'No culture crisis' for struggling Eels

■ELS forward David Gower has slammed media speculation suggesting there's a culture problem at the club after his side slipped to their ninth loss to sit in last spot on the ladder after 11 rounds.

Initially tipped to challenge for the premiership, the Eels must now win at least 10 of their remaining 13 games if they want to feature in the finals. It's a massive fall after finishing in the top four last year, but the players and coach Brad Arthur are adamant their season

While they're willing to accept criticism of their on-field performances, players are furious that their culture has been questioned in recent weeks.

"It hurts because they [the media] aren't in the dressing room five days a week. They've got no idea," Gower told Big League.

"When you're on the bottom of the ladder, the media is going to talk because it sells papers. It's frustrating because we know it's not true, so the only thing we can do is go out there and win and that will silence the noise.

"We know what we've got here, but unfortunately the media scrutiny comes with the territory. When you're coming last, you've only won two games and there are a lot of expectations, people are going to talk. We know it's not true, and we know that if we win two or three games then the noise stops. It's that simple.

"We just block it out. When we go out on the training pitch or the field, I'm not thinking about it because I know it's not true."

Back-to-back wins over the Sea Eagles and Wests Tigers had fans dreaming of a trademark Parramatta resurgence, but three-straight losses has them back in a hole with time quickly running out as they try to keep in touch with the top eight.

With their backs against the wall, the Eels won't have much time to dwell on last week's disappointing loss to an under-strength Warriors team before they take on the Broncos at Suncorp Stadium on Thursday.

While the odds are stacked against them, Gower refused to give up on the season and said the short turnaround coupled with some time out of Sydney would serve the team well.

The Eels claimed a huge 52-34 win in Brisbane last season, and Gower knows a similar result would be the spark his side needs to turn things around.

"I still feel like we're a high-quality team, but we're lacking confidence and we're missing out on key moments and that's costing us," he said.

"The good thing for us is that it's a short turnaround. We need to go back and do the video and work out what went wrong. To get away from Sydney and be together is a good thing, but we just need to be better and get wins for our fans."

Dugan declares he's done enough

utility back and New South Wales
regular Josh Dugan is confident
he's already proved himself to
new coach Brad Fittler.
The incumbent Blues centre

eturned to the paddock for the harks on Sunday a week earlier than expected after being sidelined with a foot injury. Despite missing two weeks during the most crucial time for Origin hopefuls, Dugan said he doesn't need to play to keep his position because his past performances in the Blues jersey are enough to justify his selection.

"I don't think it's so much about proving myself, I've done that. I don't think I've played a bad game for New South Wales and my form for Australia has also been pretty good. Any time I'm on the field I feel like I'm doing all right and my form's been pretty good when I've been out there, but I've just

got to keep playing footy and keep doing the best job for the Sharks," Dugan told *Big League*.

If the 28-year-old was to get the call up into Fittler's squad, Dugan said the foot injury wouldn't cross his mind and he would be willing and able to make his 13th Origin appearance at the Melbourne Cricket Ground on June 6.

"I didn't feel my foot at all (in Sunday's game). I wouldn't have played if I felt it during the week. I ran all week and did all my rehab. The medical staff are happy and they gave me the green light to play," he said. Dugan has played both in

Dugan has played both in the centres and at fullback for New South Wales and the same flexibility has been required at the Sharks this season. A number of injuries early on required a few shake-ups to the spine, but despite his ability to play both positions, it's the custodian role that Dugan likes most.

"I'm happy to play wherever but I'm really enjoying my time playing at fullback – I love it. It's good and it's only going to get better. At the start of the year there was a bit of chopping and changing, but now we've got the flow and continuity and everyone knows their role."

Greenberg backs bin bonanza

NRL CEO Todd Greenberg has defended his referees following 14 sin bins and a sendoff last weekend. It was the first time in the NRL era that a player was marched for 10 minutes in every game of the round.

This season alone we've already seen 49 sin bins, eclipsing last year's total figure of 46. In 2016 there were just 17 players marched and 13 the year before.

Greenberg said the NRL will continue to use the sin bin as a tool to clean up the game, believing it hasn't been overused in 2018.

"I don't think it is being overused," the NRL CEO said.

"This time last year I heard calls from players, coaches, fans and commentators, about putting more people in the sin bin for repeated offences. That's exactly what we're doing, and we're going to keep doing it until such time as the players continue to follow the rules."

The game's boss believes the referees' crackdown with penalties has been successful so far this season and they're not going to change their ways.

"We will hold our nerve," Greenberg said.

"I'm hoping that obviously it gets better and better, and there's a pragmatic approach from both the players and the referees. We've found that balance over the past few weeks, so let's hope it continues to improve.

"The directive is simple – ensure players make a genuine attempt to play the ball with their foot, and get them back 10 metres – police the rules. We're going to continue to do this, and when there are multiple infringements, we're going to continue to send players to the sin bin. Ultimately, we're trying to do one thing and one thing only – give the fans a better game to watch."

O'Neill backs Coote comeback

NORTH Queensland centre Justin O'Neill has thrown his support behind teammate Lachlan Coote after the first-choice fullback was sensationally dropped for last weekend's clash against South Sydney.

Coote, who was one of the heroes of their 2015 premiership win, was demoted to the Cowboys' feeder team Mackay Cutters and looks to be on the outer at the club – but O'Neill thinks the custodian will be back in the side soon.

"He's been such a valuable player to the club for a number of years now and we want him in the squad and we want him playing his best footy," O'Neill told *Big League*.

"It's tough seeing teammates put back to reserve grade, but he'll work hard and when he deserves to be back, we'll see him back in our side."

The former Queensland representative believes the fullback still has plenty to give.

"He's one of the smartest fullbacks in the competition and he's safe under the high ball. He adds an attacking spark when he's out the back and he's good at steering the boys around," O'Neill said.

