says carpenter Carter Oosterhouse. “You think you move on, but you don’t. People still come up to me to this day and say, ‘Aren’t you Carter from *Trading Spaces*?’ I feel like I’ll be 85 years old and I’ll still get that.” But when they each got calls to return, the decision was unanimous. Though designer Frank Bielec admits he was initially hesitant. “I didn’t really look forward to making my private life public again,” he says. “After 10 years of being out of the business, I was no longer Frank from *Trading Spaces*, but I really do love this show.” Bielec eventually signed on to complete the cast.

“It’s either all of us or none of us,” says Gorder, adding that the same philosophy applies to their salaries: “We all get paid the same, so no one is competitive.” While the cast gears up for the second installment of their iconic series, they promise plenty of unexpected reveals ahead. “In this world of DIY and design, everybody is trying to brand themselves on white on white and shiplap and beige,” says Pennington. “It’s all supersafe and chic and cozy. This isn’t that kind of show. This is a show which is like WTF just happened in my room, and that’s why it’s so much fun.” So is getting the chance to work together again. “We knew that we had something very special,” says designer Hildi Santo Tomás. “Most things don’t come around twice. To get to do this again? It’s just incredible.” ●

TV COMEBACK

Prepping for a Baby Boy!

Already parents to daughter Luna (with her dad, below right, in a March 10 Instagram), Legend and Teigen (in January, below) will soon welcome their second child together, a son. “I think after having one, there’s a lot of things you learn the first time that will be helpful this second time around,” Legend says of their baby boy. “But I’m sure it’ll add a whole other layer of complexity with two at a time!” But Legend’s already perfected the art of pampering his wife. “He’s spoiling me,” Teigen told *People* recently. “He is so attentive—if I need something, he is there. He is cooking in overtime right now ... he really has become an incredible cook.”

John Legend has won Grammys, an Oscar and a Tony. Now, the singer-actor-producer will star in Andrew Lloyd Webber’s beloved rock opera *Jesus Christ Superstar*, taking on the title role for NBC’s next live musical adaptation. (Dare he hope to become an EGOT with an Emmy nod?) Ahead of his professional theatrical debut, Legend, 39, opened up about his sweet connection to the show, his expanding family and how growing up in the church changed his life. “The Bible was a huge part of my upbringing,” says Legend, who is already dad to daughter Luna, 23 months, and in June will welcome a son with cookbook author wife Chrissy Teigen, 32. “Hopefully the show’s story of the power of sacrifice—and suffering to make the world better—will inspire people.”

Were you a fan of the show before you signed on for this production?

In high school I was in the show choir, and we sang some of the songs from *Jesus Christ Superstar*, so that was my first exposure to it. And this is really the first time I’ve done anything like this since high school.

You’re portraying Jesus. Those are some pretty big shoes—or sandals—to fill.

How do you get into character?

[Composer Lloyd Webber and lyricist Tim Rice] imagined what a real human being would think going through betrayal and the challenge of joining together with your friends to fight against oppression. My job is to embody that.

What parallels do you see between this story and the times we’re living in today?

I think Jesus in real life was a bit of a revolutionary—he was somebody who was disrupting the status quo and provided an example for how we could all love each other, how we think about people who have been looked down upon and what it means to sacrifice oneself for something that you believe in.

When it comes to your own faith, what does Christianity mean to you?

I grew up in a very Christian home [in Springfield, Ohio]. My mother was a choir director, my grandmother was a church organist, my grandfather was our pastor. The message I took from growing up in church was the idea of loving your neighbor, giving to others and treating people as you would want to be treated. You can learn those things in any religion or without religion, but that’s where I did.

You found your love for performing in church too.

It wouldn’t have happened without it! I was in choir rehearsals every week as a kid, and I took over the choir when I was older. That was the foundation of my career; I wouldn’t be where I am without playing gospel music in church.

Soon you and Chrissy will expand your family and welcome your first son! How is the nesting coming along?

We still have a little bit of work to do—we’ve got to get the new bedroom ready—but we have a few months to go.

Is Luna excited to be a big sister?

