


Did you talk to George about making this movie?

Ha, I'm just looking to get my kids to school on time! That's my goal right now. If a good role comes along, it's the icing on the cake.



When we are tipsy, we reminisce and inevitably have a few tears, because we're so grateful for our friendship.



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





Do you know what your grandkids are watching?

hen young boys reach a certain age, it's natural that they'll begin to explore their sexuality. In the past, their curiosity probably went as far as sneaking a peek at their mum's Littlewoods catalogue lingerie section.

But today's children can access the most explicit and degrading pornography – on the internet. Online porn is a growing issue for parents, grandparents, children's charities and mental health professionals, who all agree it can have a huge impact on developing minds.

In 2012, the prestigious Tavistock Clinic in London reported a rise in addiction to hardcore online porn among young boys. One who started viewing porn aged 10 told a counsellor, 'I didn't know it was possible for people to do those sorts of things. The websites led me to other websites, and soon I was looking at weirder stuff I could never have imagined...'

Tara Deschambault's son, Joe, now 15, became addicted to online porn aged eight. It had a devastating effect.

Tara, who also has two daughters, says, 'Joe was the sweetest, most thoughtful little boy on the planet. But, when he was eight, his personality changed overnight. He became withdrawn and started beating up his older sisters... he was totally out of control.

'Then we got a call from his music teacher to say Joe had taken photographs of his genitals with her mobile phone. We also found pictures on our camera at home, and I was aware that he'd started masturbating.'

Tara began to fear her son was being sexually abused.

'I was looking at family members, teachers – I even questioned my own husband.'

Tara, who lives in Canada, discovered the real reason behind Joe's disturbing behaviour. She says, 'One night, I was on my computer... I looked into the browser history and was horrified to find hundreds of links to online porn. It was violent, aggressive and demeaning.

I thought I was going to throw up. My husband and I confronted Joe, and I said, "Is there anything you need to tell Mummy?"

His eyes went very big and he said, "I can't, it's too bad." We all ended up sobbing.'

Sadly, Tara's story isn't an unusual one. A parliamentary report in 2012 found that a third of 10-year-olds has seen explicit material, and 80 per cent of 16-year-old boys regularly access online porn.

The NSPCC reports that three in four young women believe pornography has led to pressure on women to act a certain way. Doctors have reported an increase in girls coming to them with sexual injuries, as young men act out what they've seen online.

Steve Biddulph, whose bestselling parenting book, *Raising Boys*, has been updated and re-released, has dedicated a new chapter to the issue.

'Researchers have found that the more porn is viewed by young boys or men, the more those males "dehumanise" women – they see them deserving of maltreatment,' he explains.

He doesn't blame the youngsters. 'Porn sites are designed to entrap, sometimes even using children's cartoon characters or placement among games sites to get children to click through.'

This was how Joe's addiction started. He was playing a game online when an ad popped up. It said, 'Wanna see? Click here!'

So. he did...

T'd installed filters, so I


thought I'd protected him, but this was totally targeted,' Tara says.

Joe had been accessing porn sites for eight months. 'He'd wake up in the middle of the night and first thing in the morning and look at porn,' Tara says. 'He figured out how to manipulate the computer so that he could look at porn for 30 seconds while I was out of the room.'

Joe was banned from using technology for two years. 'But, when he saw sexy ads on billboards, the anger and aggression would start,' says Tara. 'He said the images of the porn flooded his brain.'

So, how do we protect our kids? In the UK, all porn sites must now use age-verification software to block under-18s. Businesses that refuse to comply can be fined up to £250,000 and blocked to all UK users. These measures should be in place by the end of the year.

Steve Biddulph says talking to kids is key. 'They're likely

to be shown things on phones or other devices by friends,' he adds. 'It can be scary and confusing. So tell them, "People may show you yucky stuff on their phones about sex. It's called porn, and it's not like real love-making. Let us know if someone shows you something – you won't get in trouble, we can talk about it."

'In the early teens, explain that porn is not real and women are paid to pretend that they like being hurt or called names or humiliated.'

Embarrassing Bodies expert Dr Christian Jessen has even suggested showing boys online porn during sex education lessons. He said, 'Make kids cringe and squirm. Why not? I think it'd be very helpful to show the distinction between porn and sex.'

