

The Voice US and stepped out at the BillBoard Awards, but it wasn't until June 6 that she explained her transformation. "I did it for this autoimmune disease that I had ... a thyroid issue," Clarkson said of her weight loss in a red-carpet interview with Extra. Just what did she do? "I literally read this book," explained the star, who is a fan of The Plant Paradox, a new dietary regimen that advocates so-called "clean eating," and reducing consumption of foods high in proteins called lectins. After basing her diet on the bestseller, Clarkson says "I'm not on medicine anymore because of this book."

The singer began a new eating plan that advises to cut certain types of wholegrains, dairy products, nuts and vegetables such as tomatoes—after being diagnosed with a problem relating to her thyroid (an endocrine gland that stores and produces hormones and can affect energy and weight). "She had already lost a ton of weight by the time I saw her in March," a source tells WHO, with Clarkson having lost about 17kg since becoming a *Paradox* convert. Still, the source says, "Weight loss wasn't the goal. This was an overall health approach." •





# Arrested for drink driving

## THE ACTOR WAS ARRESTED AFTER BEING STOPPED AT A DUI CHECKPOINT SOUTH OF LOS ANGELES

NURSING A GREEN JUICE—AND POSSIBLY A sore head—Vince Vaughn stepped out in Los Angeles a day after he was arrested for driving under the influence and resisting arrest. The Wedding Crashers actor was pulled over by police between Hermosa Beach and Manhattan Beach south of Los Angeles in the early hours of June 10 at a breath-testing checkpoint. Vaughn, 48, was taken into police custody at 4AM, where he and his male passenger remained until posting bail at 7 AM, according to TMZ.

While a spokesperson for Vaughn did not respond to a request for comment, police told CNN that the actor wasn't "fighting with officers, but more ... delaying the investigation".

The Manhattan Beach Police Department had said it maintained a "zero tolerance" approach to drink driving. "The intent of the checkpoint is to encourage sober designated drivers," the department posted on Facebook on June 6. At press time no charges had been laid against the actor. •

resenting Sunrise is one of TV's toughest gigs. Besides the obvious downsides—the early starts, the competitive nature of morning television. the need to know something about pretty much everything—breakfast-TV stars come under intense scrutiny from the media and public alike.

Samantha Armytage, 41, knows that better than most. In her five years co-hosting Channel Seven's flagship breakfast show, she has become one of Australia's most talked about people. From what she says on-air to what she looks like in her time off, seemingly no topic is off-limits.

While Armytage is first to acknowledge that being in the public eye comes at a price, she's not about to put up with it, especially when what is written about her isn't always true. "I have had years of false reports around me," she tells WHO. "And I am fed up with them. Now I take them on."

In our candid interview, Armytage discusses the stories that frustrate her, how she deals with life in the spotlight, her attitude to dieting and exercise, and the status of her love life.

How hard is it to cope with false items in the media? One that continues to rear its head is that you and your Sunrise colleague Edwina Bartholomew don't get along ...

When you are in the spotlight, people are going to make things up about you. It does surprise me in this era, where women are getting it together and supporting each other, that still, gossip writers want to pit women against each other. They don't do it to men. I know men in this industry who have appalling falling-outs with other men over professional jealousies. Yet they continually make stuff up about the women. Most of us women get along really well. Where do you think all that negativity comes from?

I don't understand the negativity. I understand modern media and there is a huge cycle to fill. And I understand there are gossip writers who have to make things up to fill their pages. It's a privilege to be in the media and I think people who write content should take that a bit more seriously. You can't just make stuff up. And I'm not going to put up with it anymore.

What about when it's the public themselves being vicious? How do you contend with internet trolls and the like?

How I get through it is I turn my social media off and I ignore it. I talk to a lot of young girls at schools about





empowerment and my No. 1 thing to them is don't listen to social media, shut it down, block the idiots, so I had to take a note out of my own book on that one. But it's good anyway for your mental health to take a break, otherwise it can get you down.

Do you feel more able to take things like this in your stride now you're in your 40s?


Oh my God, yeah. I am so much braver now than I used to be. I was raised by country parents who used to say, "You have got to rise above it if somebody is being awful." So I did rise above a lot of things. And then I got to an age and stage where I thought, "Hang on. You have got to fight for yourself!" And I have. I have never had to act like a man to do that. And I really pride myself on retaining my authenticity and keeping my femininity in a world that has been very masculine and aggressive.

Have you ever questioned your decision to be so visible and so public?