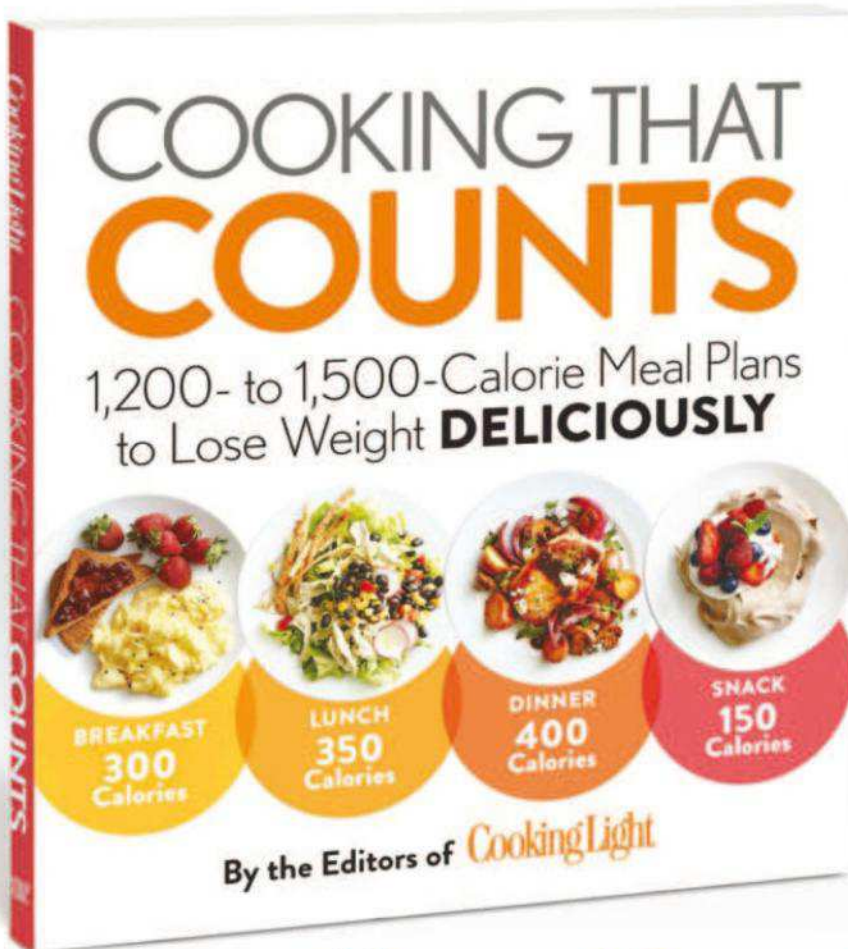
I don’t think Luna has a concept of exactly what it means to have a little sibling yet. She’ll figure it out sooner or later, and she’ll probably have some moments where she regrets it! But we’re excited. ●

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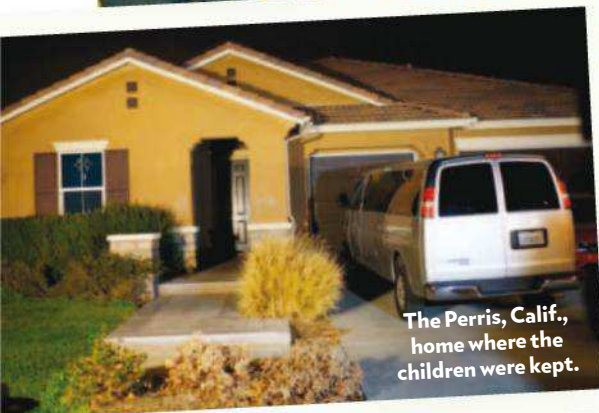

LIFE AFTER THE HOUSE OF HORRORS

Two months after escaping terror and starvation in their suburban California home, 13 siblings are healing—and embracing their newfound freedom

The call came from a 17-year-old girl who said that she and her siblings were being held captive by their parents in their Perris, Calif., home. But police officers responding to the scene in the early-morning hours of Jan. 14 were unprepared for what they found: 13 children born to David and Louise Turpin were living inside a foul, trash-strewn suburban house—three who had been chained and shackled to beds and furniture and all but one severely malnourished. The shocking abuse made national headlines—and *People*'s Feb. 5 cover—as neighbors anguished over the plight of the kids found inside what became known as “the house of horrors.” “What they went through,” said Mark Uffer, CEO of the Corona Regional Medical Center, where the adult children were later treated, “is not normal.”

Now they finally have a chance at normalcy. As first reported by *ABC News* in an exclusive interview with lawyer Jack Osborn, the young adult Turpin kids—ages 18 to 29—were quietly released from the Corona medical facility on March 15 and are now living together in a home in an undisclosed location in rural California. They've begun experiencing the simple freedoms—like making

