I started doing plays when I was really young and realized that theater is a safe and creative way to explore deep feelings. My daughter [Matilda, 12] is also now doing plays. When I heard about Opening Act through my friend Kristen Bell, I knew I wanted to get involved. It's a free after-school theater program in New York City and Brooklyn, serving public schools that have lower than average graduation rates. The program gives high school students opportunities to develop leadership and community skills and gain confidence. Not only does it tap into the thing I do for a living, but it's in my own neighborhood. I've volunteered in classrooms and spent time with kids in the program. I've watched them

Harvey Weinstein **Arrested for Sex Crimes**

The disgraced movie mogul is charged with rape and sexual assault in two N.Y.C. cases

Harvey Weinstein has been accused of sexual harassment and assault by dozens of women—and now he faces his first criminal charges. On May 25 the former movie studio chief, 66, surrendered to authorities at a Manhattan police precinct. He was charged with first-degree and third-degree rape in one case involving an as yet unnamed woman and with committing a first-degree criminal sex act in another case, an alleged 2004 assault on aspiring actress Lucia Evans, then 20. Prosecutor Joan Illuzzi said that the investigation has "shown that this defendant used his money, power and position to lure young women into situations where he was able to violate them sexually." Weinstein's lawyer Benjamin Brafman told reporters that Weinstein, who has denied any nonconsensual sex, would plead not quilty if indicted by a grand jury. "My client did not invent the casting couch," Brafman said. Weinstein was released on \$1 million bail and will have to wear a monitoring bracelet until trial. If convicted, he could face up to 25 years in prison. Many of his alleged victims praised the arrest. "We were young women who were assaulted by Weinstein and later terrorized by his vast network of complicity," Rose McGowan, 44, said in a statement. "I stand with my fellow survivors." -STEVE HELLING



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

IV Dietland

An entire culture skating on thin ice

COMFOY "I always forget what beautiful eyes you have." This cliché of a compliment is how fashion-magazine editor Kitty Montgomery (Julianna Margulies, with Jessica Rabbit hair) informs a talented writer that she's otherwise not worth looking at. Plum Kettle (Joy Nash), who's been plus-size most of her life, ignores this scarcely camouflaged insult—one of many she endures daily. (An unstated reason for her working

from home is to spare the office her entire body, eyes included.) Besides, she's planning on undergoing weight-correcting surgery. But then Plum begins to comprehend how thoroughly, and damagingly, she's bought into what this daring series refers to as "the dissatisfaction industrial complex," the world of cosmetics and beauty. Enlightenment

is brought about by a group of radical feminists who, in a violent push to the #metoo envelope, are murdering women-abusing men. "We are too smart for the lives we thought we deserved," one of the group's disciples tells Plum. *Dietland*'s premiere nearly collapses from satiric overload—it's like *Death Becomes Her* without the undead—but things start to cohere in the follow-up, especially when we learn the grotesque history of something called the Baptist Diet. This is by no means a pretty topic. (AMC, June 4, 9 p.m.)

Breakout Performance!

Joy Nash
A newcomer who refuses to tolerate fat-shaming

Nash is essential to Dietland—her air of supreme, stupidity-puncturing irony undercuts the endless weight comments thrown at her by, well, virtually everyone. (Nash has confronted this challenge in her own life with a series of YouTube videos called Fat Rant.) Her performance is vulnerable too, of course, but without a drop of self-pity.





MOVIE A Kid Like Jake

DRAMA Four-year-old Jake loves skirts and princesses. Is he transgender? That's not a problem for his liberal Brooklyn parents (Claire Danes and Jim Parsons)—until a stressful private-school search exacerbates their own issues. These are privileged-people problems but relatable-and Danes is great at slowburn frustration. (In limited release June 1, not rated)

IV | Marvel's Cloak & Dagger

FANTASY This enjoyable new superhero series is in no rush to throw its teenage protagonists (Olivia Holt and Aubrey Joseph) up against supervillains. First the kids have to understand and accept their (possibly) complementary powers involving light and dark. It doesn't feel that far off from breaking in a pair of jeans. More fun, though. (Freeform, June 7, 8 p.m.)