Occasionally, I will think: "Is it worth it?" I look around the media and think, "Who else gets the attention I get and is basically just a journo?" It is a bit unusual. I have questioned the job and my career choice. I never set out to do this job. It all kind of happened, and it's been a great ride. It's an incredible job. I am not going anywhere right now, but I don't want to do it forever. The hours are a grind and the attention is still, some days, difficult.

Do you think part of the intrigue is because people can see themselves in you?

I am not sure what the intrigue is. My girlfriends from school who have known me since I was 13 say, "Sam, we can't work it out. You're not that interesting." And I am like, "I know! I'm not!" Maybe it's because I am an average girl. What you see is what you get. Maybe that connects with people.

Armytage's first TV job was as a reporter at WIN Television in Canberra. "Back in those days, there was no sisterhood solidarity. Women were awful to each other. So we have come a long way." Today, she tries to ensure younger women have a better time of it. "As an older girl, I make a conscientious effort to support the younger girls coming through," she says.

#### You look fantastic in our photo shoot. Are you in the best shape of your life?

#### Are you an 80/20 kind of person?



# Kate A F: 1962-2018



pade

Behind her happy-go-lucky flair for design, a dark—and deadly—depression lurked

n the airy Park Avenue apartment she called home, Kate Spade surrounded herself with keepsakes of laughter and love: dozens of family photos and silver cigarette boxes that reminded her of her late mother, piles of books that her collegesweetheart husband, Andy, savoured and among the framed artwork displayed floor-to-ceiling, her daughter Bea's creations out of construction paper and glitter. All of it resonated with the cheerful vibe of the fashion empire she and Andy had built.

But none of it, in the end, had any power to overcome the disease Kate quietly battled. Around 10.10 on the morning of June 5, a housekeeper arrived to find Kate alone—and unresponsive in her bedroom. She had died of suicide at the age of 55. While friends and fans reeled, her husband and partner of 35 years revealed late the same day that Kate had been in treatment for depression and anxiety. What's more, Andy, 56, had moved out 10 months earlier to an apartment blocks away, where Bea, 13, split her time. "We were in touch with [Kate] the night before and she sounded happy," Andy said.





## Mourning an icon

"My grandmother gave me my first Kate Spade bag when I was in college. I still have it. Holding Kate's family, friends and loved ones in my heart." —Chelsea Clinton "There was no indication and no warning that she would do this. It was a complete shock and it clearly wasn't her."

The incongruity between the successful designer-mum who, with her colourfully whimsical aesthetic, seemed to embody sunshine itself—and the darkness of her death made no sense. Shocked admirers from Chelsea Clinton (see left) to Whoopi Goldberg posted articles on social media about the alarming rise in America's suicide rates and shared memories of their first Kate Spade handbag. "Young women saved up for it," said Goldberg. "It was like you were Mary Tyler Moore; you felt like you could do anything if you had this bag."

Starting in 1993 with a black nylon tote—with a small identifiable label on the outside—Kate was a two-time Council of Fashion Designers of America award-winner. "Her collection was one of the most popular and

brilliant," says former CFDA executive director Fern Mallis. "She was as adorable as her accessories were. She and Andy were very much in the front lane of the fashion universe."

They were at home in celebrity circles, too. Andy's brother is the comic actor David Spade; Kate's niece is Rachel Brosnahan, the Golden-Globe-winning star of Amazon Prime Video's *The Marvellous Mrs Maisel*. That Kate—who two years ago had opened a new chapter with a new line called Frances Valentine—could end her life was unthinkable even to those who were aware of her private struggles. "We knew Kate had her problems and demons," one friend tells WHO. "But no-one would have ever expected her to do this."

Katy Brosnahan grew up in Kansas City, one of five sisters and a brother in the Irish-Catholic brood of Frank, who owned a construction company, and June, a former flight attendant who died in 2010. Kate

described herself as "very shy" in high school. A journalism major in college, she met Andy when the two were working their way through Arizona State University at the same clothing store. She moved to Manhattan after graduation and, in 1986, took a \$14,000-a-year job as an assistant at *Mademoiselle* magazine, where she collected handbags for photo shoots. "We sat next to each other," remembers thenaccessories editor Elizabeth Perine. "There was something so wholesome and down-toearth about Katy B. She seemed too nice to go on and become so successful."

By then, Andy had followed Kate to New York, "rising fast in the advertising world and a marketing genius," recalls another of Kate's *Mademoiselle* colleagues. Andy suggested in 1991 that Kate try design. "He just said, what about handbags? And I said, 'Honey, you just don't start a handbag company.' And he said, 'Why not?'"

Kate later told the *How I* Built This podcast.