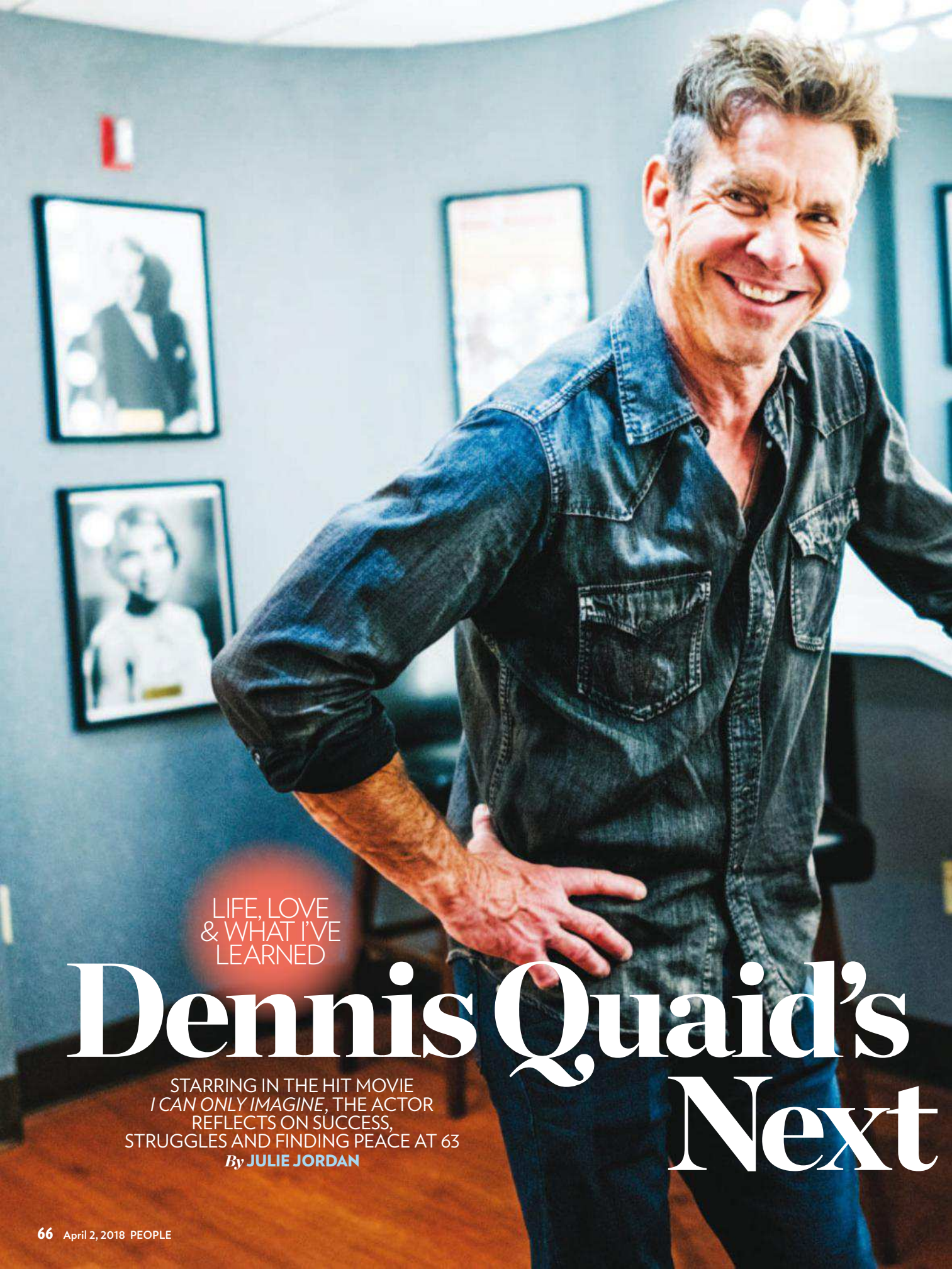
ice-cream sundaes and watching *Star Wars* movies—denied to them for decades. In addition to Skyping with their younger siblings—reportedly split up between two foster homes—they are caring for the family dogs and enjoying Mexican food and the opportunity to go outdoors. While their parents await trial on multiple counts of abuse, torture and false imprisonment, charges that could carry life sentences if they're convicted, the Turpin kids have picked out new bedding for their rooms and have closets full of clothes, Osborn told ABC. It's a joyful new chapter after years of pain that is giving hope to their extended family. “This is a new building block for them, a new step,” their uncle Billy Lambert tells *People*. “It's a positive thing, and it will be good for the healing process.”

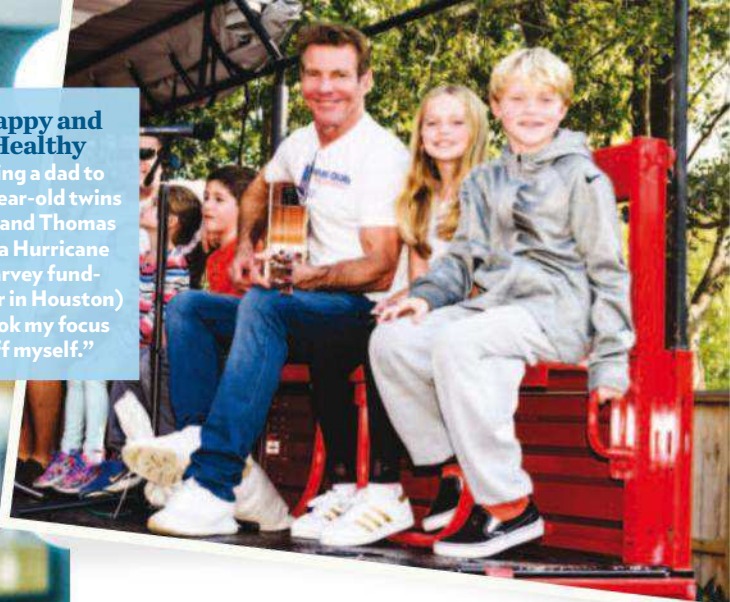
Dennis Quaid's Next

Happy and Healthy

Being a dad to 10-year-old twins Zoe and Thomas (at a Hurricane Harvey fundraiser in Houston) “took my focus off myself.”