MUSIC | Father John Misty, God's Favorite Customer

ROCK After tackling weighty subjects like God and climate change on last year's Pure Comedy, folky rocker Josh Tillman returns to lacerating romantic dispatches on his refreshingly brief fourth LP. Somber, reserved tracks like "The Palace" and "The Songwriter" are among the finest he's written. (June 1)

IV Younger

Back for season 5, Sutton Foster's series still defies age COMEDY. The addictive sitcom picks up right where things left off last year. Fortysomething Liza (Sutton Foster) is still pretending to be a late-twentysomething to keep her job in Manhattan publishing while juggling complicated friendships, romances and who does and does not know her secret. The series continues to deliver a clever mix of comedy and empowerment. The first episode, for example, includes references to sexual harassment and the #MeToo movement (along with fur bikinis and *Game of Thrones*). There might also be a long-overdue reveal on the horizon. (*TVL and, June 5, 10 p.m.)



IV | Pose

Those daring, dazzling, long-ago nights when voguing was in vogue

DRAMA Featuring an enormous cast of transgender, gay and lesbian performers, this fascinating, often flamboyant series from Ryan Murphy is a kind of reverse runway back into 1980s New York City. While there was a killing to be made on Wall Street, the downtown "ball" culture (as documented in the classic 1990 documentary Paris Is Burning) was a glorious expression of life for racial minorities further outlawed by sexual orientation. These were fashion face-offs, competitive pageants of dancing and voguing that evoked fantasies of couturier and celebrity. (RuPaul is its apotheosis: You can describe him as a national treasure and mean it.) This is a challenging story to tell well—it could easily turn into a procession of cultural signposts—but the acting is uniformly strong and often understated. The dresses, needless to say, are over the top. (FX, June 3, 9 p.m.)

(And they were hoarders, plotting amid rubbish and dead cats.) A grubby, riveting tale. (Now streaming)





STREAMING | Search History

REALITY Roaming the streets of L.A.. comedian Michelle Collins finds volunteers willing to hand over their cell phones and let her enthusiastically rummage through their dating profiles, online searches, texts-the works. It's funny, awkward and revealing. (Just like your phone!) Premieres June 5

Just the way that she was telling me I could see, 'Oh my goodness,

he's the one.' She had to keep everything so quiet for so long. She really needed to make sure that this was for them. It helped their relationship because it was just the two of them in this time, no one else."

Now the couple's strong partnership will extend to their royal work. Meghan will likely focus on issues concerning "young women and teenage girls. She is familiarizing herself with the landscape in this country," says Lorraine Heggessey, chief executive officer of the Royal Foundation, which oversees the charitable efforts of William, Kate, Harry and now Meghan. "She's meeting groups and wants to do that privately so she can get to know people." In February, at her first joint appearance alongside Harry, William and Kate, Meghan said she hoped to "hit the ground running"

in support of women's rights. "With so many campaigns like #MeToo and Time's Up, there's no better time to continue to shine a light on women feeling empowered and people supporting them," she said during the panel discussion. Adds a royal insider: "She's not going to want to be a quiet prin-



Her Coat of Arms

An official coat of arms is typically given to the father of the bride just ahead of a royal wedding, but in a break in tradition, it was given directly to Meghan herself. (Her dad, Thomas Markle, unexpectedly bowed out of attending the nuptials.) Meghan worked with the College of Arms herself on the design, which features nods to her home state of California (the golden poppy state flower, rays of sunshine, blue for the Pacific Ocean) and her new home with Harry at Kensington Palace (wintersweet, which grows outside their cottage). The three quills represent communication and the power of words, symbolic of Meghan's activism and her passion for writing. (She once worked as a calligrapher and also authored her own lifestyle blog, the Tig.)



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The Meghan Effect

Even before she was a duchess, Meghan was a royal trendsetter. Stepping out in \$246 skinny jeans by Hiut Denim Co. in Wales, Meghan launched global interest in the tiny Welsh label. "It's had a halo effect everywhere," says cofounder David Hieatt. Thanks to the explosive demand, Hieatt has employed five new staff members and is looking to move to a bigger factory. "We must be one of the few jeans companies that have no jeans. The shelves are barren," he says. And after Meghan wore earrings by Paris-based jeweler Vanessa Tugendhaft on May 22, "we were completely sold out in 10 minutes," says Tugendhaft. "It was crazy!"