In 1993, a year before they married, Kate Spade New York was born. Running the business out of their apartment at first, the couple completed the sale of their company to Neiman

Marcus in 2006, banking \$US92.6 million. Baby Frances Beatrix—"Bea"—was just a year old and Kate took 10 years off to focus on being a mum. "It was so natural for me to get involved in my daughter's school, her play dates and baking," Kate told WHO in 2016. She was chair of a parent committee at Bea's private all-girls' school and would throw on a pair of yellow shoes with rhinestones for the morning drop-off run in her workout clothes. "It all sounds a little corny," Kate said, "but I enjoyed every minute of it." Said an acquaintance from school circles, "Kate was friendly with many of the mothers. No-one there had any idea she was struggling."

Looking back, maybe she did drop clues. In an interview with WHO in July 2016 on the

launch of Frances Valentine, Kate repeatedly spoke of her tendency to fret. "I might worry a little more than others," Kate said. "And I definitely don't want my daughter to feel that way. My dad always says, 'Just float. Not every little pebble is a boulder.'" She also chafed a little at the loss of recognition during her break from the industry. Stopping in a Kate Spade store to buy Bea a skirt, the saleswoman asked if Kate was on their mailing list. "My daughter was looking at me like, 'C'mon, just tell her.' And I was like, 'No,'" Kate recalled. "But I loved, 'Are you on our mailing list?" I created your mailing list!"

As for the deterioration of her marriage, Andy cast it as a temporary break and emphasised after her suicide that the three of them still had family dinners and holidayed together. "We were best friends trying to work through our problems."

Kate's friend, who requested anonymity, vouches for the split being amicable, at least on its face. "They had issues for a while, but you never heard them speaking poorly of one another. Andy is doing his best to be there for Bea and


protect her from what is going on." While Andy works out with Frank Brosnahan his wish to have his daughter home in Kansas to be buried beside her mother (funeral plans were uncertain at press time), those Kate left behind searched for meaning in their grief. Her dad told *The Kansas City Star* he was gratified by the attention on mental illness and suicide: "Any talk that ... helps somebody else, Katy would have liked that." And David Spade focused on Kate's light. "She could make me laugh so hard," he wrote on Instagram. "It's a rough world out there, people. Try to hang on."



with his family, friends and loved ones."

Bourdain's mother Gladys told The New York Times that she had spoken with Ripert after hearing of her son's death and he said, "Tony had been in a dark mood these past couple of days." A source who worked closely with Bourdain in the past tells WHO, "It never struck me as peculiar, but it was as if he gave everything to his work and then had nothing, zero, left for himself afterwards. He was always very, very tired. He pushed himself extremely hard." CNN colleague Anderson Cooper, who lost his brother to suicide in 1988. choked up during a tribute, saying he was filled with "shock, confusion and sadness that a man who was seemingly having the ride of his life has now suddenly reached the end of his life."

Bourdain's girlfriend, Asia Argento, released a statement calling him "my love, my rock, my protector." Having met him in Rome in 2016, the actress added, "I am beyond devastated." His

ex-wife, Ottavia Busia, revealed that she and their daughter, Ariane, 11, mourned their loss through music. On June 11, Ottavia posted a photo of Ariana performing with her band. "Our little girl had her concert today," wrote the mixed martial artist. "She was amazing. So strong and

brave. She wore the boots you bought her."


Although known for going into war zones and politically fraught places to film, Bourdain conceded that fatherhood had curbed some of his more reckless behaviour. "Since I became a dad, I do feel some responsibility at least to try to live," he told WHO in February. "There have been times in my life that I figured I've had a good run. Why not just do this stupid thing: jump off a cliff into water of an indeterminate depth? This is something I've done on the show. In retrospect, I don't know that I would do that today now that I'm a dad or reasonably happy."

Bourdain's food journey began in New Jersey, raised with his brother Christopher by mum Gladys, a New York Times editor, and his late father, Pierre, a Columbia Records executive in a "pretty normal, nuclear" family, he said. "We all ate together." After dropping out of university to then worked in various New York restaurants in the 1980s, developing a drug addiction he would

As Bourdain wrote, "My mother-in-law would always apologise before serving dinner when I was in attendance, saying, 'This must seem pretty ordinary for a chef ...' She had no idea how magical, how reassuring, how pleasurable her simple meatloaf was for me, what a delight even lumpy mashed potatoes were-being, as they were, blessedly devoid of truffles or truffle oil."

Patrick We've always been in each other's lives since we met and we are very happy to come back to each other.


Patrick, what do you love about Tracey?

Tracey We have three kids between us. Before we can move in, we want to experience day-to-day life together as we haven't had an opportunity to do that yet.