While much of Hollywood's A-list air-kissed on Oscar night, Dennis Quaid was 2,000 miles away, in jeans, hanging out in his dressing room at Nashville's historic Ryman Auditorium before his band the Sharks opened for the Christian rock group MercyMe. Quaid's entourage? His 10-year-old son Thomas, who watched the sound check from the wings. "I've always been into live music," says Quaid, who's been singing and playing guitar and piano with his band for 18 years. "You look right at people and they give you energy. It's a unifier."

After four decades of stardom, the 63-year-old Texan is in a place where making those connections matters. A leading man who rocketed to fame in films such as *The Right Stuff*, Quaid has elevated nearly every part he's taken—from a comeback kid in *The Rookie* to the harried dad in *The Parent Trap*. But he's also weathered tough times—addiction, divorces, a terrifying medical mistake that almost killed his twin youngest children. These days he's got every reason to flash his wolfish grin. Quaid's new faith-based movie *I Can Only Imagine* is a box office hit that made \$17 million its opening weekend. The film tells the story behind the MercyMe song of the same title, the bestselling Christian single of all time. Quaid, who plays lead singer Bart Millard's abusive father, says the movie tells "a great, incredible story. That's the way I pick scripts."

By his account, Quaid's own upbringing was an "idyllic American childhood." Raised in Houston by his Southern Baptist parents—Buddy, an electrician, and Juanita, a real estate agent—Dennis and his older brother, actor Randy, "rode our bikes everywhere. My school was three blocks away, and the Little League baseball field was next to the city hall and fire department." He had hopes of becoming a cowboy until he took Cecil Pickett's renowned acting class at the University of Houston and was hooked. He dropped out of college, followed his

brother to L.A. and “tried to do something proactive every day,” he says. After cold-calling casting agents for six months, Quaid finally got a job making \$750 a week on *September 30, 1955*, a movie about James Dean’s death. “It was more than I had ever made,” adds the actor, who had waited tables before moving to Hollywood. “All I knew was that I wasn’t going to work as anything else but an actor.”

His acclaimed turn in the 1979 film *Breaking Away* led the way for more box office success, including *Innerspace* in 1987, *Great Balls of Fire!* in 1989, *Wyatt Earp* in 1994 and *The Parent Trap* in 1998. But in 1990 he went to rehab for cocaine addiction. Quaid says he has embraced cycling, golf and meditation to stay focused and healthy as his career has ebbed and flowed. “A lot of it had to be learned, to stay grounded,” he says. “And part of it is just where I come from, I guess. Sometimes your hopes get ahead of your dreams, so you can get disappointed that way. Adversity is the thing that teaches you how to handle that.”

Following a five-year marriage to *Halloween* actress P.J. Soles, Quaid wed his *D.O.A.* costar Meg Ryan in 1991. The two, whose son Jack Quaid, now 25, is an up-and-coming actor, went through a difficult, public divorce in 2001. Quaid wed real estate agent Kimberly Buffington, 36, in 2004, and the couple had twins, Thomas and Zoe, via surrogate three years later. The babies nearly died after being accidentally given an overdose of blood thinners in the hospital when they were just days old. Quaid became an advocate for patient safety, even appearing before Congress. While he and Kimberly split in 2016, the twins, now 10, are thriving. “My favorite time is actually when I’m in the car taking them to school,” Quaid says. “During breakfast, getting them up, you really get to know them. They’re as fresh as they’re going to get. It’s not the witching hour at night when it’s time to go to bed and all the excuses come out. A lot of bonding goes on in the