Coote's manager Mark Stewart admitted the Windsor junior is likely to be on the move in 2019, but said his client knows he's still wanted in Townsville.

"We're starting to put the feelers out to see what options are available to him, but at the moment, there's not a great deal," Stewart said.

"We'll see what happens, but he knows he's still going to be needed [at the Cowboys]."

Meanwhile, O'Neill praised 19-year-old Enari Tuala, who played his first NRL game of the year last weekend against the Rabbitohs.

"I thought he did a really good job. He had the tough job of marking Greg Inglis and did really well," O'Neill said.

Warriors wary despite strong start

THEY'VE been perennial slow-starters for as long as you can remember, but a new-found confidence has the Warriors just one win off top spot nearing the midway point of the NRL season.

Not since their grand final run back in 2002 have the Warriors enjoyed such a strong start to the season, with an 8-3 record following a backsagainst-the-wall away victory over the Eels.

Veteran Simon Mannering (above) has experienced the highs and lows of the rollercoaster ride that comes with being a Warrior, and the former skipper isn't getting carried away despite their stunning form through 11 rounds.

"I'm not going to try to compare past seasons to what we're doing now because there's still so long to go before we can even start thinking about finals." Mannering told *Big League*.

"Time will tell because we're nearing the midway stage of the competition and you've already seen that it doesn't matter where teams are on the ladder; if you're slightly off, you get found out.

"We're not getting ahead of ourselves because we know each week presents a new challenge."

Mannering said the Warriors took pride in the fact they were able to win despite not playing anywhere near their best against the Eels. What made the victory even sweeter was that they were without stars Shaun Johnson and Roger Tuivasa-Sheck and were tipped to lose after being belted at home the previous week.

Their ability to bounce back from adversity has been a shining light this season and Mannering believes the new-found calmness around the club will hold them in good stead.

"I definitely feel like we're getting better as a group at not letting past performances dictate our focus," he said.

"We've dwelt on losses too long in the past and that hurt us. It's good to be disappointed by a loss, but there's no point kicking stones for a week.

"The Rabbitohs are one of the form teams of the competition. It's no secret that they play off the back of their forwards and then use speed guys with plenty of skill, so our focus is on stopping that and ensuring we get a win for our fans after a disappointing loss at home a few weeks ago."

Mark Hughes

Can you take us back to 2013 when your journey began?

I was 36 years of age, had three children under 10 and was fighting fit. Out of nowhere, I had some serious headaches, and before I knew it, I was receiving surgery to remove a tumour and then I was going through radiation and chemotherapy. My life changed very quickly, and suddenly I was a high-grade brain cancer patient. It was a big shock to everyone. but that's what I was presented with. Along with my wife, Kirralee, we decided that we needed to make a difference and fight for finances for brain cancer. I needed it, and so many other people need answers. The Foundation has come a long way since. As far as my health goes, I get scans every four months, it's a battle that continues. No one is going to tap me on the shoulder and tell me that I'm in the clear, because that doesn't happen with brain cancer. How did you react when you first heard the news?

It's natural when you first get diagnosed to think 'why me?' but I quickly dusted myself off and realised no one deserves brain cancer. Unfortunately, it doesn't discriminate and most families are touched by it. These were the cards I was dealt and I had to make the best out of them that I could.

Matt Callander played a huge role in making Beanie for Brain Cancer Round an enormous event last year. What does the support of the rugby league community mean to you?

It's meant the world to me. It's given people with brain cancer hope, and shows them that people care. Matt was a highly-regarded Channel Nine employee who was known throughout the rugby league community. He was the one who brought this whole round together. He brought the networks together, all the radio stations, all the papers and all the clubs. Matt was in the coalface of brain cancer at the time, yet he chose to do this and brought it all together. Matt won't be with us this year, but his family will be right beside us,

and we're going to do everything we can to honour his legacy. I can't thank the NRL enough for giving us this opportunity. The clubs have all jumped on board, and seeing the players wearing those beanies on the field is surreal. People with brain cancer see guys like Johnathan Thurston really care about them and are keen to help make a difference. Most importantly, I'd like to thank the rugby league community in general. It was inspiring to see everyone at the grounds last year wearing a beanie. It was heart-warming, and we're so excited for what we're going to do this year. If people want a beanie, they can buy them at the ground, online or at Ritchies Supa IGA stores in NSW and Queensland.

You raised \$1.75 million last year and are aiming to better than in 2018. How much did that help the Mark Hughes Foundation, and what are you hoping to achieve in the coming years?

Last year was a game-changer for us. We were able to put on the Matt Callander Fellowship at the Royal North Shore Hospital in Sydney. Matt got to meet the researchers before he passed away, and that meant a lot to him. We've committed \$2.5million over the next five years to the Australian Brain Cancer Mission, and the government has matched that dollar for dollar. We're building two serious brain cancer hubs in Newcastle and Sydney that allow the researchers all the tools they need. It has a bio bank which has lots of tissue samples from patients' tumours and we're building a library of that, and we're giving them all the tools they need. Our big aim is to fast-track clinical trials. A lot of stuff happens in the lab, but we need to fast-track these clinical trials so we can get some answers and check if we're on the right track so people like myself and everyone else in the community can get these benefits. Not having any real change to outcomes in the past 20 years isn't good enough. There are other cancers that have made huge improvements, and that's what we're aiming to do.



THIS WEEK IN RUGBY LEAGUE HISTORY... By Will Evans

1978 MANLY THUMP LADDER LEADERS

MANLY dished up some food for thought to in-form Cronulla courtesy of a 27-8 thrashing at Endeavour Field.

The Sharks had been riding high in their first season under Norm Provan, losing just one of their first nine games to sit atop the NSWRL premiership ladder.

But they had no answer to the Sea Eagles' sizzling attack. Young winger Simon Booth scored three of their five tries, while British forward John Gray – who joined Manly from Norths in the off-season – slotted six goals with his unorthodox around-the-corner style.

