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# Botanical 

## Notes

> Layer up gorgeous new collage papers with Distress Resist Spray and inks to add stunning layers to your compositions! By Kath Stewart

There were so many amazing and innovative new Tim Holtz Distress products launched at Creativation in January 2018, including the beautiful Idea-ology Collage Papers and Distress Resist Spray which were perfect for creating a decorative cover for an old black notebook.

Distress Resist Spray is technically a very sticky glue in a bottle and it is very important to use it carefully, you will need a suitably large container (an old cardboard box is ideal) to hold your project while you spray and if you intend on using a stencil, it is very important to wash it immediately or have a container on hand to pop it into.

## Step-by-step... Distressed layering



1 Trim Heavystock card to be slightly smaller than the front of the notebook and round corners. Place card in a suitable container and spritz Distress Resist Spray through Dotted stencil.

4 Stamp script randomly on the card with VersaMark ink, sprinkle with white embossing powder and heat to set.

7 Stamp the insect image from Entomology set with Black Soot archival ink.


2 Tap Distress Oxide inks onto a craft mat and pull card through the ink. Dry, spritz with water and tap the card back into the ink to pick up remaining droplets.

5 Trim the images from the Botanical Collage Paper and fix in place with Distress Collage Medium.

8 Add Idea-ology Tiny Text and Life Quotes Remnant Rubs.


3 Apply Black Soot Distress Oxide ink through the Dotted Mini stencil using a mini round blending tool.

6 Stamp letters with Black Soot archival ink and Distress Oxides. Sprinkle the coloured letters with clear embossing powder and heat set.

9 Highlight the letters, circles and flowers with the Sakura White Gelly Roll Pen.

To finish the project: To finish I inked the edges of the Heavystock panel with Black Soot archival ink, fixed to the notebook with Distress Collage Medium and added a Dylusions Creative Dyary Clip.



1 Trim the Heavystock card to be slightly smaller than the DL card blank. Repeat the Distress Spray and Distress Oxide ink technique as before.


2 Apply heavier layers of Distress Oxide inks using the mini round blending tool to achieve a brighter look to the background.


3 Stamp the bee image from Entomology add label letters to complete the sentiment and twine before fixing the panel to the card.
"Once you know the technique with Powertex you can go away, play with it and make it work the way you need it to. It's a non-toxic, water based, universal medium which coats just about everything, from mixed fibres to metal embellishments and even resin. But even better, you can use Stone Art Powder mixed in with Powertex to make clay which you can stamp into.
It will coat your projects like paint and it will glue them too. As it's slow setting, it gives you some time to play around with composition, so if you don't like a positioning of an element you can simply pick it up and move it to another place. You really can push Powertex to the limits and get experimental with it, all you need is a dash of imagination and a can-do attitude and you are guaranteed instant gratification!

## Step-by-step... Powertex Assemblage



1 Make Stone Art Clay. Mix Powertex with Stone Art Powder to a dough consistency. Place in an airtight container.

4 Prime base. Add scrim fabric and Power Cotton. Dribble Powertex over the Power Cotton and sprinkle balls. Spread Easy Structure paste through stencil.

7 Hold canvas upright. From the top, spray Tangerine into Raspberry, then Tangerine and Egg Yolk acrylic ink. Let them drip down, achieving a watercolour effect.


2 Push clay into moulds to create embellishments. Leave to air dry. They don't need to be fully dried for use.

5 Mix sand with Powertex and paint an old CD. Place doily on top. Add Power Cotton in a circle and add embellishments.

8 Highlight detail by dry brushing with Ivory Powertex. Spray with ink and keep layering for depth. Splatter Ivory Powertex for more texture.


3 Cover MDF shapes (in this case feathers and unicorn) with a thin layer of clay, and push a stamp down into the clay to create texture.

6 Add all embellishments. You don't have to wait for the clay on the MDF shapes to dry, gently paint over the top of them.

9 You can't go wrong with a bit of bling. Using some transparent Powertex, adhere your gems in place and leave to dry.

#### Abstract

Add gorgeous rusty accents to your stamped works to add an element of dimension and rustic finesse! By Jenny Marples


Bipasha BK's stamp designs are full of intricate detail and inspiring words so I used a white pen to highlight some of the important ones on the background. For the main image, extra impact and contrast was created by the use of black ink on white card.

When building the design, I stamped the main image onto a scrap of paper and used that to help align the remaining smaller images; by placing it onto the background I could move the small stamps around to find the right composition.

To create a depth of colour for the background I used several tonal shades of blue and aqua, applying them in uneven layers to allow the underlying ones to remain visible This then allowed the repeat stamping around the edges in contrasting colours to stand out.

Seth Apter's Chunky Rust embossing powder is different from regular powders as it contains filaments which remain un-melted when heated. This allows them to replicate the look of real rust and give the embossing added dimension.

## Step-by-step... Rusty Framed Composition



1 After lightly sanding the surface and applying a coat of white gesso to prime the frame, cover with a layer of Ocean paint.

4 Use the same piece of acetate to blot a little Sky and Turquoise paint onto the frame and edges of the card.

7 Add white paint to some foam, apply to the edge of a ruler and transfer to the frame and card to create lines.


2 Use a brayer to add uneven layers of acrylic paint to a large piece of white card, starting with Sky then adding Turquoise.

5 Add dots of Peacock paint to the craft mat, push the acetate into it and blot over the frame and all of the card.

8 Stamp the images from Stamp Set \#39 using Jet Black archival ink, using a stamped version of the main image as a spacing guide.


3 Cut a piece of card to fit the frame and blot Ocean paint onto the edges using a piece of acetate.

6 Stamp the largest image from Stamp Set \#25 onto the frame and card using Cheddar and Sedona paints on pieces of foam.

9 Splatter Distress Resist Spray drops onto the frame and card edges around the stamping, cover with Chunky Rust embossing powder and heat set.

To finish the project: Use a white pen to highlight areas of the stamped images. Slot the piece of card inside the frame and reassemble. Add dots of Ruby acrylic paint to the design. Stamp the scissors image from Border Set \#27 onto white card and highlight with the white pen. Cut around the image leaving a small border and attach to either side of the frame.