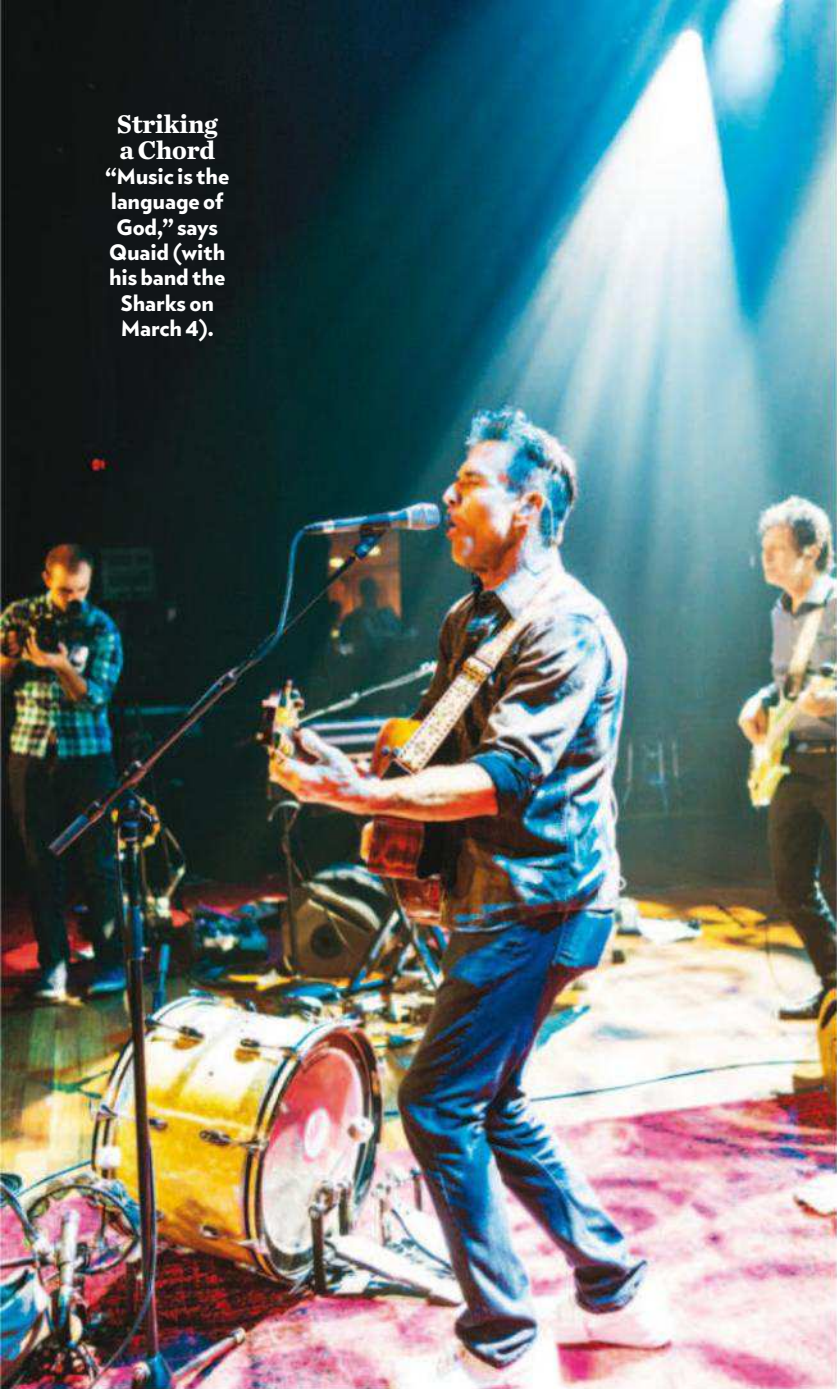

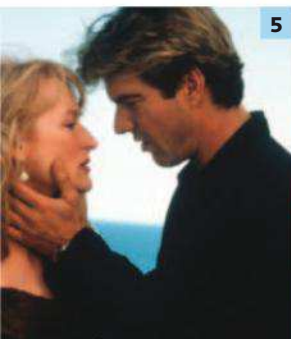
morning, talking about life.” As for Jack, Dennis is “so proud of him,” he says. “When he said he was ready to act, I told him I’d help him out, and of course he’s Meg Ryan’s son, but he said, ‘No, I want to do it myself.’” Jack won roles in the 2012 blockbuster *Hunger Games* and HBO’s *Vinyl* and has just signed on to star in Amazon’s superhero series *The Boys*. “Now I’m like, ‘Hey, how about a little help?’” Quaid jokes. “I’m not too proud to ask.”

Quaid is now in a relationship with Latvian-born model Santa Auzina, 31, whom he began dating in 2016 when he was filming *The Art of More* in Montreal. “We just have a blast,” he says. The two often document their adventures together

on social media, including a recent trip to Hawaii—where they went zip-lining and surfing—and riding roller coasters at Six Flags Magic Mountain in L.A. to celebrate Quaid’s 63rd birthday. “It’s just pure joy, that’s what it is,” he says of their time together. “The wonderful feeling of being alive.” Despite their 32-year age difference, “I kind of

feel like we’re both the same age on the inside,” he says. “When I look in the mirror, I see myself older than I feel, and then I go, ‘Oh, whatever.’” Aside from steadily working (production is starting on the third season of his U.K. TV series *Fortitude*), what makes Quaid happiest now? “That my kids are well and that they’re doing all right,” he says. As for his own life, “I’m most happy when I just kind of get out of my own way and let things happen. I’m not the guy that’s living an enlightened experience all the time; I blow my top many times. In life we’re either forced, kicking and screaming, into change—or we learn to cope with it. But I really am at peace now.” ●

Farewell to a Brilliant Mind

REFUSING TO LET ALS SLOW HIM DOWN, THE LEGENDARY THEORETICAL PHYSICIST EXPLORED THE MYSTERIES OF SPACE FROM THE CONFINES OF HIS WHEELCHAIR AND ULTIMATELY TRANSFORMED HUMANITY'S VIEW OF THE UNIVERSE *By* **JOHNNY DODD**



For the better part of nearly five decades, Stephen Hawking was in a wheelchair, tethered to a respirator and unable to speak or move a single muscle save for his eyes. But the disease that crippled his body never tamed his mind—or his sense of humor. “Life,” he told *The New York Times* in 2004, “would be tragic if it weren’t funny.”