We are just happy to be back together.




by drinking cyanide-laced grape punch. Among the dead, 304 children, Their bodies. along with that of their charismatic, psychotic leader, Jim Jones, lay rotting, 11 kilometres away in the intense equatorial heat at the group's compound, known as Jonestown. The Parks girls—along with their father, brother Dale, 26, and grandmother Edith Parks, 63-were five of just 36 survivors. "My brother broke the news to me little by little as the doctors were nursing me back." Tracy recalls. "'No-one is alive,' he told me. 'They're all gone.'

The Jonestown massacre—the largest mass suicide in modern history-made headlines around the world as a shocking example of how the followers of a cult could be brainwashed into evil. Hundreds of followers willingly drank poison—and parents forced cyanide-filled syringes into the mouths of children, too young to sip from cups. "This was a wake-up call," says cult expert Rick Ross, "to show just how fragile the human mind is and how easily good, kind and reasonable people can be manipulated."

Today, after four decades, Tracy-one of the youngest survivors-still struggles to put the "horrors" behind her. "This wasn't suicide," insists Tracy, now 51 and a California daycare owner. "This was murder. Those children didn't want to die, and neither did many of the adults." Meanwhile, her father, Jerry, 84, one of the few cultists who dared to stand up to Jones in Guyana, is battling prostate cancer and trying to push past the "guilt and shame of what I put my family through," he says. "I've asked for forgiveness so I can die in peace."

As far back as she can remember, Tracy's life revolved around Jim Jones and his church. Drawn to the ministry's eclectic gospel of Christianity, socialist politics and racial equality, her parents joined the Peoples Temple in the early 1960s, and by 1966 they and their three children followed Jones's




rapidly growing congregation from their home in Ohio to Ukiah, California, where he prophesied that his followers would be safe when the "nuclear bombs started dropping." But Tracy always sensed darkness in the church, from the armed guards who stood watch over worship services to the way Jones would stomp on Bibles and rant against the government, often until two in the morning. "Even as a child sitting in these meetings," Tracy recalls, "I'd look at all the adults around

me and think, 'What's wrong with these people? How can you think this is OK?"

Over time, whispers of Jones's drug use and sexual affairs with male and female followers began to surface-and his need to control every aspect of his followers' lives grew more intense. Jones began surrounding himself with bodyguards and took to wearing dark sunglasses at all times—he said it was "because he sees too much without them on," recalls Jerry. The increasingly paranoid, self-proclaimed "god" had begun to lose his grasp on reality, "going from bad to worse to

really bad," says Jerry, who left the church on two occasions but returned both times.

By 1973 Jones had become obsessed with moving his church to a 1500ha jungle compound in South America that he'd leased from the government of Guyana, promising his congregants, "This is paradise. This is where we're going. We're getting out of this dangerous world." That move became reality in August 1977, after a magazine published a meticulously reported story on Jones ordering the physical and emotional abuse of his congregants. Tracy, along with her

parents and sister, reluctantly arrived in Jonestown in April 1978 (brother Dale and their grandmother had moved there the year before) and quickly discovered it was anything but the paradise they'd been promised. "That place was the closest thing to hell on earth," recalls Tracy. "The moment I saw that front gate I thought, 'We are going to die here.'

Within hours of their arrival at Jonestown, her worst fears seemed to be realised. She recalls watching helplessly as Jones goaded a handful of followers into beating her father when he announced that he wanted to return to California. Tracy and the other children spent eight hours a day working in the fields, under a blistering equatorial sun, while Jones could be heard ranting in a haunting voice about his "enemies" over loudspeakers. Gun-toting guards watched her every move. "I dare you to try to escape," Jones, who by then had become addicted to a range of narcotics. would threaten his followers, "You won't last long in that jungle with the panthers and snakes." Constantly racked by hunger and exhausted from lack of sleep, Tracy lived, she

says, in a state of "constant terror," but worst of all were the mock-suicide drills Jones called White Nights. "They could happen anytime during the day or night," Tracy recalls. "We'd all gather together in the pavilion, and he'd tell us,

'It's not going to be painful. You just lie down and go to sleep.' Everyone would be clapping, shouting, 'Yes, I'll die for you.' He got off on the excitement."