On a personal note, the next big milestone on the horizon is children. 





stress disorder, where everyday, normal activities can sometimes trigger panic attacks and feelings of fear and loneliness. "Every day is a milestone," says Amy. "Some days are easier than others." Agrees Pebbles: "I don't think it will ever be easy. There are things that are out of my control, like recurring nightmares. There is nothing I can do to make it go away, but I try my hardest."

Pebbles was living "a rough life" in New York City with her single mom and two sisters in 1995 when a neighbor told her

mother about a place where she could start a new Christian life. The neighbor showed them a promotional booklet, she recalls, filled with photos of people frolicking in swimming pools, singing in choirs and running through fields at the church's compound in Fouke, Ark. "My mother was sold on the dream," Pebbles says. "We joined the church and we were on our way to Arkansas."

Alamo and his wife, Susan, had begun to amass their following in the late 1960s on the streets of Hollywood, preaching salvation and offering believers what they purported to be a peaceful commune existence. Randall Harris, a retired FBI agent who investigated the case against Alamo, believes some people were drawn to the cult because of Alamo's charisma and promises of a better life, then were bullied into remaining. "He threatened these people with eternal damnation if they were to leave. The world revolved around Tony Alamo," he says. "It takes quite a character to convince a mother to turn over her [underage] daughter to him to become his wife."

For Amy, the Tony Alamo cult was the only life she knew. Her parents had




THE CULT'S 'PEACE BABY'

Benjamin Risha remembers praying as hard as he could for three days straight. Susan Alamo lay dead in a coffin in front of him after a battle with breast cancer, and her husband, Tony, had told him to pray for her resurrection. When it didn't happen, "he told me, 'You didn't pray hard enough,'" recalls Risha.

It was the beginning of doubt for Risha, who had been born in 1975 as the cult's "Peace Baby." Alamo had orchestrated the birth, prophesying that a child born of an Arab father and a Jewish mother would bring world peace. But when Risha's parents fled the cult leaving their son behind, the Alamos raised the boy as their own. "People referred to me as, sort of, royalty," recalls Risha, now 43 and a writer who has penned a book about his experience. The Cult Leader Has No Clothes

book about his experience, The Cult Leader Has No Clothes. After Susan's death, Risha began searching through cult records and learned that the biological parents he had long been told were dead were actually alive. Digging further, he contacted his father, who sent him a plane ticket out of Arkansas. Chased by Alamo's henchmen, he fled to the airport and escaped, reuniting with his parents. "I'm not broken," says Risha. "Tony didn't win."



joined before she was born, and at age 14 she too became Alamo's bride after he raped her and forced her to recite vows with him. "He told me, 'This is between me, you and God,' " Amy remembers. "I was terrified."

Alamo convinced his followers there was nothing wrong with polygamy or marrying young girls because the Bible allowed it, and his behavior began to grow more deviant as the years went on. Any infraction, from running late to breakfast or listening to unapproved music, could result in being forced to fast or beaten with a two-by-four. "He got off on you screaming and crying," Amy says. Because they weren't allowed to commiserate without the fear of being punished, Pebbles and Amy would communicate through a secret code-using their eye movements to spell letters of the alphabet. Amy says, "It was our way of supporting each other."

In 2010, with Alamo in prison, Pebbles fled and was reunited with her mother and sisters, all of whom had left the cult years earlier. Amy had left the

cult several years before with the help of her father. Amy's mother remains an active member of the group and is estranged from her daughter. "She

won't talk to me," Amy says. "She thinks I'm going to hell."

Pebbles and Amy share the unique bond of survivors—supporting each other through battles with night terrors and severe bouts of depression. Though miles separate them—Pebbles, a stay-at-home

mom who is in the process of getting a divorce, lives in the Phoenix area with her two young sons, and Amy is studying to get into college in Oklahoma City, where she is also raising two young sons with her boyfriend—the two are forever linked. "She's a fighter and I'm a fighter," says Pebbles.