It was that witty perspective that endeared the brilliant Cambridge University physicist—who died peacefully at his home in Cambridge, England, on March 14, at age 76—to millions around the globe. “Hawking’s deep understanding of the origin of everything, of the nature of space and time, changed the way every one of us thinks about the cosmos and our place within it,” says Bill Nye, the television science personality and CEO of the Planetary Society.

Hawking was diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) in 1963 while working on his Ph.D. thesis in cosmology at Cambridge. Despite being given just two years to live, he went on to become the world’s foremost theoretical physicist, developing groundbreaking theories on the origin of the universe and the nature of black holes and gravity. His 1988 bestseller *A Brief History of Time* sold more than 10 million copies and made him an unlikely celebrity, leading to cameo appearances on television shows like *The Simpsons*, *The Big Bang Theory* and *Star Trek: The Next Generation*. His own life was the subject of the award-winning 2014 film *The Theory of Everything*, adapted from the memoir of his first wife, Jane.

News of Hawking’s death lit up social media, with thoughts and condolences coming from such disparate sources as Katy Perry, NASA and President Obama, who tweeted, “Have fun out there among the stars.” Despite Hawking’s supercharged intellect, the twice-married father of three admitted there was one subject that baffled him. “I once asked [him] in an interview what puzzles him the most in all the universe,” tweeted Larry King. “‘Women,’ he answered.”

In recent years Hawking warned against the dangers of global warming and artificial intelligence. But ultimately his was a voice of optimism for our species. “Where there is life, there’s hope,” he said. “There are no limits to the human spirit.” ●

My Amazing Family

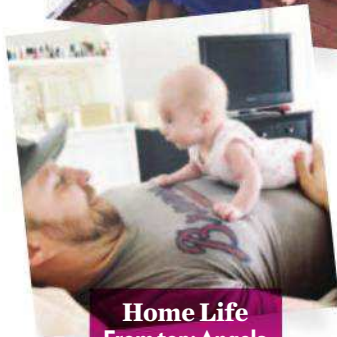
AFTER ADOPTING KIDS FROM AROUND THE WORLD (AND RECENTLY WELCOMING TWINS VIA EMBRYO ADOPTION), ANGELA BRANIFF LOVES HAVING A FULL HOUSE *By* **PATRICK GOMEZ**

Angela Braniff knows her family doesn't look like everyone else's in her Charlotte, N.C., community—and that's just fine with her. As mom to two biological daughters, three children who were adopted and twin daughters born via embryo adoption, Angela, 33—who documents her family's story on her popular blog *This Gathered Nest*—admits that having so many children and keeping her thousands of followers up to date on their daily lives can be hectic. "We're always

tired!" she says, laughing. Her husband, Christopher, 34, adds, "Life with seven kids is always a bit crazy." Still, the couple wouldn't have it any other way. As Angela says, "It's totally worth it."

The Braniffs didn't necessarily plan on having such a multifaceted, multi-ethnic family. Christopher, a risk-management lending manager, and Angela had been high school sweethearts and were eager to start a family after getting married in 2005. But during her first two pregnancies,

Angela suffered through hyperemesis gravidarum, a severe complication resulting in nausea, vomiting, dehydration and weight loss. (Princess Kate is a famous sufferer.) “It was awful,” Angela says of being pregnant with Kennedy, 11, and Shelby, 9. “But we loved becoming parents.” The couple, who are both devout Christians, always envisioned having “at least three or four kids,” but Angela didn’t think her body could handle it. Inspired by TLC’s *Adoption Stories*, they began looking into adopting. First came Noah, 6, from Congo in 2012, and Jonah, 4, adopted from his birth mother in Florida in 2013. (“I didn’t want Noah to be the only black child in our family,” Angela explains.) But the adoption process proved quite expensive. The Braniffs cut out cable and eating out while Angela wrote an e-book about photography and organized yard sales and fund-raisers to increase their savings. Still, when she came across an adoption-advocacy group’s Facebook post about Rosie, 6, a young Chinese girl with Down syndrome, “I just knew she was our daughter,” Angela says. Christopher wasn’t sure the family was ready for a fifth child, but “when I saw Rosie had the same birthday as Angie, I took that as a sign,” he says. Though their house was full with five kids, Angela says she felt compelled to carry one more child. While medical advances have recently made hyperemesis gravidarum more manageable,