Back in San Francisco, pressure from worried relatives of Jonestown members forced authorities to finally begin investigating Jones, who was being accused of a variety of crimes including abuse, kidnapping and money laundering. "I filed lawsuits to take away his property, and I

organised relatives," Tim Stoen, a former temple member whose son, John, 6, was being held hostage by Jones in Guyana (see sidebar), revealed in a 2016 book-tour appearance. "I did everything I possibly could." By the time California congressman Leo Rvan arrived at Jonestown on Nov. 17. 1978, with a group of reporters and family members, the drug-addled Jones had become a seething, ticking time bomb. "He was telling us that mercenaries and the CIA were lurking in the jungle, ready to kill us," says Tracy. Her father-who once told Jones that "I didn't come here to die" during one of his suicide drills—says he remembers feeling that "something bad was on the verge of happening." "Death was in the air," Jerry recalls.

During a meeting with Ryan that afternoon, Tracy's grandmother, a longtime devotee of Jones, summoned the courage to tell the congressman that they were being held at Jonestown against their will. Ryan persuaded Jones to let him escort anyone who wanted to leave the compound back to the US. Fifteen cult members-including all six members of the immediate Parks family-

followed Ryan and his party back to the airstrip. But before the plane could depart, the passengers were ambushed by gunmen sent by Jones. Ryan, three journalists and Tracy's mother, Patricia, 44, were killed in the barrage of

gunfire; nine others were wounded. While Tracy, her sister and four other teenagers hid in the jungle, Jones summoned his congregation to the open-air pavilion, telling them that soldiers would soon be "parachuting" into Jonestown to kill everyone. It was finally time to "take the potion," he can be heard saying in a rambling, disturbing 45-minute audio recording found afterwards, urging them to drink the cyanide-laced punch that had been



prepared in nearby vats, instructing parents to keep their children calm. "Don't be afraid to die," said Jones. "This is a revolutionary suicide. This is not a self-destructive suicide."

Jones himself died from a gunshot to the head, although it's unclear if it was self-inflicted or if he asked another cult member to fire the shot.

After the massacre Tracy spent nearly a month in Guyana before returning to Ukiah, California, with her father and siblings. But putting her life back together wasn't easy. Her memories of school involve suffocating panic attacks that often resulted in her suddenly sprinting out of classrooms and "running, running, running until my legs

gave out." Other times she'd find herself "curled up in a foetal position" on a sympathetic school counsellor's floor, sobbing. Few people in Ukiah wanted to talk about Jim Jones and "all the hurt" he brought to their community, she says. The one therapist she saw told her, "You're going to be lucky if you're not crazy in 10 or 15 years."

There are physical scars as well. The dermatologist Tracy now sees every three months has told her he believes her recurring skin cancers are caused by the repeated blistering sunburns she received labouring in the Jonestown agricultural fields. Her sister Brenda died of pancreatic illness, at age 52, in 2013, having never been able to shake the horror of Jonestown. When they were escaping through the jungle, Brenda discovered she was covered in her mother's blood and brain matter from the shooting—a trauma that haunted her until her death. "I've always been a fighter," says Tracy. "Knock me down, and I always get back up.





But Brenda just couldn't do that. She often told me, 'I wish that bullet that got Mom had killed me. I hate this life.'"

Tracy, who spent much of her 20s using alcohol "to keep me from feeling," knows exactly how her sister felt but insists it's the memory of her mother that keeps her getting out of bed each morning. "There have been times I've wanted to give up, but I push through for her," says the twice-married grandmother of six. "I want her to be proud of me. I don't want anyone feeling sorry for me."

Every year on the anniversary of the massacre, Tracy places her mother's photo on a table by the front window of her house and surrounds it with lit candles. Her story has no closure, no happy ending. "Time doesn't heal anything," she says, shaking her head. "When I was a little girl, I used to stare at this sign [Jones] had nailed up over his chair in church that read, "Those who forget the past are condemned to repeat it.' I didn't understand what that meant back then, but I do now.

# She went from 1970s child actress to reality TV queen. How family put Kyle on the path to fame

ong before she became a Real Housewife, Kyle Richards was paying her dues in Hollywood, working as a child actor in more than 30 films and TV shows, including Little House on the Prairie and Halloween. Growing up in front of the camera was "all I ever knew," says Richards, 49. "I have no memory of my life before television."

Now the mother-of-four—who has been married to real-estate agent Mauricio Umansky, 47, for 22 years—is behind the camera, co-executive producing a drama series, *American Woman*, inspired by her "unconventional" childhood with her mother, Kathleen Richards, who died of breast cancer in 2002 at the age of 63.

"My mother was a single mom in the '70s, raising kids on her own," says Richards. "It was a crazy, fun, reckless time, and she was very opinionated and outspoken. I wanted to make a show about women coming into their own and finding their voice."

Kyle's sister Kim Richards, 53, who was herself a child star, has been supportive, but oldest sister Kathy Hilton, 59, voiced concern about the project.