## Further Ideas



## Al Dream of Painting

Cut a piece of white card slightly smaller than the card blank and cover with Ocean acrylic paint. Treat in the same way as the frame, following the steps used for the main project. Cut a piece from the brayered card used for the card panel in the main project. Again, follow the steps used to create that panel in the main project.

Mat and layer the smaller panel onto the larger panel and stick onto a DL card blank. Stamp one of the brush images from Border Set \#26 onto white card using Jet Black archival ink and use the white pen to add highlights. Cut around the image leaving a small border and mount onto the card.

# Dazzling 

## Daisies

## Apply layers of wax to your bold blooms to tone down the vibrant colours and create subtle texture. By Emma Godfrey

My inspiration for these cards were the fabulous new PaperArtsy JOFY flower stamps and the beautifully bright fluorescent Amsterdam acrylic inks that I've been waiting for an excuse to use. Kraft cardstock adds the perfect neutral background to set the flowers off, and a touch of black/white accents ties everything together.
The application of wax softens the fluorescent colours just a little bit, whilst also adding some fantastic texture. I used a Ranger Melting Pot to melt my wax, but a quick internet search can show you many other ways of doing it. The nice thing is that it doesn't need a high heat to melt, unlike some other products - though with any hot liquid - do be careful you don't burn yourself!
This was the first time that I'd used any kind of wax, and so it really was an experiment, but I'm so pleased with how it turned out! I'm looking forward to experimenting more...

# Love's Dream 

Use Stampers Grove products to produce this stunning alternative mixed media reverse canvas project. By Lorna Figures

Ilove playing with black and white gesso together. In this project, the black gesso adds depth and shadow to the textured areas, while the white gesso brings life and vibrancy to the spray inks. Many spray inks do not show up well on a dark surface. However, with a little white gesso on top they are given the chance to bleed through and create a wonderful, slightly pastel version of themselves. This pastel colour stands out vividly on the black gesso. The same techniques can be used on top of acrylic paint, which can open up a vast range of colour opportunities.
Tyvek is an unusual media which has a fantastic yet unpredictable character. It can be heated in different ways to create different textures and will result in a unique effect each time. However, when heating your project be very careful as the Tyvek will continue to change shape as it is heated and may change the overall look of your project.
Collaged phrases allow text to be added to even the most highly textured surfaces and remain read.

## Step-by-step... Double Reverse Canvas



1 Use Heavy Gel Medium to join the two canvases. Apply texture paste to frame edges. Pounce flat side of pallet knife on paste for more texture.

3 Trim the melted Tyvek to fit inside the small canvas. Adhere the trimmed Tyvek and offcuts to the canvas using gel medium.

5 Once everything is dry, coat everything in a layer of black gesso. Lightly apply gesso where you want to fade out the colour.


2 Place a large sheet of Tyvek between two sheets of baking parchment. Carefully hover a hot iron over the baking paper to shape the Tyvek.

4 Add Art Stones using light gel medium. Start with larger stones and finish with mini stones.

6 Spray inks over the black gesso in bands of dark to light. Use white ink spray to highlight lighter areas. Allow to dry naturally.



7 Dry brush white gesso to enhance the sprayed colours. Add more white gesso or spray ink until you achieve the desired look.
8 Coat chipboard hearts in white gesso and decide on the arrangement and order you would like to attach them to the canvas. Do not glue yet.

9 Remembering the order you would like to attach them, use shades of red, orange and yellow to create a gradient effect across the hearts.

To finish the project: I added some wood texture stamping to each of the hearts before using Heavy Gel Medium to attach them to the canvas. I then used Metallique Wax to highlight more of the texture created by the paste and Tyvek. I completed the piece with a few collage phrases, using my fingers and a little gel medium to gently push the words into the texture.

 to use on swipes, especially if you use a large substrate. You can recycle some from your craft packaging. Gently place one end of the acetate onto the pour and pull across the paint.

# Acrylic Paint Pour: Puddle Swipe 

## Learn another fantastic paint pouring technique to create beautiful cellular designs. By Sue Ralph

In this issue I wanted to share with you another way to create a piece of art using acrylic paint pouring and of course some stamping.

Anyone who knows me knows that I am addicted to acrylic paint pouring and I have been experimenting with lots of different techniques and products for doing this type of art. For this project I am using a new kit from IndigoBlu called Acrylic Pouring Alchemy Starter Kit. Everything you need to start paint pouring is in this kit. You just might need to add extra paint colours.

This project is about creating paint puddles. Instead of adding paint together in a cup as I did for my 'Dirty Pour' article, you create layers of paint in different colours, on top of each other to form coloured puddles, then swipe a different colour paint across the top. This is when you see the magic happen!

Step-by-step... Puddle Swipe


1 Prepare all items you will need to use. Protect your work surface. Paint the canvas board, Artboard and small wooden blocks in white gesso.


3 Using the pipettes, add small puddles of different colour paints over the canvas. Go back over, adding a different colour on top of the puddles.


2 Mix up four colours of paint. Add one teaspoon of paint to each glass and two teaspoons of Go-Flow. Add two to three drops of Cell-u-like to each colour and stir. Mix up a large batch of white paint.


4 Start pouring white paint mixture onto one end of the canvas covering a width of about two inches. Using a spatula, slowly swipe the white paint over the colours. Wipe spatula clean after each swipe to keep the top layer white before the colours start appearing.


5 You may find that you need to add a little more white paint to make sure all the board is covered. You can always swipe over this area again. Make sure the sides of the panel are also covered in paint.


7 Leave to dry on a flat surface for a couple of days until completely dry. After that time if there is any oil on the surface, wipe away with a dry cloth. To bring back the glossy look of the pour, paint the surface with a couple of coats of varnish.



6 Use a blow torch or heat gun to help bring up cells of different colour. Heat it up but don't hold it too close to the paint in case it blows the paint outwards. Gently clean away the paint from the bottom of the Artboard so it will sit on its base when dry.


8 Stamp, colour using the same colours as in the swipe and cut out your stamped images. Add Unicorn Sparkles to the mane and tail.

9 Attach the base to the Artboard then cover the base with Super Thick Slap It On to create a textured base. Cover with glass beads and flowers. Use small blocks to add dimension to larger elements before gluing in place.

To finish the project: I added the flowers over the base and cascading down one side of the Artboard.
I decided not to add anything else as I wanted the pattern that had come up in swipe to be the main focus.

Craft beautiful dimensional embellishments for all your bright summery projects! By Dawn Bibby

Inspired by the stunning floral displays surrounding us in the English countryside at this time of year, I have created a couple of bright and cheerful cards for any occasion. Using my Dawn Bibby Creations designs, I have crafted two intricate coordinating cards with a cohesive colour palette and bold white embossing.

These pretty, versatile stamp designs could also be used in a range of different projects to add a lovely botanical element. Try alternative colour schemes to produce different looks and striking ombre designs!

## Step-by-step... Butterfly Background



To finish the background: Stamp images from both stamp sets onto the background, then emboss with white embossing powder.
Add glitter for a sparkle effect!

## Step-by-step... Inked Flowers



To finish the project: Die cut leaves using the Fantasy Fern die and position them behind the flowers. Adhere everything in place, then add resin gems to the centre of the flowers as a finishing touch.

<Floral Dream
Cut the leftover piece of the stencilled background into two even pieces. Mat these onto gold card, leaving a 4 mm border all around. Next, score your A4 white pearl card in half and position the pieces in a staggered composition. Trim your card to the suitable size.

Stamp a selection of flowers with a VersaMark ink pad and emboss with white powder and colour with a water brush. Cut out flowers and emboss on the rear side. Attach flowers cascading down and across the card with glue gel. Attach gems to the centres of the flowers and add random gems around the flowers in assorted sizes.

Die cut the butterfly and add onto the card. I like the mixture of different textures on my cards and find it nice to mix and match and experiment with looks. Add gems to the butterfly and your all done!

Step-by-step... Rusted Panel and Embellishments


1 Collect cardboard in various thicknesses. Cut out as many cogs as you can from the card you have using the dies. Mix Payne's Grey paint with chalky finish medium and paint fronts and edges.

4 Apply Georgia Clay paint here and there with a dabbing action. If you put too much on, use the wet wipe to remove it carefully. The idea is to be able to see the previous layers a bit.


2 Splatter pieces with Jet Black Patent Leather paint using a toothbrush. The more water you add, the finer the splatters. I like to add large blobs to give dimension. Allow to dry.

5 Finally, we need some metallic accents. Use your finger to apply Metallic Lustre, keeping to the edges and high points.

3 Apply the first layer of brown. Paint with Russet and then, while still a bit wet, rub a little bit off to reveal some of the first two layers.

6 This technique works well on embossed card too. To make an embossed panel, emboss thinner card with your chosen design. Follow the steps as for the regular thicker pieces but this time, concentrate on the high profile areas with Georgia Clay and Metallic lustre.


To finish the project: Ink a panel with Old Paper and Walnut Stain Distress Ink. Randomly stamp edges in Jet Black archival ink. Glue the trimmed rust panel to a piece of sandable paper and sew the edge. Attach this to the inked and stamped main panel and sew. Glue a selection of cogs and gears to the bottom left hand side. Add a layered bolt to the top right hand corner of the rusty panel to balance the design. Use die cut words and add silver card behind them to highlight. Attach the panel to the front of the card.

## ABeautiful Butterfly Plaque By Stampin' Up! Designer, Zoe Tant

Most of us have a spare tester pot of paint somewhere and this is a great way to put it to good use! I found a taupe and off white. I painted the plaque with the darker colour first, left it to dry and then rubbed random spots with a candle. Next, I painted it with the lighter colour and left it to dry. I then gently rubbed the plaque with fine sandpaper to scuff off the paint which doesn't stick to the wax to give a vintage appearance.

Using different neutral inks, I stamped directly onto the plaque to create my scene. I also used a die to create a stencil from Window Sheet and sponged over it with ink to add more foliage. Next I die cut foliage from card backed with double sided adhesive and added that to the composition. I stamped the butterfly and coloured it in using alcohol markers. I left this to dry before fussy cutting it out and adding fine tip glue which dries clear, but shiny and slightly raised to give a stain/Tiffany glass effect. I also added some rhinestones coloured with alcohol markers to coordinate with the colour scheme. Once the scene was set I stamped the butterfly onto the plaque with Memento ink and coloured it again with alcohol markers. I added the dimensional butterfly with hot glue.

The Library Clips were perfect for adding a hanger without having to drill holes or try to staple anything into the plaque and can be removed at any time. I also added a few single sequins to complement the hanger.

## ABold Butterfly By Stampin' Up! Designer, Zoe Tant

I used the Beautiful Day butterfly stamp to create a silver heat embossed backdrop for the focal point of my card; two butterflies layered on top of each other. The lower one, barely visible, is silver embossed on vellum card and the upper butterfly is stamped in black before it was fussy cut out. I added colour by sprinkling Brusho Crystals onto a strip of watercolour paper which I first painted with a weak solution of water and bleach. The bleach causes the 'flaring' of the colours and the water allows them to blend a little. I then wrapped silver thread around this layer and added some black rhinestones before layering onto silver foil card. Finally, the butterflies were added and the top butterfly was raised with sticky pads to give extra dimension.

## ABeautiful Day By Stampin' Up! Designer, Zoe Tant

One of the current buzzwords is 'mindfulness' and colouring lends itself well to this and I for one find it very therapeutic. For this project, I began by stamping the flower image in VersaMark all over white card and heat embossing with copper powder. I made sure the embossing was cool before beginning to colour with Stampin' Blends. Next, I stamped, embossed and coloured an extra flower and fussy cut it out. This was then added with sticky pads to one flower that was not complete on the main stamped piece, taking it over the border and edge of the card. The centre of the flower was created in a similar way to add more depth.

To complete the design, I stamped the sentiment on white card and roughly cut out the words I wanted to use to create my own sentiment and added them to the card. To create the copper border I tapped VersaMark around the edge of a piece of card just a little larger than the design and heat embossed in copper powder.


## <Thinking Of You By Trish Latimer

I used a box canvas as my base for this piece, as the butterfly is so big and bold I thought it needed a big and bold setting! The canvas was coloured with paint, in a simple smeared manner. I didn't add much detail, as the butterfly is the focal point. Once l'd coloured the face image and adhered it to the background, it was a simple job to add the butterfly. As a finishing touch, I added the sentiment, stamped onto blue painted card just as the butterfly had been.