Cronulla's cause was hampered by the send-off of front-row enforcer Dane Sorensen, with Manly capitalising on the one-man advantage to turn a 13-5 scoreline into an emphatic win.

The keen rivals both finished in the top three before the Sharks ousted the Sea Eagles 17-12 in week one of the finals. But the Sea Eagles walked a September tightrope all the way to the grand final, trouncing the Sharks 16-0 in a midweek replay after the initial decider finished in a draw.

1990 BLUES REGAIN CROWN IN MELBOURNE FIRST

IN the first Origin match to be played outside NSW and Queensland, a 25,800-strong crowd was on hand to witness the Blues end years of interstate torment with a 12-6 triumph in Game Two at Melbourne's Olympic Park.

After missing the 8-0 series-opening loss with injury, Wally Lewis returned to captain the Maroons but the three-time defending Origin champs were left to lament wayward passing as Ricky Stuart and Brad Mackay scored intercept tries.

The flashpoint came in the dying minutes, however, when the scores were locked at 6-all. Queensland halfback Allan Langer was controversially penalised for stripping the ball from Glenn Lazarus to allow NSW to regain the lead via a Rod Wishart goal.

The ever-outspoken Lewis described referee Greg McCallum's call as "the bummest decision of all time."

The result was a personal victory for legendary coach Jack Gibson, who was at the helm for the Blues' demoralising 3-0 series defeat a year earlier, while Penrith prodigy Brad Fittler (right) became Origin's youngest-ever player at 18 years and 114 days.



2001 TALLIS IN LIMBO AFTER HARROWING DISCOVERY



THE career of Brisbane and Queensland captain Gorden Tallis hung in the balance after he revealed a life-threatening spinal cord defect would sideline him for the remainder of the season.

The announcement came just three weeks after his rampaging man-of-the-match performance in leading the Maroons to a 34-16 victory in the State of Origin series opener.

The issue was discovered when Tallis (*left*) suffered pins and needles following a heavy tackle from Northern Eagles forward Adam Muir, and was similar to the condition that forced his former St George team-mate Nathan Brown into retirement earlier in 2001.

But Tallis underwent successful spinal surgery and returned during the ensuing pre-season trials, captaining Australia for the first time in 2002, skippering Queensland in two more Origin series' and playing a further three NRL campaigns for the Broncos before hanging up the boots.



STUFF YOU MAY HAVE MISSED



SPEED – it's a talent in rugby league you just Scan't coach.

How exciting was it in Round 11 to watch the efforts of James Roberts for the Broncos? How good was Kalyn Ponga's runaway try against the Titans? What about Matt Dufty for the Dragons against the Raiders?

And there's plenty of others we've seen sizzle lately in the NRL like Josh Addo-Carr, Suliasi Vunivalu, Alex Johnston and Bevan French.

What fan wouldn't want to see a race between our quickest stars?

Well let me tell you, 2018 marks 40 years since we held the rugby league Olympics. Most of the game's leading players from the 12 clubs at the time gathered on a Wednesday night in April, 1978, to compete for a lucrative prize purse of \$10,000.

And it wasn't just an event to find league's fastest man. There were also distance races and tests of strength and endurance. All of the action was televised.

The players competed in full team kits with a few standout stars to emerge. Balmain's Larry Corowa won the 100-metre sprint and the title of rugby league's fastest man, beating Manly's Russell Gartner and South Sydney's Terry Fahey.

Meantime, North Sydney winger John Vandenberg proved quite the athlete, taking out the 800 and 1,500-metre double.

In the strength tests, the Penrith forward pack beat the Roosters in the final of the tug-o-war, Manly giant Steve Knight was crowned league's strongest man after beating Bob McCarthy in the Indian arm wrestle, and Norths Peter Schofield took out the goal-kicking contest.

And another thing...

How good was the battle between Latrell Mitchell and James Roberts last week? We rarely get to see individuals duke it out given how structured teams are, but these two attacking weapons just went at it until the final whistle. Latrell was brilliant in the first half but 'the Jet' got him when it mattered most. There's been a lot of talk about both of them playing State of Origin, but I still have my reservations. Euan Aitken is my right centre, so there's only room for one more. Roberts is explosive but we need to see more than just one or two big plays from him. Mitchell has all the talent but I can see Queensland getting under his skin and forcing a big error. They could win us a game, but I'd like to pick someone who will win us the series.

T pains me to say this, but I'm putting a line through Parramatta. That doesn't mean their season is over, but they will not win the premiership in 2018.

Anything but a grand final is a disappointment for any club, and even if Parra can somehow go on a run to scrape into the eight, I can't see them doing any damage. Unfortunately, the style of footy they're playing at the moment just isn't good enough.

I think everyone is scratching their heads wondering where it's all gone wrong for them this year. Semi Radradra was their go-to man who would get them out of trouble whenever they needed a big carry, and his departure has left a gaping hole in their attack. But he's only one player and the boys have had plenty of time to work it out.

The combination of Mitch Moses and Corey Norman isn't firing like it was last year. Clint Gutherson has had a slow start to the season because of injury, and reliable guys like Michael Jennings have been coming up with silly mistakes. That's been a real issue across the board and it's costing them penalties, points and wins.

I don't think all of the players are concentrating out there. The gameawareness just hasn't been up to scratch and it's costing them at crucial stages.

Young Tepai Moeroa still has a lot to learn about the game. There were moments last week when he wasn't tying in hard enough on the inside, and that just puts pressure on the defensive line. The Warriors caught him out a few times not coming off the line hard enough and that led to the Issac Luke try at the end.

The easy solution would be to bring in rookies and blood them for future years. I wouldn't mind seeing a couple of fresh faces if they lose another game or two because that will give a rocket up the arse of some of the older guys who need to improve, but I think the current group deserves a chance to turn things around. Knowing those players, they won't put the cue in the rack and concentrate on next year, and Brad Arthur won't allow it either.