"I would never tell anyone else's stories," says Richards, who insists the show isn't autobiographical. Still, it has strained her relationship with Kathy, whose daughters are Paris Hilton and Nicky Hilton Rothschild. Says Richards: "I hope when she sees the show, she'll understand. I love my sisters, and I would never do anything to disrespect them or embarrass them. I feel bad about that."

"I can't say! Honestly!" Atkinson tells WHO. But if there's one thing *Wentworth* fans have come to realise, it's to expect the unexpected with this series.

Though tight-lipped about The Freak's fate, Atkinson says the future for Vera revolves around the fallout from those shocking final scenes from Season 5.

"There's a big storyline that occupies Vera, Jake [Bernard Curry] and Will [Robbie Magasiva] later on, which has a lot to do with Ferguson's death," she explains. "I can't say much, except to say it takes the show in this really interesting, psychological thriller area."

We pick up this season with Wentworth in lockdown after the escape of Frankie (Nicole Da Silva) and Ferguson.
Commissioner Chandler (Gary Sweet) has been sacked, and Vera is struggling to maintain control over an increasingly strained inmate population. It's a powder keg just waiting to explode.

Atkinson, who has been a cast member since Season 1, says fans can expect these new episodes to head in a very different direction, partly because of the addition of three new characters: biker Rita Connors (played by Leah Purcell), hot-headed inmate Ruby Mitchell (*Cleverman*'s Rarriwuy Hick) and crime matriarch Marie Winter (portrayed by Susie Porter).

"It's a good season for everyone, and the new characters bring a whole new energy to things," Atkinson says. "This is great for those of us who have been here for six seasons—there are all these whole new relationships to unpack. The show is always different, every season, and



IS THE FREAK REALLY DEAD?

That's the million-dollar question for fans—and one that Kate Jenkinson, who plays Allie Novak, says her character is just as obsessed with. "It's Wentworth, so who really knows?" she says. "But if anyone is going to be able to claw herself out of a coffin underground, it's Joan. Until Ali knows one way or another what happened to The Freak, she is going to always have that emptiness; that rage and desire for justice. She feels she owes it to Bea."

"Every time you think, 'Am I treading water here and pulling the same old tricks out of the bag?", the material on the page stops you from doing that," she says. "A new cast member will come in and you think, 'You have just lifted the level.' So then that brings us all up with them."

Atkinson admits she never expected

### **ALLIE NOVAK (KATE JENKINSON)**



Or continue on his path of self-destruction and the downfall of his one-time girlfriend, Vera? This season will see Jake desperately trying to stay one step ahead of police investigators, and try to reconcile his part in the events of last season. Can he keep his job? It's not looking good.



"This far down the track, you go, 'This is such a gift,' "she explains. "For me, it's just a terrific bunch of people to work with and we have a crew that comes back consistently, so it's a great working environment."

Even though, Atkinson concedes, the subject matter is sometimes incredibly exhausting. "We pride ourselves on doing a lot of physically and emotionally challenging stuff," Atkinson explains. "But because it's such a big ensemble cast, the workload does get fairly evenly distributed. The stakes are always so high, so you have to commit fully—it's very psychological, so you've got to mine that emotional stuff."

"But when it comes to the day, it is smoke and mirrors—we are pretending," she adds. "That said, maybe time will tell. Two years from now I might be having some kind of breakdown!"

# A BOY'S BRAVE FIGHT

Joey Slaight was just 8 years old when his mother killed his brother and herself, and left him with a bullet in his brain. Three vears later, his family calls him a miracle

n the backyard of his Owasso, Oklahoma, home, 11-year-old Joey Slaight is chasing his 4-year-old twin cousins around a mini trampoline while they play one of their favourite games: monster. "I'm going to get you!" Joey roars as the boys scream in mock terror. It's a picture of suburban weekend normalcy, but watching it all unfold, Joey's aunt Andra Munoz can't quite believe her

eyes. "I sit there with my mouth open when he's playing like any other kid," says Andra, "There are so many times in a day that I am amazed, that I say, 'I can't believe he's doing that."