## Dreams and Secrets By Trish Latimer

Butterfly wings are all about movement, so I wanted to create a look that celebrated that flutter effect. I used multiple (about eight in the end!) layers of thin paper, card and tissue to create a 3D, raised effect to the wings. The top layer is simply the butterfly image stamped and white embossed onto heatproof acetate I assembled the layers behind this, and cut them out as one. The body of the butterfly is stitched through all the layers to hold it together. Once the butterfly was finished, it was placed upon a mini canvas. I coloured the canvas using a vintage scheme. The old book page background was given a wash of brown paint, with blue and white paint accents added.

Bullet journalling is all the rage at the moment and I'm addicted to it. I've been writing 'To Do' lists for years, who knew that you can make an art out of it! Basically, you can organise your year with all your 'To Do' lists in a planner or notebook and make them as arty as you like.

Making a mixed media bullet journal is difficult unless you have a grade of paper that can take ink and paint happily without warping and bleeding through. The new Dylusions Dyalog system of planner books are brilliant for making mixed media bullet journalling possible. Step-by-step... Weekly Bullet Journal


1 Plan out your page design lightly using a pencil. Plan your boxes and headings.

4 Stick the masking tape back over your boxes, rub out any pencil lines outside the boxes and begin to paint your background.

7 To add lots of interest, stamp all over the page using Distress Inks.


2 Put masking tape over your boxes and mark off the lines with a ruler. Write on the heading so you know where the masking tape goes back.

5 Paint watercolours lightly at first, then dry and repeat to get more beautiful vivid colour.

8 To add some contrast, add white or black paint by stamping it on and flicking specks with a toothbrush.


3 Take off the masking tape pieces carefully and put them on your craft mat while you cut them all to size.

6 Stencil over the background using Distress Ink and an applicator tool. Or you can use paint if you prefer it.

9 Dry your page, then peel off your making tape carefully. Add the tape to palette paper to use again or use as washi tape!


10 Using a fine black pen and ruler, go over the edges of your boxes and write in your titles.


11 Use a brush pen to write in a quote on the page and write your month title at the top of the page.


12 Fill in your bullet journal pages with your writing.

To finish the project: Fill in your weekly pages and make them your own by doodling and adding colour with pencils and fine pens. Have a go at hand lettering so you can add inspirational quotes to your pages. You don't have to be super arty to have a go at bullet journaling, just start with some lists and a bit of doodling and you're away!

## Further Ideas

## > June Title Page

Dot paint on the hexagon plate and use a brayer to spread the paint, then print the hexagon onto your page. Clean the plate. Lay the stencil on the plate and brayer the colour paint you want your design to have. Take off the stencil, then print the hexagon over the top of your first print. Doodle around the edge. Highlight areas with a white pen. Pencil in your writing on the hexagon once dry. Using a black brush pen, write your words out.

To start, I simply added gesso to a white/greyboard heart using a palette knife to create a raised texture and added colour with paints and spray to keep it quite simple. I collaged stamped tissue paper over the raised surface. I had to add a bit of a sparkle, so whilst the glue was wet, I used the opportunity to sprinkle a bit of glass glitter and some halo glitter on top.

I wanted my background to tie with the colours on the heart. I really wanted to try out the new Clear Crackle Glaze, so I played a bit more with the same colours and toned it down with white paint over the Crackle Glaze. I always look to create contrast in my mixed media art and inking the edges in a dark hue did just that!
With the crackled background and the textured heart, I wanted to add a simple yet an effective embellishment and found that the embossed acetate butterfly added the perfect touch and finished the card nicely.

## "We always think of butterflies as being very colourful but I wanted the flowers to be the colour on this piece and have the butterflies contrasting in black and white."

## A Beauty in Black and White By That's Crafty! Designer, Laura Holland

This project involved a lot of stamping and then masking with the Pebeo Masking Fluid. When all the flowers were stamped, I set about colouring them in with the Zig Clean Colour Brush Pens and blended some with a water brush. I deliberately left some white space when stamping the flowers on the white/greyboard panel to give the design space to breathe.

The butterfly was simply stamped and embossed and then adhered to the white/greyboard panel.

## ABarking Butterflies By That's Crafty! Designer, Laura Holland

"I saw an incredible photo on Facebook of a tree that was absolutely covered in purple butterflies and that's what gave me the idea for this piece. I knew our Sand Texture Paste would work really well with our Tree Bark stencil, so that was my starting point."

I covered the Chunkie with Texture Sand Paste through the Tree Bark stencil and then painted everything with Metallic Antique Gold Multi Surface Paint. When dry, I applied a thin layer of Crackle Glaze and then when this was dry, I applied a coat of Chestnut Brown Multi Surface Paint. I love how the gold shows through the cracks and catches the light.
I stamped and embossed the butterfly several times and then coloured them in with watered down Multi Surface Paints and then glued them to the Chunkie.


## AButterfly and Cherry Blossom By Tracey Fairgrieve

MDF is such a versatile surface, here I have layered paint on top of paint and sanded back areas to expose what lies beneath. Embossing stamped images is a very quick way to add texture and detail into those empty spaces.
I used a craft adhesive pen to draw detail onto the blank greyboard butterfly so that once dry the butterfly is left with amazing dimension. The added dimensional details also give the painted wing markings an extra layer of intricacy. This technique worked so well, I decided to use it on the cherry blossom too!

A piece of twisted tea-dyed calico formed the tree branch, giving the butterfly somewhere to land.

## Embrace Beautiful Chaos By Sarah Anderson

I love a wonky, heart, but this one came about quite by accident. I didn't like my first idea for decorating this cookie cutter and as I removed it, I bent the cutter slightly. This gave me the idea to really bend it into a different style of heart. After attaching a loop of twine, I added a corrugated cardboard heart inside the cutter, which gave me a framed area to work within.

Layers of small, torn pieces of gelli printed deli paper cover the cookie cutter and its cardboard centre. Deli paper becomes almost transparent when glued so stamping an image, cutting around it, then gluing it onto your substrate means you can add stamped images to areas that would normally be inaccessible to a stamp. Splashes of paint, hole punched painted card, stamped images and text are just some of the tools I used to create this beautiful chaos.