A lot of people gave up on us in 2006. We'd

only won three games after 14 rounds and could have easily given up. You don't like seeing negative stuff written about you, especially when people question whether you're having a dig.

Something just clicked after that and we went on a huge run to sneak into the finals. The same thing happened in 2009. We had a really slow start to the year but found form on the back of Jarryd Hayne and went all the way to the grand final.

We're all waiting for that to happen with this year's Eels. We know they've got the talent and the right group of players, but they're missing the secret potion they need to make it work. They're not going to wear a team down like the Melbourne Storm. They've got guys who can turn a game with individual brilliance, but guys like Bevan French and the halves need to back themselves to produce the big plays.

I feel for the boys. I love to see them winning because I'm a fan of the club. There's nothing worse than when there are huge expectations on you but you don't deliver. I can see them trying and I know the effort is there, but sadly, 2018 won't be their year.

It's happened again – a week of monster scores from Fantasy guns has helped a stack of coaches cross the magical 1,000-point barrier.

HE tidal wave of points this week was led by a couple of the Fantasy buys of the year in Damien Cook (84) – who plenty of people appointed as captain for a whopping 168-point haul – and Jai Arrow (74) whose rib and back complaints look to be under control for now.

The big-name Fantasy fullbacks had a strong week too with **Kalyn Ponga** (77) lighting up and **James Tedesco** (64) busting plenty of tackles.

Andrew Fifita (65) and Martin Taupau (63) propped up some big scores and coaches got some serious value out of **Tevita Pangai's** move out wide as he played 80 minutes for 66 despite a sin-bin right at the death.


A few coaches lost patience with Pangai earlier in the season while he was injured or on the bench but with **Matt Gillett**, **Josh McGuire** and now **Alex Glenn** and **Korbin Sims** injured he is a critical man in the Brisbane pack.

Speaking of 80-minute back-rowers, **Rhyse Martin** has gone from strength to strength since scoring with his first touch in the NRL three weeks ago. Martin made a staggering \$89,000 this week and has now jumped \$215,000 in value in three weeks with plenty more to come. Martin's attacking play has been the key to his hefty numbers with four tackle-breaks and five offloads added onto his 26 tackles and 154 metres the perfect recipe for Fantasy success.

There has been a Fantasy form spike from Knights five-eighth **Connor Watson** (60), who now has a three-game average of 56. His \$76,000 price boost was the second-biggest gain of the round and with Fantasy halves dropping like flies he could be a genuine option in the short-term.

Speaking of halves, the conundrum facing coaches has only gotten tougher this week.

Shaun Johnson is still out, Nathan Cleary and Ryan Matterson both have huge break evens and will be much cheaper in a few weeks. Cleary is also an Origin chance.



Arguably the best option at the moment is **Daly Cherry-Evans** but he could also be set for a dip in scoring given **Trent Hodkinson** is set to take goal-kicking (and potentially some generalplay kicking) away from the skipper.

Plenty of coaches – myself included – jumped on **Brock Lamb** (32) over the past fortnight only to see him cop a fractured cheek and a month out. Manly hooker **Api Koroisau's** (26) role in the Melbourne melee didn't just ruin his score via a sin bin but also sidelines him for a week which isn't great for coaches using him as a half.

For me, Cherry-Evans is the safe solution for the many coaches facing a halves crisis this week with Watson a riskier option. Titans rookie AJ Brimson (45) is a possible cash cow while Eels fullback Clint Gutherson (39) is well down on his starting price and could be a cut-price dual-position keeper if the Eels find some form.

Fight for the tensor

The clash between the Panthers and Dragons on Saturday isn't just a top-of-the-table contest, it's a chance to stake Origin claims and determine the best combinations in the game right now.

EFORE a ball had been kicked this season, few predicted much success for Penrith and St George Illawarra.

At the foot of the mountains there were multiple reports of drama and off-field conflict following the departures of local juniors Matt Moylan and Bryce Cartwright, while their pre-season form was poor. They lost convincingly to an understrength Bulldogs side, adding fuel to the fire that coach Anthony Griffin would be hooked within the opening weeks of the season.

Dragons coach Paul McGregor was in a similar position, starting the year under pressure after his side dramatically missed the finals at the last hurdle in 2017. Their pre-season form wasn't flash, going down to South Sydney in the Charity Shield and beating Hull FC in a scrappy affair.

But a lot can change in the space of 11 weeks, which is the case for these two sides who are preparing for a top-of-the-table showdown on Saturday.

It's just the third time the Panthers have started the season with an 8-3 record – the other two times being in 1991 and 2003 – premiership-winning seasons. Meanwhile the Dragons have been the form side of the competition, losing just two matches during their best start to a campaign since 2011.

ORIGIN ON THE HORIZON

Of the 26 starting players who will take to Panthers Stadium on Saturday, 12 are genuine State of Origin contenders. With the sides set to be named early next week, Saturday's clash is the last chance these players have to impress selectors – making the game even more enticing.

The Red V have seven Origin hopefuls. Halfback Ben Hunt looks to have secured his place in the Maroons side, while Euan Aitken, Cameron McInnes, Paul Vaughan, Tyson Frizell, Tariq Sims and Jack de Belin are all looking to win over Blues coach Brad Fittler.

Dragons fullback Matt Dufty isn't in contention for a call-up this year, but he believes several of his team-mates deserve a chance on rugby league's biggest stage.

"We've been playing well all season and I'd expect lots of the boys to be selected in the Origin teams when they come out – especially our forward

pack, Our forwards have been pretty good all year, you could pick any of them," Dufty tells *Biq League*.

Five Panthers will be hoping for a phone call from Fittler on Sunday night. James Maloney and Nathan Cleary are in contention for the halves, while Reagan Campbell-Gillard (pictured, below inset), Trent Merrin and Tyrone Peachey are also chances to feature for the Blues.