The best friends speak to each other every day and continue to feel each other's pain. As Pebbles recounts her story of becoming Alamo's wife, Amy admits she's the one who told Alamo about the dream. Pebbles stops and places her hand on Amy's arm. "Amy, I don't blame you for anything," she

says. "I know," Amy responds, "but I still wish I'd never done that to you."

Last year on the day Alamo died in prison, "I went to the bathroom, got in the tub and cried for all of us girls," says Amy. "I was relieved." Says Pebbles: "We're free now."

After three decades as a successful working actress, Thandie Newton, 45, says she's finally reached a major milestone in her career: Her three children suddenly care about what she does for a living. Why? Two words: Star Wars. "I can't think of anything I could do that would get my kids' attention quite like this," Newton says of her family's reaction to hearing she had landed a role in Solo: A Star Wars Story. She's the first black woman to play a major character in the four-decade saga. "It's about more than the toys," she says. "It's momentous."

Newton, who first broke out in the U.S. in 1994 starring with Tom Cruise in Interview with the Vampire, isn't unfamiliar with being a Hollywood trailblazer. Born in London and raised by her Zimbabwean mother, Nyasha, a nurse, and her British father, Nick, an artist, Newton landed her first movie role when she was just 16, opposite Nicole Kidman in the 1991 Australian coming-of-age film Flirting. "I've grown up in this industry," she says. "It's not easy. But I've been very lucky in my career. Partly because just my presence in the work is breaking ground [as a biracial actress]." Still, there was a time she almost gave it up for academics. In between auditioning for early roles, Newton went to Cambridge University and graduated with a degree in social anthropology. "I came into [Hollywood] from a different world," she says. "I wasn't trained as an actor." But while Newton made notable appearances in 2000's Mission: Impossible 2 and 2006's Best Picture winner Crash, she's now reaching new levels of fame, playing both the hard-bitten thief Val in Solo and the scene-stealing android Maeve on HBO's futuristic drama Westworld. "It's actually a really wonderful thing to be older, to still be part of this community and to re-

"In terms of diversity, in terms of how women have managed to be twice as good and stride forward and not let limits stop them." Newton, who has said she was once groped by a former costar and sexually abused by a director who made a graphic audition tape of her, is outspoken about issues facing women and sits on the board of the activist organization V-Day. She says her own experiences helped shape her Westworld character, a robot coming to terms with the violence she has suffered at the hands of humans. "It parallels an awakening that I felt I came to after a lot of difficulty and pain in life," she says. "At some point you've got to take the reins. I did that a lot in the last decade. I don't feel like a victim at all anymore."

She gets strong support from her family: her husband of 20 years, British writer-director Ol Parker (Mamma Mia! Here We Go Again) and their daughters Ripley, 17, and Nico, 13, and son Booker, 4. Nico is the first to follow in her mom's acting footsteps, starring in Disney's upcoming live-action Dumbo under Newton's watchful eye. "[I'm] like a lioness, checking that everything is looked after," Newton told Britain's This Morning. On the Solo set, she often thought about her own childhood. "I was a kid that loved these films, and yet there was nobody like me looking out from the screen," she says. "I can't tell you what that feels like. What would the little girl Thandie have wanted to see? A black woman in her natural glory. And I got to do that."

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Julia Spoor's dad was battling depression when he shot himself. Now she is trying to help others avoid a similar loss

Whenever she had a bad day or wanted to laugh,


Julia Spoor knew she could count on her father. "He was a goofy guy who just had this radiance about him," she says. But when Julia was 7, her dad, Scott, seemed to change. Battling depression, he twice attempted to overdose on pills. And on Sept. 25, 2009, the 43-year-old electrical engineer killed himself with his handgun, just 10 days before Julia's 8th birthday. "It's a really awful feeling," says Julia, who didn't learn the details of his act until years later. Though he

Taking its name from the color that hunters wear for safety, **Wear Orange** (wearorange .org) to Prevent Gun Violence, scheduled for June 1, was launched by **Everytown** .org) as a day to honor victims of gun violence and demand change in gun-safety legislation.