## Love By Elizabeth Robinson

I keep all my fabric scraps so I can use them to create texture on my projects and create a base layer. By applying gesso over the top the fabric, the fabric stiffens up enough to hold lots of embellishments and medium. Baseboard paint is a quick way of getting a good coverage of paint onto a project as it comes in a spray bottle, and it gets into all the gaps. I also love the way the Glimmer Mist forms little pools with just a gentle sheen. And now I have rediscovered gilding wax, there's no stopping me!

SUBSTRATES: 5 Inch Heart Cookie Cutter. STAMPS: 49 and Market - Gabi's Crackle Texture. INKS: Ranger Wendy Vecchi Archival ink - Thistle. OTHER: WOW! - Flower moulds; Prima - Paper Clay; Mini Art Stones; Art Stones; Classic Treasure Gold; Tattered Angels Baseboard Paint - Wave; Glimmer Mist; Afraid of the Dark; Royal Talens Gesso - White; vintage tablecloth.

## - Ticker <br> By Lou Withers

I stamped into and cut the clocks and cogs from black Sculpey clay. On card, I drew around the heart shaped cutter and then cut it out to create a backing for the clay. I also cut out a strip for the sides.

After baking the clay according to the manufacturer's instructions, I cut away excess clay from the edges and adhered the clocks and cogs to the top and sides of the card.

Next, I added paints and gilding waxes to the surfaces of the clay in several layers, each layer adding depth to the finish. I also added embossing powder to all recessed nooks and repeated the paint and wax layers to bring out the textures by using all the subtle coloured layers.

## A Little Piece of My Heart By Tracy Easson

I decided to create a personalised wonky tonk pin cushion with a girl, words, fabric and paint to inspire me and house all my pins and needles. I began by preparing the surface of the heart cutter for the application of paint. Using sandpaper, I lightly sanded the surface. Next, I stamped my girl onto fabric; it's always best to use a permanent ink pad when stamping on fabric and if you're using acrylics just add a touch of matte medium to it to stop it bleeding into the fabric. With a little fiddling I managed to glue the fabric in place inside the heart before popping a little stuffing in the back and sealing it all up with cardboard and fabric. Every girl has a story to tell so out came the alphabet stamps and ink pad to add some words to complete her.

## Wild Heart By Emilia Sieradzan

I enjoy altering and upcycling objects to give the item a new look and purpose. Here, I decided to change the simply functional metal heart cutter into a heart hanging decoration. It was one of those quick makes! I chose a chipboard embellishment that fitted snuggly into the heart, then added touches of ink. I built up layers of embellishments onto this chipboard, using flowers, leaves and twine. I coloured strips of cheesecloth with green ink, then adhered them to the cookie cutter, creating interest around the sides. Once this was done, I carefully glued the chipboard into the centre of the cutter. An inked word finished the decoration perfectly.

## Materials

SUBSTRATES: 5 Inch Heart Cookie Cutter; Scrapiniec Grapevine 2 Layers Heart Frame; Scrapiniec Brush Art Script - Amazing. INKS: Distress Inks - Peeled Paint; Vintage Photo. OTHER: White gesso; Little Birdie Crafts - Flowers; moss; cheesecloth; micro stones; sisal; glitter; twine.

## —Daydreamer Card By Kyriakos Pachadiroglou

The subtle background was created with a blend of ink and water. The calm background allows the stencilled texture paste design to remain the focus. The stamped design was coloured with ink pads and the help of a water brush pen. The ink pads were pressed on to a nonstick craft mat and then using the water brush pen, I picked up the ink and either mixed it with another colour or diluted it further with the water brush pen. The pearlescent ink pad gives a beautiful shimmer to all colours it's combined with.

## Materials

STAMPS: Ranger Dylusions - Two Heads Are Better Than One DYR48480 INKS: VersaColor - Royal Blue; Indigo; Orchid; Seashell; VersaFine Clair Nocturne; Brilliance - Pearlescent Sky Blue; Memento - Bahama Blue. OTHER: Carabelle Studio stencil Ecriture a la plume; Hobby and Crafting Fun Glass Rocailles Trio - Blue; May Arts Chevron stripe twill ribbon; Tim Holtz Idea-ology - Big Chat stickers; Buddly Crafts - Industrial gears charms; Buddly Crafts - Clear glass domed cabochons; Knorr Prandell Marabou feathers - Sea Blue.

Wistful Dreamer By Carol Johnson
The words 'dreaming of you', and the shade of purple sum up my feelings of melancholy as I think of a friend who is no longer with us, so I grabbed the Mindfulness stamp set and began the card.

I first cut a piece of copier paper in cloud-like undulations and inked against the edge with Tumbled Glass, covering the card with pale billowing clouds. Next I stamped the words in black, and once dry, stamped the feather in VersaMark randomly, leaving the centre free, then embossed in white.

Using a coffee stirrer to give an uneven surface, I covered the angel wings in a thin layer of texture paste, then quickly dusted with lilac and pale blue Mica powders. I then adhered the wings to the card, with a spot of texture paste raising them up slightly. When dry I wrapped a length of pale lilac voile around the card, making sure the little silver hearts didn't obscure the words. This panel was then layered to a piece of purple cardstock before adhering to the card. Inside I added a few clouds at the bottom to finish it off.


Materials
STAMPS: IndigoBlu - Mindfulness 1. INKS: Tim Holtz Distress Ink - Tumbled Glass; VersaMark; VersaFine - Black. OTHER: Purple satin cardstock; white embossing powder; Mica powder - Frosty Forest; Flutterby Wings; lilac voile; angel wings; Daler-Rowney Texture paste.


I Believe In Magic By Jannet Blay
The little hare happened upon a new land, on the very edge of the forest. As soon as he arrived, a beautiful and kind fairy sparkled her magic wand over him.

I began the magical background by dabbing my ink pads onto a gelli plate, keeping the lightest colour in the centre. I then spritzed it with water before laying my card onto it, and peeling back to discover the result.

I coloured all of the die cuts with watercolours. I flicked dots of paint over the pods, and because this is where the fairies live, I also brushed them with glitter and added a little gem. I edged the background with black ink and then adhered it to a square card.

Before adhering the die cuts with foam pads, I stamped the images and the sentiment using VersaFine ink. I placed copy paper over my picture and sketched in the magical line from the sky to the wand. I then cut the line out and used the mask to contain the splatters of watercolour paint. Aerial of course needed glitter on her wings. I then finished by adding some magical tiny stars to the top of the picture.

Materials
STAMPS: Lavinia Stamps - Aerial; Whimsical Hares; Believe In Magic. INKS: Adirondack Dye ink pad - Cloudy Blue; Aqua; Purple Twilight; VersaFine - Black. OTHER: Watercolour paint; Lavinia Stamps Cutting Files - Silhouette House Pods; Bluebell; Spectrum Noir Glitter Brush Pen - Clear; Cosmic Shimmer Stars.

## A Dream Come True By Lynn Brown

To make a magical dream scene for the fairies I blended coloured inks and a tiny amount of glycerine on stamping card. I kept the blue ink to the top of the card for the sky. I then dried the card and sprinkled with water, then after a minute or two, pressed over it with kitchen towel to lift the colour. Next, I stamped the mushrooms at the base of the card and the fairies in the centre. I stamped the stars over the blue area of the card. I used white gesso and my finger to make the clouds and add a little also to just under the fairies feet. Finally, I added a little clear glitter gel pen to the wings, under the fairies feet and where they are holding hands. To finish, I mounted the panel using foundation cardstock.

## Materials

STAMPS: Lavinia Stamps - Fairy Chain; Slender Mushrooms; Stars 1 Miniature; Crafter's Companion - Holly Hobbie A Gift of Love. INKS: Ranger Tim Holtz Distress Oxide - Wilted Violet; Seedless Preserves; Distress Ink - Tumbled Glass; VersaFine Clair - Black. OTHER: White gesso; Crafter's Companion - Sheena Stamping card; clear glitter gel pen, glycerine.

## Butterfly Girl By Marian Zimmerman

First I stamped the girl on a piece of white card with black VersaFine ink.
Next, I masked the girl and stamped the butterfly to give her wings and also stamped the line to ground her. After removing the mask I stamped the little butterflies, circles and flowers with blue and purple ink. The girl was then coloured in with the same colours and a bit of Worn Lipstick for her skin. The card was sponged with blue and purple ink, and I made some dots with the Fineliner pen, and to complete the design, it was glued to a purple card.

## Materials

STAMPS: Crealies - Bits and Pieces stamp 62 Big Grunge Circles; Stampotique - Midge by Janet Klein INKS: Distress Ink - Worn Lipstick; Peacock Feathers; Memento Grape Jelly; Summer Sky; VersaFine - Onyx Black. OTHER: Black Fineliner pen.


## $\rightarrow$ A Life Without Dreams By Majo Wybranietz

Looking at the fabulous image from Viva Las VegaStamps always makes me think of a girl in her fantasies. Falling in love head over heels, daydreaming or just too happy to care about anything else but her dreams. For me the colour blue coordinates with dreams.

I started by applying Distress Ink on white cardstock and spritzed it with a little water, I must say, that I have used this technique so many times over the last years, and I still love the effect!
I applied ink in the same colours with three different stencils. I cut a panel fitting the size of my card base and stamped the image on a separate one. I cut this pretty close to the edge and used bleach to lighten up the girl image. I glued the small panel to the larger one. After I stamped the sentiment on white cardstock, I cut out the words and adhered them to the card. A bit of Ground Espresso Distress Ink on the edges finished my card.

## Materials

STAMPS: Viva Las Vegas - Plate 1470. INKS: Archival - Jet Black; Distress Ink - Tumbled Glass; Broken China; Ground Espresso.

## ZWhat's Kraken? By Riikka Kovasin

I was super excited about this month's theme and colour palette! Turquoises and blues and 'Mythical beings' - I could use this wonderful and cute set from Lawn Fawn!

I started the card by cutting a piece of cream cardstock and stamping the waves and the kraken on top of a separate piece of paper. I also stamped the waves on a Post-it Note and used that to mask the waves when I stamped the little vessel. I coloured the kraken, the sky and the boat using watercolours and the waves using Oxide ink. The air bubbles were stamped with embossing ink and embossed using white powder.

As the focal point I attached the kraken using foam dots and then stamped the greeting on top. I was going for a whimsical look so I stamped the greeting at an angle and mounted the stamped piece on top of two pieces of patterned paper. Lastly I added the layered piece on top of cream cardstock.

## Materials

STAMPS: Lawn Fawn - Lovable Legends. INKS: Archival - Jet Black; WOW! - Ultra Slow Drying Embossing Ink; Distress Oxide - Peacock Feather. OTHER: Lawn Fawn - Let's Polka in the Meadow 6x6 pad; Prima Marketing Watercolor Confections The Classics; WOW! Embossing Powder - Bright White; foam dots.

## AResist Circle Background Tag By Anna-Karin Evaldsson

Stamp the three circle stamps repeatedly on a watercolour tag and white heat emboss. Mist the tag with water and sprinkle PaperArtsy Infusions Coloured Stains on top (A Bit Jaded, Golden Sands and Olive Tree). Mist with more water to blend and add more Infusions if you want to (but you only need very little). The embossing will resist the stains. The colour will pool inside some of the embossed circles, giving a cool effect. You can also use, for example, watercolour paint or Distress Ink.

Die cut a Tim Holtz Sizzix Friendship Word from a tag, ink with Mermaid Lagoon Distress Ink and splash water droplets on top. The branches were die cut with Tim Holtz's Garden Greens set from Sizzix Brite-Ons Shimmery Paper. Tuck them under the small tag together with a piece of burlap and some cheesecloth.

## Circle Flowers <br> By Anna-Karin Evaldsson

Stamp the circles on watercolour paper with embossing ink and heat between. emboss with white powder. You can also use coloured powders, for a different effect. Mist with water and sprinkle PaperArtsy Infusions Coloured Stains on top. Add more water and more Infusions if needed. When the paper is dry, cut out the circles.

Ink a manila card with Distress Ink (Mermaid Lagoon, Ground Espresso, Pumice Stone and Peeled Paint) and mist with water droplets to create texture. Cut a piece of burlap for the ground. Arrange the circles and draw stems with a marker. Adhere most of the flowers with foam tape, and a few directly on the background, for dimension. Distress the edges, die cut a word for the sentiment, and tie the card with a piece of string.

For even more dimensional flowers, layer the smaller circles on top of the large one, as flower centres, adding foam dots in

sentiment, and tie the wiece string.



## $\Delta$ It's Lovely <br> By Trish Latimer

I must admit, a circle is probably my go-to shape when I'm creating a stamped background. The three different sizes of circle that are the covermount stamps this month are so useful, I can't tell you! I have used all three on the background section of my framed project, I've collaged them together randomly at the edges of my colourful painty creation. The smaller circles were used on the dress of my whimsy girl. I stamped two girls, and cut out the dress of one to glue on top of the other. This was because I wanted my circles to overlap the edges of the dress, and trying that on just the one layer would have resulted in circles in the poor girl's hair!

## Totally Transparent By Ingrid Vichova

Creating a high impact and a high contrast project is always a must for me. I love using bright colours and offsetting them with black and white. I also love using transparent materials.

Alcohol inks always come out bright and vibrant but using them in combination with vellum works beautifully. I first applied the ink onto an A4 piece of clear vellum and stamped the flowers onto another piece and heat embossed in white. To add sparkling accents, I foiled the areas where the alcohol ink pooled and remained sticky. I wanted a bit more gold though, so I cheated a bit by using a glue pen and dabbing a little more foil on top. Fussy cutting and layering the flowers made them stand out from the inky background even more.

## Materials

STAMPS: Honey Doo Crafts Layered Blooms; Mama Elephant - Many Thanks. INKS: Tim Holtz Alcohol Ink - Turquoise; Limeade; Amethyst; Patina; Mermaid; VersaMark ink pad; VersaFine ink pad - Onyx Black OTHER: Blending Solution; WOW! Embossing Powder; Tonic Studios - Nuvo Glue Pen; Lucy's Little Things - Iridescent Jewels.

## DESIGNER TIP...

Apply double sided adhesive sheet on the back of the entire inked panel and adhere flat onto the white cardstock. You won't see any adhesive behind and the white will help the colours pop even more!


## A Floral Fancies <br> By Ingrid Vichova

This time I wanted a little more oomph to the flower, so I traced the full petals onto the inked vellum paper and cut them out. I then heat embossed the outline of the flowers in white on clear vellum. By stacking the various layers, I managed to create a fun flower, and embellished with a jewel in the centre it made my note card even more special.

## Happy Birthday Flower! By Samantha Read

To create the background I gently dabbed the Distress Ink pads, one at a time, on my craft sheet to leave a little ink which I then spritzed with water. By gently placing a card blank on to this you can achieve a lovely watercolour effect in no time at all. The main colour is the neutral Pumice Stone and the accent colours are Peacock Feathers and Fired Brick. To add more details to the watercolour background I stamped different elements of the Layered Blooms stamp set in all colours and also added the sentiment. Any sentiment could be used as flowers are suitable for any occasion. The blooms were stamped and coloured with the same inks and sticky gems in the flower centres finish my card.


## Materials

STAMPS: Honey Doo Crafts - Layered Blooms. Stampotique - Happy Birthday; Doilie; Vintage Bill; Barcode Text. INKS: Ranger Archival - Jet Black; Watering Can; Ranger Distress Ink - Pumice Stone; Peacock Feathers; Fired Brick. OTHER: Sticky gems; Prismacolor Pencils; White Posca Pen; Imagination Crafts Metallic Paint - Diamond; Martha Stewart Paint - Raspberry Ice; Pond; White.

## <Just for you Petal! By Samantha Read

I wanted this card to be as different as possible to my other card to show just how versatile these lovely stamps are. Here, black and white are the neutrals, allowing the bright pinks and blues to pop off the card. The background is made using paint and the blooms were stamped and coloured using Prismacolor pencils before adhering in place. It's always a good idea when working with lots of components, to lay them out in the chosen composition before adhering in place. White and silver paint splats along with white paint pen accents add the final details.

## Love This Life By Tracy Evans

Add low tack tape around the edges of the kraft card. Blend white acrylic paint around the aperture, applying the paint with your finger. Repeat the same process with Brushed Corduroy and Vintage Photo Distress Paints. Aim to keep the darker colour around the edges for definition and shading. Dry with a heat tool. Add delicate splatters of paint and dry with a heat tool. Remove tape.

Stamp the Layered Bloom onto book paper. Ink the silhouette stamp with Vintage Photo Distress Oxide and stamp onto vintage book pages, also stamp a second generation image to give lighter stamping. Repeat this process five times. Cut out the flowers. Ink the detailed, outer edge flower with black archival ink and stamp the detail onto one of the silhouette images. Layer the flowers together to create a dimensional flower. Add a pearl to the centre and draw a stem for the flower using a Pitt pen. Add the flower to the top of the stem.

Draw a scribbly line around the edges of the design and add delicate splatters of paint using a white Posca pen. Adhere the Quote Chip.


## Materials

STAMPS: Honey Doo Crafts - Layered Blooms. INKS: Archival Ink - Black, Saffron; Distress Oxide - Vintage Photo. OTHER: Pitt Pen Black; White Posca Paint Pen; white gel pen; vintage book pages; Distress Paints - Brushed Corduroy, Vintage Photo; Dina Wakley Heavy Body Acrylic Paint - White; Prima Watercolor Confections - Tropicals; Pearls; Tim Holtz Idea-ology - Quote Chips.

## C Collect Beautiful Moments By Tracy Evans

Stamp three flower heads onto watercolour card using black archival ink. Colour flower heads with Prima watercolour paints, applying the lightest colour first and then adding layers of deeper colour and blending with water. Puddle the colours to add layers of each colour to give depth and dimension to each of the flowers. Cut out flowers and add to another piece of watercolour card. Draw stems for each flower with a Pitt pen. Add delicate splatters of watercolour paint to the background and dry with a heat tool. Apply Saffron archival ink around the edges of the decorative panel and then layer onto black card. Add Quote Chip to the bottom of the flowers.

# Burlap 

## Use rustic burlap fabric in a variety of different ways to craft gorgeously tactile creations! By Helen Chilton

In this masterclass I demonstrate lots of different ways of using burlap in your mixed media artwork. Here I have used the brown hessian type as well as some cream burlap that I found in Hobbycraft. You can also buy brightly coloured burlap or, of course, dye it yourself.

Being an open weave fabric, burlap is interesting to work with. The surface is very textured, so stamping is a challenge, but I discovered that if you stamp in colour and then emboss in the same colour it seems to strengthen the image. If you just want to stamp, choose your images carefully, small and solid designs work best, like letters.

Burlap material also takes stencilling really well, especially with spray inks and mediums. In my projects I've used gloss gel medium to create a resist and for foiling. This gives you more ways of customising your burlap.

## Masterclass:

## Burlap

Technique 1: Stamp and Emboss

Embossing over stamping enhances the images and makes them stronger


1 Stamp in a black ink, pressing firmly. Small stamps work best.

2 Add black embossing powder and heat. Do not hold heat gun too close as you can burn the burlap.

3 Try stamping in colour with small solid stamps.

## Technique 2: Stencilling

Spray ink gives a really good stencilled image as it soaks in, not under. You could also use paint and ink pads.


1 Iron the burlap and place stencil on top.
2 Spray ink over stencil on top of burlap.
3 Remove stencil to reveal the defined pattern. Print inky stencil onto paper to use up extra ink.

## Technique 3: Foiling

Add foiling to the surface of the burlap by first applying a layer of medium. Instead of sinking into the material it sits on top.


1 Spread gloss gel medium through the stencil with a palette knife and leave to dry completely.
2 The gel disappears on the surface. Heat with a heat gun to make it sticky.

3 Foil the stencilling while hot. Work on a small section at a time.

## Technique 4:

 Stencilled ResistGet more from your stencils by creating a reverse pattern resist.


## Technique 5: Threading and Weaving

This is a great way to frame your images and add decoration. You can weave with anything: ribbon, wool, paper, beads,

buttons, lace, plastic etc


1 Pull out threads from the side of the burlap to create a channel for weaving. The more threads you pull, the wider the channel.

2 Here you can see I've pulled out several threads to make different width channels. Get some wool and ribbons ready.

3 Thread the ribbon on a needle and weave through threads of the burlap channel.


## Art Board

Stamp the PaperArtsy Mini onto brown burlap and emboss in black. Thread and weave in beads and ribbons. Spray blue and purple Dylusions
inks through a stencil onto cream
burlap panel. Stencil gloss gel onto corners and, when dry, heat and foil. Add brads and eyelets.

## Further Ideas

## < Notebook Cover

For the front panel, stencil gloss gel onto cream burlap to create a resist and leave to dry. Spray with blue and purple inks and blot to reveal text. Thread and weave ribbons and beads. For the back cover, spray ink through a stencil onto cream burlap.

Fray edges that are going to be next to wire binding and stick burlap onto covers with Mod Podge.

Retailer Project: Dawn Bibby on p. 32

This month we were graced with the presence of the wonderful Dawn Bibby! She treated us to a couple of bold and beautiful card creations. We have chosen this close-up shot because we just love her use of dimensional layering as it helps to bring her whimsical floral designs to life.


## Dazzling Daisies on p. 18

You would think that adding a layer of wax over colour would subdue it to a much paler tone but instead Emma Godfrey has shown that it actually gives colour a slightly faded and dreamy effect whilst allowing the brightness to shine through. We love this idea and combined with quirky florals it's so exciting and fresh!


Masterclass on p. 70
This issue Helen Chilton plays with burlap. A particularly effective technique is stencilling with spray inks. The bright ink soaks into the burlap to leave strong saturated colour with the added texture of the weave of the fabric. Here Helen has also used stencilled medium to create a resist and ensure crisp lettering.


## Botanical Notes on p. 6

Effectively combine imagery with delicate inky layers by using collage papers, Remnant Rubs, inks and Distress Resist Spray, just like Kath Stewart. The finished result is outstandingly beautiful and so very intricate. We could admire the lovely mixture of tiny script, botanical rubs and pastel colours for hours and still find more to look at!


Retailer Project: That's Crafty! on p. 48

Inspired by a tree completely covered in butterflies (what a sight!), That's Crafty! designer, Laura Holland crafted a project that looked like a section of an old tree adorned by a cluster of butterflies. This gorgeous close-up shows the fluttering dimensional wings from another angle; they look like they could fly away at any moment!


Retailer Project: Stamper Grove on p. 22
To finish her bold double reverse canvas project, Stampers Grove designer, Lorna Figures carefully added a selection of Dina Wakley Collage Words with gel medium. The tissue paper sentiments have been delicately applied so that they melt beautifully into the extremely textured background. The perfect finishing touch to this powerful piece.

Q
Do you think your stamping/mixed media style has changed since you began stamping, and if so, how? I still love the look of clean and simple cards but now I like to experiment more with adding colour using simple inking techniques.

Do you have a 'go-to' technique that you love to use?

AI have lots of fun techniques I like to use but my go-to has to be the one I show on my blog that I call 'Acetate Inking'. It is easily done with a single piece of acetate, inks and a spray of water.

Do you have a favourite colour combo?
Anyone who knows me will tell you how much I love to create using blue. (I actually get teased when my cards have no blues on them!) I also like to add greens and purples to the mix of blues.

QInks or paints? Or both?!
A I love my Distress Inks/Oxides and can't be without them. Since they blend with water, I find them so easy and fun to create with.

Can you remember the first stamp you ever bought... And do you still use it?

AI think one of the first stamp sets I bought was a Stampin' Up set called Petal Prints. It is a great flower set and I could get the look of watercolour using it. I still have it in my stash.
"My card was a fun adventure to try and combine stencilling and stamping to create a collage background. It is a great way to get more mileage from your stamps too! I like my cards to have a nice crisp border so I masked the edges then did a stencil monoprint by rubbing the back of the stencil from The Crafter's Workshop with Peeled Paint Distress Ink, sprayed with water and pressed onto my cardstock. Next, using stamps and the same ink colour, I randomly stamped, adding interest to the background to create a collage effect. I stamped this great fern and sentiment from Art Journey with black Memento ink and mounted it all onto a white card front." <br> \title{

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