"Every player dreams of playing Origin and I'm no different,"

Campbell-Gillard says.

"It would mean the world to me if I was selected – it's a goal of mine to play for State of Origin."

Merrin hasn't played for the Blues since 2015, but Fittler has hinted at recalling the Panther – something Campbell-Gillard thinks should happen.

"'Mez' has been there and done that. He's one of my closest mates here, so if there was the chance to play Origin with him, that would be pretty cool."

SIXES & SEVENS

Saturday's match will also showcase two of the competition's premier halves pairings in Gareth Widdop and Hunt for the Dragons, and Maloney and Cleary for the Panthers.

With Cleary missing for eight weeks due to a knee injury and Maloney joining Penrith this year, the duo have played just four club games together – but the five-eighth expects them to fire soon.

"We've still got a lot to work on and we'll get there once we've spent a bit of time together," Maloney says.

"It's great playing with another dominant half with so much strike. Nath doesn't miss a beat."

Maloney says Hunt and Widdop are the form halves in the competition, but he's ready for the challenge against the best this weekend.

"Widdop and Hunt have been great this season. They move the ball well and pose a lot of threats," he says.

"We're going to have to have a good look at them and make sure we can put together another good 80-minute performance."

Dufty agrees with Maloney, saying he wouldn't replace his halves for anyone in the competition.

"'Gaz' and 'Hunty' are the best halves combination in the comp," Dufty says.

"They've been unreal so far this season. They're great with our game management – they take control of the game and it's benefiting us a lot. To play alongside them is an honour. It's also great playing with them because they're helping my game."

BATTLE OF THE BIG MEN

Don't be surprised to see Panthers Stadium shake a little bit when the respective packs collide. They're two of the biggest and best forward ensembles in the competition and will have plenty to prove.

Both sides have been dominant through the middle in 2018, with the Dragons ranking first for running metres and the Panthers third.

Campbell-Gillard knows it's going to be tough coming up against the likes of James Graham, Vaughan, Frizell, Sims and de Belin, but he's adamant the Panthers will be up for the challenge.

"They're the in-form team at the moment so we know it's going to be a challenge," Campbell-Gillard says.

"At the moment our forwards are going really nicely. There are some things we need to work on but I can only speak highly of my forward pack. We'll be up for the challenge on Saturday."

The Penrith prop says they'll deploy their own strike weapon in the form of Fijian forward Viliame Kikau, who has been in red-hot form this season.

"Kiks' is still learning and still developing as a player. He showed the damage he can do when he's put on an edge. He's a massive asset that we can have on our team. If we give him early ball, he'll show us what he can do."

Premierships aren't won in May, but if you take the first 11 weeks as a quide, both these teams should be aiming high in 2018.

Change for the better

It's been a tough few years in the Steel City, but with a coach and team who have immersed themselves in their unique community, the hard yards are paying off. By **GREG PRICHARD**

O really know Newcastle, you've got to live Newcastle.

Nathan Brown used to go there to play for the Dragons against the Knights and knew it was a hard place to win, but arriving the day before a game and leaving the day after, he couldn't appreciate what the place was all about and the special relationship between the people and their team.

He does now though. Brown knew when he got the job as Knights coach ahead of the 2016 season that he had to immerse himself in the city of Newcastle, find out what made the place tick and become one of them.

LAY OF THE LAND

The former star hooker, who had his career cut short by a neck injury at 27 and became a first-grade coach at just 29, drove around the city and surrounding area to familiarise himself with the district and mix with the locals.

He talked at length with club greats, like the Johns brothers, Andrew and Matthew, Danny Buderus and Paul Harragon, to find out what made the club number one in its premiership-winning era of the late 1990s and early 2000s and what they thought it would take to make it top again.

There were no half-measures. No leaving the family behind in Sydney while Brown zipped back to see them as often as he could. It was lock, stock and barrel. He was determined to become Newcastle-ised and unlock the secret for himself.

"It's different to playing in Sydney," he tells *Big League*.

"There, you're playing for your local club and its fans. In Newcastle, you're representing an entire city. When the team is doing well, it's great for the city and the whole of the Hunter, and vice-versa.

"As a player, I used to blow into town and then out again, but when you move up here and look around the place, you realise how beautiful it is. You learn and appreciate its history as a mining town and start to understand the nature of the people.

"You think about the earthquake in 1989 and how the people of Newcastle stick together in times like that. It's a city, but they're really country people. As Newcastle has gotten bigger, I don't think the personality of the people has changed. They're very grounded.

"To me, Newcastle is a combination of the best things from the North Coast of NSW, where I grew up, and the best things about Sydney. It's big enough that it's got everything you need to enjoy living here, but it's also quiet enough that it's not like the rat-race of living in the city.

"The relationship between the team and town is something special. Even when the Knights have struggled on the field, they've continued to draw big crowds. When the chips are down, everyone's in it together. I love living up here and so does my wife and our four kids."

OLD BOYS & YOUNG GUNS

Brown said the former Knights players told him how that fervent and unconditional support helped drive the team on to win titles in 1997 and 2001.

"I learned a lot from Danny Buderus," he says.

"I was working with 'Bedsy' and Craig Smith early on at the club, so I got a really good insight from those guys and also from talking to Matty and 'Joey' Johns and 'Chief' Harragon. "These guys are happy to help when I ask

"These guys are happy to help when I ask them to get involved, whether it's to present jumpers to new players, talk to certain players about how they're going with their footy or give potential signings an idea of why coming to Newcastle would be good for them.

"So many former players have been involved. Mark Hughes, Mark Sargent, Marc Glanville, Matt Gidley and Owen Craigie are among the others. Joey, Matty, Bedsy, Chief and all of these guys can all explain how the community and the team go together as one."

Buderus and the Johns brothers all talked to Kalyn Ponga when Darren Mooney, the Knights' football manager who drives recruitment, and Brown were negotiating with him. Buderus took Ponga and his father to play golf at The Vintage course, near Cessnock.

"It was a great day," Buderus recalls.
"I won our little Skins tournament, but they obviously didn't hold it against me. I showed Kalyn around Newcastle as well and let him get a bit of a feel for the place.

"Kalyn loves the beach and I think he saw Newcastle as a place where he could develop both as a person and a player. His parents and younger sister moved here with him, so he's

a very family-oriented guy.

"Nathan and his beautiful family accepted him into their home for dinner and I think Kalyn could just feel it was going somewhere. He's setting off on his career journey and the



Knights are taking off on their new journey. I think he just wanted to be a part of it.

"Newcastle, the city and football team, ticked all the boxes for him."

Brown says different players came to Newcastle for different reasons, but that they all had one thing in common – they saw it as a great place to live and play football.

"If you're a big-city person, Newcastle may not be for you," he says. "It depends on your circumstances. For Mitchell Pearce, at this stage of his life, a move to Newcastle was great for him. Tim Glasby is coming next year and he has a young family that could grow up here.

"For certain players, Newcastle as a town works out for them, and the ex-players who had a lot of success playing here have been in a position to talk to them about what it's like here for the team and the town when that's happening.

that's happening.
"It's been a bit lean for the Knights in recent years, but we feel like we're heading in the right direction again now."

And Ponga? The Knights obviously knew

he was worth chasing, but is he exceeding their high expectations with his spectacular form in his first full season of first grade after arriving from North Queensland?

"I think the area in which he has exceeded is how consistent he's been," Brown says.

"His ability to consistently perform under pressure. He wants the ball at crucial moments, which, for a kid with – let's be honest – no experience, it reminds you of a much older and more experienced player. He can make tough plays look very simple."

There's only one man who can say he ever replaced Cameron Smith on the Origin stage and he's got some good advice for Queensland's next rake in line. By MARTIN GABOR

OR 15 years there were only three certainties in life: death, taxes and Cameron Smith wearing the No.9 jersey for Queensland.

Taxes remain high and death is still inevitable, but New South Wales received a huge boost last week when Smith stunned the rugby league world by announcing his retirement from representative football.

Having made his State of Origin debut in Game

Three of the 2003 series, Smith went on to play a record 42 matches for the Maroons, missing just one game through injury in his stunning 15-year career.

That game was the series opener in 2010, when the hard-working hooker was ruled out with an elbow injury, opening the door for then-Sea Eagles rake Matt Ballin to make his Origin debut.

Ballin only found out on a Monday night - moments after Manly's game against Parramatta - that he would need to fly to Brisbane as cover for Smith.

"It was funny because Cam and I were rooming together. When I found out that I was in the team, I was happy but I didn't want to be too happy because I thought it'd be disrespectful to him. It was weird because I was so excited to play, but because I was rooming with him, I had to stay pretty grounded," Ballin tells Big League.

"I asked him what to expect and he was really good about it. He was a calm character and just told me that the Maroons picked me because of the way I'd been playing. One of the biggest things he told me was not to try to play like him, but to just be myself.

"He told me that it'd be a big occasion but reminded me that I'd been in grand finals. Those days with him were really calming and gave me a lot of confidence in my ability."

Replacing the irreplaceable should have been the most daunting moment of his career, but for Ballin it was the opportunity of a lifetime as the

Maroons claimed a 28-24 win in greasy conditions.

"I wasn't too worried, I never really expected to get the chance to play for Queensland because Smith was such a machine. I just looked at it as a bonus and an extra game that I got to play," Ballin explains.


'I knew that once he was fit he'd be straight back into the team, so I had nothing to lose. I didn't try to do anything special and just made sure but Ballin concedes it'll be a tough assignment for whoever is called upon to be 'the next Cameron Smith'.

"I think there'll be a bit more pressure on whoever comes in now," he says.

"It's up to whichever individual comes in and dons the jersey because however they want to be perceived as a rep player will be seen in Game One.

"If they come in and make it clear that they're Jake Friend, Jake Granville or Andrew McCullough - not Cameron Smith - then they'll do well. If they come in and think 'I'm replacing Cameron Smith, one of the best players in the history of rugby league' then I think that's when they'll run into trouble.

"I'm sure the selectors and Cam will be all over it and ensure the evolution of the No.9 jersey is a smooth one. I'm sure they'll select them on their own merit and let them play their own style, but in saying that, there will definitely be some pressure on the individual and the team as a whole with no Smith, Thurston or Cooper Cronk."



While Ballin embraced the opportunity with open arms, he knows there'll be more pressure on the next man to step into Smith's shoes. The Melbourne hooker is widely regarded as the most important player in the competition, with Saturday's loss to Manly highlighting how vulnerable a team is without him steering the ship. Smith was suspended for the 2008 Grand Final as the Storm were thrashed 40-0, and Ballin revealed the Sea Eagles grew in confidence that week knowing they wouldn't have to contend with the game's greatest conductor. There's definitely no hard feelings on my end, but I know the Bulldogs have some passionate fans and they might have a different opinion. Either way, good or bad, I'm just going to soak it up and have a good time," he says.

The Tigers utility has wasted no time immersing himself in the culture of his new team, but the Bulldogs junior in him refuses to let go of memories. Reynolds has even dedicated a room to his blue and white possessions according to Frawley.

"He's got his own shrine up in his 'Josh Reynolds' room, with all the Bulldogs merchandise. He'll hate me saying that but it's true, all his jerseys are in there. I'll be trashing that before Sunday to try and get him off his game," Frawley says.

But Reynolds is quick to clarify what he has held onto, not missing a chance to take a shot at his mate.

"I don't know what he's talking about, he's telling fibs. I don't know about my own shrine, it's just memories of my career in there.

I've got jerseys from my debut and Origin, but Frawley's actually got a portrait of himself. He has a mate who is a painter and he's done a couple of portraits of him, I find that a bit weird but whatever," Reynolds says.


Reynolds and Frawley have lived together for a year and a half and the banter between the two is nothing new. It will be every man for himself when they face off on Sunday.

EW Zealand coach Michael Maguire has drawn an early line in the sand, declaring form and players' desire to represent the black-and-white jersey will be the main selection criteria for the upcoming Test against England in Denver.

The former South Sydney mentor was appointed by the NZRL on a four-year deal ahead of fellow applicants Laurie Daley, Des Hasler and Geoff Toovey. He replaces former Adelaide Rams team-mate David Kidwell, who was at the helm of the Kiwis' disastrous 2017 World Cup campaign.

The availability of the likes of Jason Taumalolo and David Fusitu'a, who shunned the Kiwis to play for Tonga at the World Cup, remains uncertain.

Meanwhile, players such as Jared Waerea-Hargreaves have refused to confirm whether they would make the trip to the United States to face England on June 23 if selected.

While not ruling a line through anyone's name at this stage, Maguire won't be giving any player the hard sell to commit to New Zealand.

"I'll look to players who are really keen to play for the jersey," Maguire tells *Big League*.

"Most people want to play in these big games and that's what the international arena demands. The door is open to players, but we'll assess what they want to do and I'm looking for the ones who want to be available for the New Zealand team."

There is also a consensus that under Kidwell, the Kiwis were preoccupied with blooding players for the future and overlooking in-form veterans instead of picking the squad most capable of winning the next Test. That flawed strategy will be abandoned during the Maquire regime.

"We'll be picking the best available players to represent that jersey," Maguire confirms.

"I think every Test is very special and we need to have that extra passion."

Maguire coached the Rabbitohs for six seasons – including a premiership triumph in 2014 – but parted ways with the club after

failing to take the side to the finals in 2016-17.

Although he has taken on various roles with the NRL in the interim, Maguire says having the summer away from coaching reignited his fire to take the reins of a rugby league team again.

"One thing it made me realise is how much I enjoy it. I love the job and I'm very fortunate to do what I do," he says.

"When I wasn't able to coach for three or four months there it made me very hungry. The opportunity to join a team like New Zealand at international level is something I've always wanted to do. With the calibre of players coming out of New Zealand, playing in Australia and even over in the Super League, it was a pretty easy decision to take the job."

Maguire, who was a highly-rated assistant at Melbourne under Craig Bellamy before winning a Super League title with Wigan in 2010, is unquestionably the best-credentialled coach to have taken on the Kiwis role.

He is also just the second non-New Zealander to be appointed to the position, after Daniel Anderson (2003-05).

"I'd like to think that (my experience) is going to give me some great insights into what's required at that level," he says.

"Being able to impart my knowledge on the players is something I really enjoy doing and even though they're short camps, you build good relationships. I'm looking forward to working with some incredible players at the top of their game."

Just choosing a captain – let alone an entire squad – shapes a challenge for Maguire given the depth in the Kiwis' ranks.

"Adam Blair was the captain through the World Cup, you've got Roger [Tuivasa-Sheck], Jesse Bromwich and many others who we'll sit down with and talk about the best strategy for our leadership.

"The big thing I'll be looking to identify for the Denver Test is who wants to be a leader, who wants to be the one to take New Zealand to the highest level."

The 44-year-old makes no secret of his ambition to return to the NRL but he has no qualms about juggling dual roles, as other international coaches have done before.

"I've been very transparent with NZRL chairman Reon Edwards and a number of people at the organisation. I've spoken with them about the passion to get into club-land, but we'll assess that at the time.

"I'm very focused on what I'm doing now and planning where we're going."

He brought the longawaited glory back to Redfern, but can Michael Maguire carry the weight of a nation back from the rugby league wilderness? By **WILL EVANS**






"He's probably one of the best broken field players in the game so the more touches we can get him, the better we're going to be as a side," Dugan told *Big League*.


AN apologetic Dylan Napa has made it clear that he had no intention of injuring Korbin Sims during last week's epic showdown at Suncorp Stadium.

"It's good to be back after being away for a couple of years," he said.


"It's one of my goals to keep playing in the NRL so hopefully it all goes well."

FIVE-EIGHTH James Maloney believes the lack of media attention on Penrith during their shocking injury run has been a blessing for the team.


With several big name players on the sidelines, Maloney feels the Panthers have flown under the radar in 2018 and haven't been distracted.



THERE were highs and lows for Herman Ese'ese last weekend. He scored his first try in Knights colours, but the team fell to their third loss in a row.


Despite the milestone moment, Ese'ese (above) was unhappy with the result and wasn't able to draw too much joy from his four-pointer.

NRL give a LIFT in secondary schools

Last chance to stake Origin claim

HE'S one of the best known players in women's rugby league and the fire still burns deep in the belly for Ruan Sims. With the women's Origin match one month away, Sims feels the same amount of pressure on her position today as when she first started, which is what keeps her driven to succeed.

"I've always felt like that, even when I was young and coming through," Sims says.

"If you lose that, you lose your hunger and your drive and that would be when I decide to hang up the boots. If I lost that hunger I think that would be time for me to give it away."

Sims runs out for NSW Country next week at the National Championship and hopes her performance will be enough to be named for NSW for the Origin match on Friday, June 22.

The Nationals are the last chance NSW and Queensland coaches Ben Cross and Jason Hetherington have to assess the form of their players before naming their Origin squads.

Both coaches have a tough job ahead of them, with talent pools growing as players start to graduate from the junior pathway and into the state leagues.

"I would hate to be 'Crossy'," Sims says.

"He's got some difficult choices ahead.

We have players who have been there and done the work for us in the past and we've

got new girls who are hungry and pushing for selection.


"There might be a few changes, there might not, I'm not sure, but when you have that level of competition pushing through it ensures you stay at the top of your game.

"They're going to be picking the best players for state and country and that's good because it means our game is growing and there are lots of people playing it and we've got the elite of the elite at the top level."

The National Championship is being played at Southport on the Gold Coast from Friday June 1 to Sunday June 3. A talent identification day will be held at Runaway Bay the day before on Thursday May 31.

Cuthbertson's new gig

ROP Adam Cuthbertson has played under some of the most high-profile names in rugby league during his 13-year first-grade career. Des Hasler at Manly, Ricky Stuart at Cronulla and Wayne Bennett at the Dragons and Knights. Each has had an impact.

Now in his fourth season in the UK, Cuthbertson has taken on the role of head coach of Leeds Rhinos' new women's Super League side. The 33-year-old admits he always wanted to coach, but finding the time to do it was key.

"I found myself after training not doing much with my life so I thought I might as well get into it and start finding a hobby outside of working in my own backyard," he says.

"The opportunity was there to get into coaching and it's just been really, really enjoyable."

Under his watch the Rhinos women have made a fast start to the competition, with three wins and one loss from the opening four rounds. Cuthbertson says he hasn't tried to copy the style of a Bennett or a Hasler, but put his own spin on things.

"I haven't really tried to take anyone's actual philosophy of coaching, I've just been picking bits and pieces here and there," he says.

"I've almost learnt the game all over again since playing here. The style of the English game, when the Aussies come over here you've almost got to forget what you knew."

Off-contract at the end of 2018, Cuthbertson is keen to play on next year, hopefully staying with Leeds – he's won two grand finals already in his time there. But he also sees a life with the clipboard in his future.

"One day I'd really like to do it, but in the meantime I'll just take on roles like the women's or the academy team because I've got the time for it. It's a great hobby to have and keeps you on your toes."

On the field, St Helens continue to dominate Super League spurred on by the exploits of Ben Barba. Steve Price-coached Warrington have surged up the ladder, recently going on a 10-game winning streak, while Huddersfield have turned to Simon Woolford to revive their fortunes.



Broncos building impressively

Suncorp Stadium Thursday, 7.50pm

Form: Six days after being swamped by the Sea Eagles and after losing six key players to injury, the Broncos produced a superb effort to defeat the Roosters last Friday. Wayne Bennett's team refused to yield to the Roosters' class and every time they fell behind, they found the desire to hit back. The Eels are in a whole different space, weighed down by a loss of confidence and a realisation that their aspirations for 2018 have fallen flat.

History: There has been an anomaly surrounding this fixture that extends back

a quarter of a century. Since the early years of their clashes, the Eels have enjoyed greater success against the Broncos in Brisbane than they have in their own backyard. The Eels' winning percentage at Brisbane venues sits just under 50 per cent, while their record against the Broncos in Sydney is a dismal 32 per cent. Last year resulted in a rare double for the Eels their first over the Broncos since 2007 - when they won 28-14 at ANZ Stadium and 52-34 in a scoring extravaganza at Suncorp. Kirisome Auva'a created history with a try after 12.8 seconds while Semi Radradra collected

a four-try farewell present ahead of his move to France. **Danger sign:** The scent of Origin may be enough for a handful of Broncos hopefuls to produce their best football with Darius Boyd, Corey Oates, Andrew McCullough and Sam Thaiday all in contention. Only the most optimistic of Eels are likely to be spurred on by the siren song of Origin.

Best Bet? The Broncos have the incentive to win by a wide margin.

Money-spinner: Last week's heroes James Roberts and Jamayne Isaako will have support for First Tryscorer but consider the value of Jaydn Su'A or Andrew McCullough.

Raiders desperate to stop season slipping away


GIO Stadium Friday, 6pm

Form: The Raiders might have been a disappointment in their last home game a fortnight ago against the Sharks but their performance improved dramatically in Mudgee last Sunday and if not for the individual brilliance of Dragons fullback Matt Dufty, the outcome could have been vastly different. The Sea Eagles took advantage of a chaotic display by Melbourne last Saturday night to claim a victory at AAMI Park that suggested the club has moved on from its Gladstone crisis. History: The high point of the Raiders-Sea Eagles history took

place in 1987 when the clubs met in the last grand final to be staged at the SCG. 

Central Coast Stadium Saturday, 3pm


Form: The Roosters' failure to 'close the deal' against the Broncos last Friday suggests they still have work to do to confirm their status as genuine contenders in 2018. After disposing of Manly and the Warriors in consecutive games, there were expectations that the Roosters would run roughshod over a wounded Broncos outfit but despite playing themselves into a winning position, they were unable to go on with the job. Meanwhile, the Titans rebounded from five straight losses with an impressive win over Newcastle. Young halves Ash Taylor and Alexander Brimson

capitalised on some strong work by their forwards and figured in most of the Titans' scoring plays. History: The Titans have proved a thorn in the side of the Roosters over the past decade, winning an equal share of their head-to-head battles (eight each). The Roosters have made up some ground over recent seasons to claim four wins from the past five encounters including home and away wins last year. These teams meet on the Central Coast for the third time with the honours evenly split. The Titans won 24-20 in 2009 and the Roosters prevailing 20-10 in 2015. The 2015 result remains the Roosters' only victory at Central Coast Stadium from their past 10 games played there.

Danger sign: Players from both sides will be determined to make a favourable final impression on their respective State of Origin coaches, with Jai Arrow, Jarrod Wallace and Ryan James among the Titans' hopefuls and Latrell Mitchell, Luke Keary, Boyd Cordner and Dylan Napa in the mix for the Roosters.

Money-spinner: First Tryscorer favourites include Latrell Mitchell and Anthony Don, while Ryan Matterson and Jai Arrow will offer the best value.


powered to their fifth straight win in a stop-start contest with the Bulldogs last Sunday.