Now 16, Julia is hoping to help enact laws that would do just that. Working with the nonprofit Everytown for Gun Safety, she has become a vocal proponent of "red flag laws," already in place in six states, which help families remove guns from someone in crisis. She is also promoting the Wear Orange initiative, encouraging Americans to wear orange on June 1 in an effort to raise awareness about gun violence. "I've had a loved one taken away prematurely and felt it could be prevented," says Julia. "I don't want any other kid to feel that."


The high school sophomore says the repeated occurrences of school shootings have only made the need for change more urgent. After 17 students and staff died on Feb. 14 in the shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Fla., Julia helped launch Students Demand Action, a national student-based group advocating for tougher gun legislation. Having grown up surviving loss and then watching kids in classrooms "being targeted," she says it's her generation's fight to wage. "I believe my dad would be proud."

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

she sees the show, she'll understand. I love my sisters, and I would never do anything to disrespect them or embarrass them. I feel bad about that."

Richards is used to living through such family drama in public, but it isn't always easy. Last December her L.A. home was burgled while she was out of town, with more than \$1 million in clothing, jewelry and bags stolen. "The sentimental things from my mom were the most personal," she says. "I can't replace them." The experience has made her new series all the more important—it's a tribute to her mother that's as precious as any heirloom. "My mom always made me feel like I was the greatest thing in the world," she says. "Everything I have now is because of her. And I am so incredibly grateful." •



After Tragedy, A Family's Crusade

RORY STAUNTON DIED AFTER DEVELOPING SEPSIS FROM AN INFECTED CUT. NOW HIS FAMILY IS TRYING TO SAVE OTHERS By DAVE QUINN



thing unusual about the 1-in. cut 12-year-old Rory Staunton got on his arm during gym class that Wednesday in March 2012. But the next day Rory was in the pediatrician's office with a 104-degree fever, vomiting and leg pain. Two days later he was in the ICU, and by Sunday of that week the New York City seventh grader was dead. "It's just astounding," says his mother, Orlaith Staunton, 58. "When Rory died, I thought, 'This has to be something really rare.' I didn't think there was

anything that could kill him within four days that I wouldn't know about."

But doctors ultimately determined that Rory had died from sepsis, a frighteningly common condition caused when the body has an extreme reaction to infection—in this case likely because his cut wasn't properly cleaned. Difficult to diagnose but easily treated with antibiotics, sepsis is the leading cause of hospital deaths in the U.S., killing at least 250,000 Americans a year. (See sidebar.) In 2012 Orlaith and her husband, Ciaran, 55, both restaurant owners, launched the Rory Staunton Foundation (rory stauntonfoundationforsepsis.org) to help raise awareness of sepsis and how to prevent it. Since then they've helped bring about statewide mandates establishing hospital protocols for dealing

> with sepsis, formed a network of sepsis survivors and written a children's book on how to care for cuts and scrapes.

> For his family the memories of Rory—who was captain of the debate team and known for his loyalty to friends—are still painful. But, says Ciaran, "there's a reward in knowing that we're helping people, which is what Rory would have wanted to do." •



▶ I never had a good relationship with food. When my family or friends weren't around, I would binge-eat chips and cookies. My weight spiraled out of control. When I was 17, my mom died of breast cancer, and I gained 15 lbs. in a month. I graduated from high school weighing 237 lbs. I had accepted that I

was going to live life overweight. But in April 2017 I spent a night in horrible stomach pain and went to urgent care. I was eventually diagnosed with irritable bowel syndrome, and that was the wake-up call I needed to finally change my lifestyle. I gave up dairy and gluten and focused on eating lean pro-

teins like chicken with fruits and vegetables. After the first two months I lost 30 lbs. and decided to join a gym. I also set a goal to lose 70 lbs. by the time I turn 27 this July, because that's when I need to start getting mammograms as someone with a higher risk of developing breast cancer. I kept track of my progress on my Instagram account, @laurenelizhealthylivin. I hit that goal early, so I set a new one-to lose a total of 100 lbs., which I achieved in February. This has been the best thing that ever happened to me, and I know my mom would be so proud.

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
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
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THE SCENIC DESTINATION OFFERS SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE