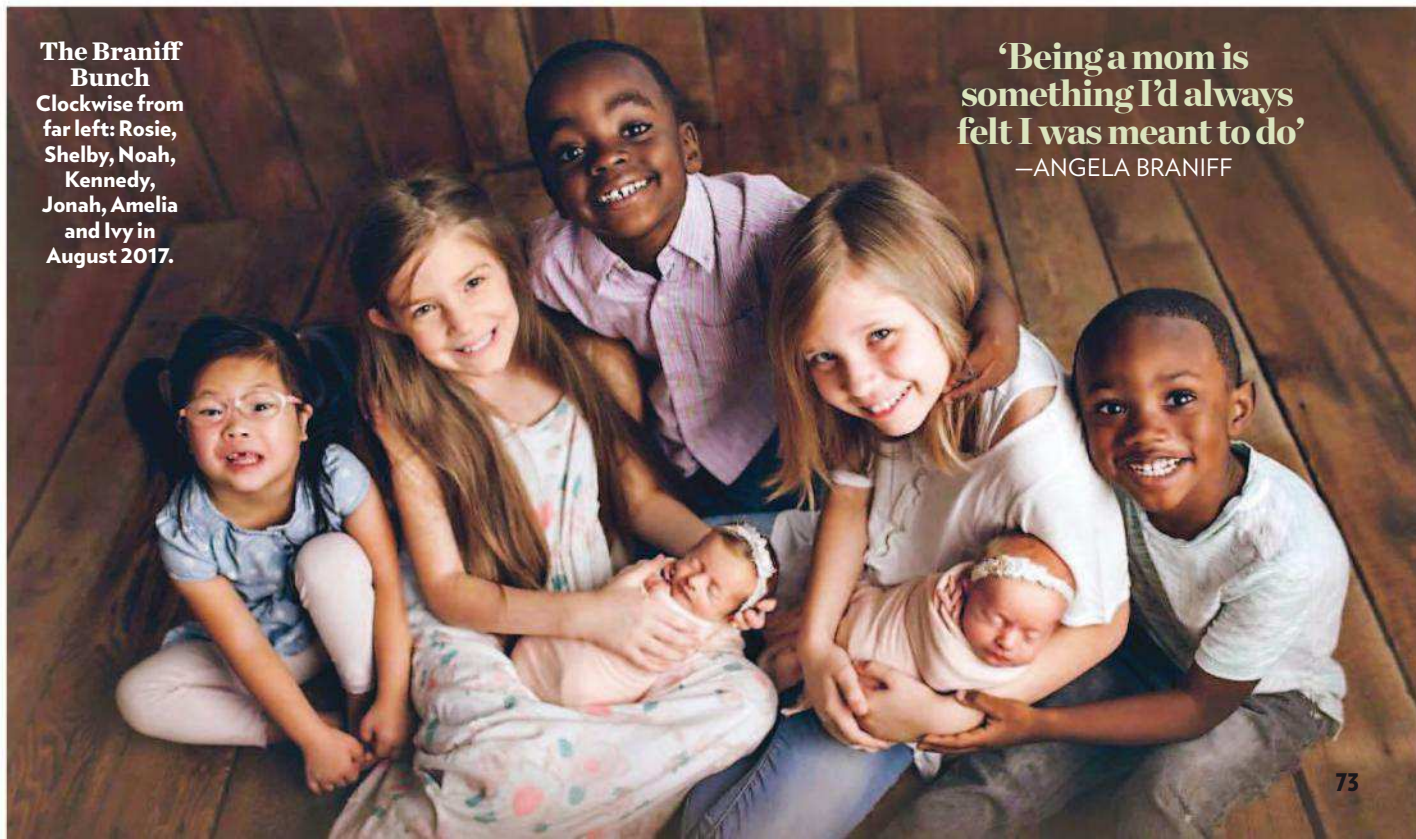

Angela was saddened to find herself struggling with secondary infertility. After two years of trying to conceive and extensive fertility treatments (“we did it ALL,” Angela blogged), she was told by doctors that another pregnancy seemed unlikely but that there was one other option. “Passing on my genes has never been something that mattered to me, so we looked into embryo adoption,” she says of the process in which unused embryos following an in vitro procedure are donated to others. The Braniffs were able to use two embryos from a fertility center but were still surprised when both survived the transfer to Angela’s uterus. “We had no idea we’d get twins!” she says of welcoming Ivy and Amelia last July.

As for how strangers react to her family, Angela admits that there are often questions. “That’s why I started my site, to normalize the idea of families of all kinds,” she adds of her blog and YouTube channel. The latter has 226,000 subscribers who tune in for her home-organization and beauty tips as well as her candid, witty and self-deprecating take on being a mom. The Braniffs don’t believe in saying “never” when it comes to having more kids, but for now they feel their family is complete. “To the outside world our family may look different, but to our kids we’re totally normal,” says Christopher. “I think that’s pretty cool.” ●

WHAT YOU NEED

1 pkg. (4 oz.) BAKER'S White Chocolate, divided
28 square shortbread cookies (1-1/2 inch), divided
2 Tbsp. butter, melted
1/2 cup plus 2 Tbsp. sugar, divided
2 pkg. (8 oz. each) PHILADELPHIA Cream Cheese, softened
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. zest and 1/4 cup juice from 2 lemons
2 eggs

MAKE IT

HEAT oven to 325°F.

MELT 2 oz. chocolate as directed on package; set aside for later use.

USE pulsing action of food processor to process 16 cookies until finely crushed; spoon into medium bowl. Add butter and 2 Tbsp. sugar; mix well. Press onto bottoms of 12 paper-lined muffin cups, adding about 1 Tbsp. crumb mixture to each prepared cup.

BEAT cream cheese, vanilla and remaining sugar in large bowl with mixer until blended. Add lemon zest, lemon juice and melted chocolate; mix well. Add eggs, 1 at a time, mixing on low speed after each just until blended. Spoon over crusts.

BAKE 17 to 20 min. or until centers are almost set. Cool completely.

MELT remaining chocolate. Coarsely chop remaining cookies; sprinkle over cheesecakes. Drizzle with melted chocolate.

REFRIGERATE 2 hours.

Bacon BBQ Cheeseburger with Onion Rings

THE OWNERS OF BLACK TAP RESTAURANT IN LAS VEGAS BUILD A BURGER PILED HIGH WITH FLAVOR

- 2 lbs. 80-20 lean ground beef
- 1 Tbsp. kosher salt
- $\frac{1}{8}$ tsp. black pepper
- 1 Tbsp. canola oil or vegetable oil
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup Carolina-style barbecue sauce or your favorite store-bought sauce
- 8 cheddar cheese slices
- 4 (4-in.) potato buns, split
- 8 applewood-smoked bacon slices, cooked crisp
- 8 frozen fried onion rings, prepared according to package directions
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup mayonnaise

1. Place beef in a large bowl. Use your fingers to gently break up meat (don't overhandle). Form meat into 4 patties, about $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch thick. Combine salt and pepper in a small bowl; sprinkle half of mixture over tops of patties.
2. Heat a large cast-iron skillet over medium-high; grease pan lightly with oil. Place patties, seasoned side down, in skillet.

Sprinkle tops with remaining salt mixture. Cook, without pressing down or moving burgers, until bottoms are browned, about 5 minutes. Flip, and cook to desired degree of doneness (5 more minutes for medium-rare or 7 more minutes for medium). Spoon 2 tablespoons barbecue sauce onto each burger, and top each with 2 slices of the cheese. Add 1 teaspoon water to skillet. Immediately cover skillet, and cook until cheese melts, about 10 seconds. Transfer burgers to a plate, reserving 1 teaspoon drippings in skillet. Wipe out the browned bits with a paper towel.

3. Place buns, cut-side down, in skillet, and toast until browned, 1 to 2 minutes.

4. Place 1 patty on each bottom bun half. Top each with 2 slices bacon and 2 onion rings. Spread mayonnaise on bun tops, and serve with toppings like lettuce, tomato slices and pickles.

Charred Broccolini with Grapes & Cashews

THE EXECUTIVE CHEF OF NEW YORK CITY'S FERRIS SHARES A FAVORITE DISH FROM THE RESTAURANT'S MENU

- 1 cup plain Greek yogurt
- 1½ tsp. black pepper, divided
- ⅓ cup, plus 1½ tsp. extra-virgin olive oil, divided
- ½ tsp. kosher salt, divided
- ⅓ cup balsamic vinegar
- 2½ Tbsp. fish sauce
- 2 tsp. lemon zest, plus 1 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice (from 1 lemon), divided
- 3 Tbsp. canola oil, divided
- 4 medium brussels sprouts, leaves separated (½ cup leaves)
- 2 (8-oz.) bunches broccolini, trimmed
- ¼ cup chopped roasted cashews
- ¼ cup quartered seedless red grapes

1. Whisk together yogurt, 1 teaspoon black pepper, 1½ teaspoons olive oil and ¼ teaspoon salt in a small bowl. Whisk together balsamic vinegar, fish sauce, lemon juice and remaining ⅓ cup olive oil in a separate small bowl. Set bowls aside.

2. Heat 1½ tablespoons canola oil in a large cast-iron skillet over medium high, swirling to coat. Add brussels-sprout leaves; cook, stirring occasionally, until crisp, 1 to 2 minutes. Remove leaves with a slotted spoon; drain on paper towels.

3. Add remaining 1½ tablespoons canola oil to skillet over medium-high. Add broccolini, and cook, turning occasionally, until charred and tender, about 2 minutes per side. Remove broccolini from heat; season with remaining ½ teaspoon black pepper and ¼ teaspoon salt.

4. To serve, spread yogurt mixture onto a platter, and arrange broccolini on top. Sprinkle with brussels-sprout leaves, cashews, grapes and lemon zest. Drizzle with ½ cup of the balsamic vinaigrette.

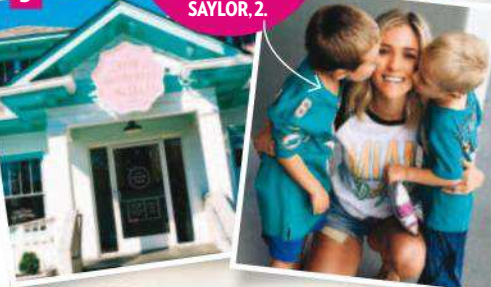
7/ Thompson Hotel Rooftop