In fact, three years ago Joey's family wasn't sure the playful, happy-go-lucky boy would ever walk or talk again. On Jan. 2, 2015, Joey was shot point-blank in the head by his mother, Morgan Slaight, 27, a recovering methamphetamine addict and schizophrenic, who also shot and killed Joey's 6-year-old brother, Jaxon, before shooting herself. Bleeding profusely, Joey was helicoptered to the University of

Wisconsin Hospital in Madison, where a CT scan showed the .22-calibre bullet had lodged behind his left eye after ravaging the left frontal lobe of his brain. Doctors cautioned the family that Joey might not survive, much less recover any quality of life. But after three gruelling years in two hospitals and a brain-rehabilitation centre, Joey finally went home on March 31. Now living with his father's sister, Andra,

his legal guardian, her husband, Jason, a high-school football coach, and their four children, Joey continues to defy the odds. "After the shooting we didn't think we would have 24 more hours with

him," says Andra. "But from day one we saw miracles."

On the morning of the shooting, Joey was with his mother and brother at Morgan's sister's house in Montfort, Wisconsin. Morgan had been released from a psychiatric hospital the previous day-a stay ordered by a court after she had threatened suicide. "Her sister told me her demeanour that

day was weird," says Andra. "And Morgan knew there was a gun in the house." Still, no-one expected she might turn it on her boys. Andra, at home in Oklahoma, got the news in a hysterical phone call from her mother. "I couldn't even breathe," she recalls. "I remember sitting there thinking, 'This is the day everything is going to change. "Joey reminds

Nothing is ever going to be the same again."

When the family arrived at the hospital, the news was grim. "Nobody wanted to operate," says Andra. "They said he was too far gone." But neurosurgeon Dr Joshua

Medow decided to take a chance on surgery. After cutting a flap in Joey's skull to relieve the intense pressure from his swollen brain, he removed all the bullet fragments he could and put Joey into a medically induced coma. Later that night, Medow was emotional: "I was like, 'Oh my God, what have I just done? Did I give him a fate worse than death?" he says. "My wife and my 1-year-old son were sleeping when I got home, and all I wanted to do was pick up my son and hold him."

But just 10 days later Joey miraculously reached for a nurse's hand, "and it was a flood of emotion," Medow says. "We gave him the best possible chance."

It's one Joey immediately made the most of. After spending two months in hospital, he was transferred to a children's rehabilitation hospital in Oklahoma and then

to Timber Ridge, a paediatric brain-rehab centre in Arkansas, where he spent two gruelling years in physical and speech therapy. He had to relearn basic speech-when he arrived, he was at the level of an 18-monthold, able to speak only three words-and how to regain use of

his right arm and leg. His progress stunned his caregivers. "He defies all predictions," savs Becky Mitchum, Joev's speech pathologist at Timber Ridge. "Joey suffered a catastrophic brain injury. You wouldn't expect him to have made the gains that he did." Now Joey is settling into a whole new routine. Andra is enrolling him in the specialeducation program at the local school and signed him up for physical and speech therapy sessions. His grandmother Randa



Slaight, a retired first-grade teacher, is teaching him to read again. The rest of his day-to-day life resembles any other kid's: he plays Xbox, eats dinner with his family and cuddles up with his aunt for bedtime stories.

He is also rebuilding his relationship with his father, Tyler Slaight, 37, a recovering addict who was estranged from Joey's mother at the time of the shooting. Tyler says he has been clean for almost three years now—"inspired by Joey."

"My boy Jaxon is gone," says Tyler. "It still hurts. I almost lost Joey. I made a decision to get better so I can be there for him for the rest of his life. I have a purpose now."

The one thing no-one talks about is the shooting, as they follow doctors' advice to avoid the subject until Joey brings it up himself. Pictures of his mother and brother remain tucked away to avoid upsetting him. No-one knows how much he remembers of that tragic morning-he has never mentioned his mother or brother by name-but the horror of the day is clearly lodged in his subconscious. As Joey recovered his speech, "one of his first words was 'gun,'" says Andra. Joey is also showing what Andra calls "flickers"-fleeting moments of fear, rage and sadness. "It's like Dory," she says, referring to the forgetful fish from the Disney movie. "He'll get a flicker of something he's super-sad about, but it's gone as quick as it comes." Despite the challenges still to come, "he's back," says Randa. "His personality, his kindness, his spirit, all of it is back." And that gives the family hope for the future. "God saved Joey for a reason," says Randa. "He has a purpose for him." Andra agrees. "As with every other miracle, we aren't able to put a limit on what he can do," she says. "Nothing is impossible with him.'



# SWEET POTATO AND BARLEY SOUP

Serves 4-6, Prep 20 mins, Cook 45 mins

### WHAT YOU NEED

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 tsp finely grated fresh ginger
- 2 tsp smoked paprika
- 2 tbsp tomato paste
- 800g sweet potato, peeled, cut into 2cm cubes
- 2 carrots, peeled, finely chopped

- 2 stalks celery, finely chopped
- 1½ litres (6 cups) vegetable stock
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup pearl barley, rinsed
- 1 dried bay leaf
  Salt and cracked black pepper, to
- 1 bunch silverbeet (800g), trimmed, washed, leaves

Crusty wholemeal bread rolls, to serve

- Heat oil in a stock pot over a medium heat. Add onion, garlic and ginger. Cook, stirring occasionally, until soft. Add paprika and paste. Cook, stirring, for 1 minute.
- Stir in potato, carrots and celery. Add stock, barley and bay leaf. Season with salt and pepper. Bring to boil. Simmer, covered, stirring occasionally, for about 40 minutes, or until barley is tender. Stir in silverbeet. Cook, uncovered, for a further 5 minutes, or until tender.
- Serve soup with bread rolls. and sweet chilli sauce.

# SWEET AND STICKY CHICKEN WINGS

Serves 4-6, Prep 20 mins, Cook 1 hour

### WHAT YOU NEED

1/4 cup cornflour

1 tsp chilli powder

12 chicken wings (1.8kg)

2 tbsp peanut oil

Chopped peanuts, sliced cucumber and steamed rice (optional), to serve

#### SAUCE

1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed

½ cup water

2 tbsp fish sauce

1 tbsp soy sauce

To make sauce, stir sugar and water in a large saucepan over a low heat until sugar is dissolved. Bring to boil. Gently boil for about 10 minutes, or until slightly thickened. Remove. Stir in remaining ingredients. Cool.

Meanwhile, combine cornflour and chilli powder in a large bowl. Season with salt and pepper. Toss one wing at a time in cornflour mixture. Shake off excess.

Place in a single layer in a large roasting pan lined with baking paper. Drizzle with oil.

Cook in a hot oven (200°C) for about 1 hour, or until chicken is cooked through. Pour over sauce. Toss to coat. Transfer to a serving plate.

Sprinkle peanuts over chicken. Serve with cucumber and rice (optional).



# CINNAMON CHOCOLATE STREUSEL CAKE

Serves 8-10, Prep 30 mins, Cook 1 hour

### WHAT YOUNEED

125g unsalted butter, chopped, at room temperature

½ cup brown sugar, firmly packed

¼ cup caster sugar

2 tsp vanilla bean paste

3 eggs, at room temperature

1 cup self-raising

½ cup plain flour

1 tsp cinnamon

¾ cup buttermilk
STREUSEL

½ cup walnuts

⅓ cup caster sugar 100g dark

chocolate, coarsely chopped

2 tsp ground cinnamon

COFFEE CREAM 300ml tub thickened cream

2 tbsp coffee liqueur Invert base of a 20cm round springform pan. Grease and line base and side with baking paper, extending paper 2cm above pan edge.

To make streusel, place all ingredients in a food processor. Pulse to form coarse crumbs.

Beat butter, sugars and vanilla in a small bowl of an electric mixer until fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time, until just combined. Transfer to a large bowl.


Add combined sifted flours and cinnamon and buttermilk in two batches. Stir until smooth.

Spoon half the mixture into prepared pan. Smooth over top. Sprinkle over half the streusel. Using a flat-bladed knife, lightly swirl streusel through mixture. Repeat with remaining cake mixture and streusel.

Cook in a moderately slow oven (160°C) for about 1 hour, or until cooked when tested. Remove. Stand in pan for 15 minutes. Remove side of pan. Transfer to a wire cake rack to cool.

To make coffee cream, beat cream and liqueur in a small bowl of an electric mixer until soft peaks form.
Serve cake with coffee cream.







#### What should we look for?

Cristiano Ronaldo is a true celebrity footballer, one of the all-time great players in terms of record and ability, but also probably the most marketable athletes in the world. Brazilian star Neymar was badly injured in 2014, so he has a point to prove as Brazil seek their first win since 2002.

#### **How about Lionel Messi?**

Messi is the best player in the world and will go down as an all-time great, but Argentina have been unable to win the World Cup while he's played. They lost the final in 2014 and this is Messi's last chance for the one win that will cement his legacy as the greatest.

# England has had a dismal run for decades. Can they win?

I wouldn't list them as a favourite but they are a team revitalised under Gareth Southgate. The majority of their squad plied their trade in the Premier League this season under world-class coaches like Pep Guardiola and Jürgen Klopp and were in blistering form. They are certainly a dark horse and will be one to watch.





"We wanted to tell the story about one of the most epic accomplishments in human history but root it very much in the intimate day-to-day details of what it was actually like to be Neil at that moment in time," says Chazelle, who approached Gosling about this role before asking him to star in La La Land. 
