"No fair!" said Indi. "Tex got to go first last week! And I've been practicing, too."




After practicing the duet for a couple of weeks, the twins were ready to play it at their monthly piano recital. When they finished playing together, they bowed together, too.



"Yes, *please*. That's the magic word!" said Ma. Then she fried the *samosas* in the hot oil. Soon they were munching on the best *samosas* ever. •








"I didn't say someone grumpy was coming," Rabbit said. "I said Grampy was coming."






Everyone laughed as they greeted a smiling Grampy Rabbit. And then they all sat down to eat. @



"Thanks," said Squirrel. "I love sailboats. What's the big word?"


"Congratulations," said Little Bunny.

Hummus Four Ways Pont forget

You Need

- 1 lemon, cut in half
- 500 grams boiled chickpeas
- ½ cup tahini (sesame-seed paste)
- ½ cup water
- 1/3 cup olive oil
- ½ teaspoon salt

For olive hummus

15 pitted Kalamata olives


For pesto hummus

• 3–4 tablespoons prepared pesto

For feta-spinach hummus

- 2 tablespoons feta cheese
- ½ cup baby spinach with stems removed

1. Squeeze the lemon halves. Add the juice to a food processor or blender.



Adult: Blend each mixture until it is smooth and creamy.

5. Draw some things you'd see on the beach on colored paper and cut them out.






6. Glue loops of paper to the back of the cut-outs as shown. Glue them inside the card.