Tara took this approach with Joe. 'We explained that many of the women in these videos were being abused. We said, "This is not what a healthy man does."

'I was furious that I had to have these conversations with an eight-year-old. I felt like he'd been robbed of his childhood.'

Joe is still only allowed supervised internet access. It just goes to show how vigilant we need to be.



ump higher, Mummy, higher!' squeals my three-and-a-half-year-old daughter, my darling Eve, as I join her on the bouncy castle.

It's hard to believe that, only a few years ago, I would have been breathless just attempting the short walk to our local park, never mind actually joining in the fun.

At 5ft 7in and 22st 10lb, I was morbidly obese. I wore a dress size 28-30, and even the simplest tasks were becoming a struggle.

I'd started putting on weight as soon as I hit puberty, but it was when I left home to go to university in Huddersfield, aged 18, that my weight really crept up... and up.

Not being a confident cook, I'd rely on microwave meals and takeaways. It didn't get any better when I started work as a primary school teacher.

I didn't plan ahead, so I was constantly grabbing whatever I could, just to keep going – whether that was shop-bought sandwiches laden with mayonnaise, or biscuits and cakes from the staff room.

There was no doubt that I was overweight and my eating was out of control. I couldn't stop myself – or, at least, it felt like that.

I tried calorie-counting, but I was just so hungry all the time. And miserable. I'd have my tea by 4pm and would spend the rest of the night at home in Leeds, hungry and desperate for more food.

When I married my husband, Dave, in 2012, I was up to dress size 24. I'd managed to lose a few stone for the big day. I wasn't as big when I first met Dave, who works front-of-house at Harrogate Theatre, but he always said he didn't care about my weight.

But, when I fell pregnant with Eve in 2015, I was so dangerously overweight that the midwives had to monitor me throughout the pregnancy. I must have weighed more than 23st. Every time I was weighed, I begged them not to tell me the result.

I spent what should have been a happy, exciting time feeling frightened that my body wouldn't actually be able to cope.

Luckily, everything was fine and Eve was born, weighing a perfect 8lb, in November 2015.

Looking down at my new daughter, I knew I would do anything for her. This precious little bundle, so innocent and helpless, was reliant on me for everything.

But, even as I cuddled Eve for the first time – a magical moment I'll never forget – one thought kept creeping back into my mind like a black cloud... "How can I be a good mum to my daughter when I'm unhealthy and unfit?" If there's one thing
I've learned'
'If I can lose weight,
ANYONE can!
Do it today... don't live with those feelings of shame for a minute longer.'

But it was just a few weeks before Christmas and I had a newborn baby. I pushed that thought away and got stuck into the festive chocolate, the mince pies... and, well, everything I could get my hands on.

It was in the New Year, in January 2016, that I had what I call my light-bulb moment.

I'd been playing with Eve on the floor and I'd struggled to get up. If I was getting out of breath just trying to heave myself up off the floor, how was I ever going to cope with an energetic toddler?

Then the tears came. When I'd first held her, I'd promised to give her the best life possible. To be the best mum possible.

Who was I kidding? I was dangerously overweight – I could hardly play with her. And who knows what the more serious health implications were?

I decided, there and then, that I had to do something about my situation.

Michelle doted

on her baby girl

but hated being

If I was prepared to die for my daughter, I had to be prepared to lose some weight for her.

I found a local Slimming World group. Everyone says walking through the door for the first time is the hardest part, and it is. I felt ashamed of myself – I felt sure I'd be the biggest person there.

But I needn't have worried. Everyone was so warm and friendly. Nobody was judgemental. They were all there for the same reason.

The support helped, and the advice. No more takeaways and junk food. I started cooking from scratch and, to my surprise, I enjoyed it.

The weight started to drop away. I lost more than 6lb that first week. And I can honestly say I never looked back. I was a woman on a mission.

I was pleased with my progress, but I didn't feel really proud of myself until I had lost 5st. I started to

enjoy clothes shopping again and got a buzz from all the compliments.

I'd never felt better, and my energy levels shot up. As Eve learned to walk and run, I was able to keep up with her.

In December 2017, I reached my target weight of 11st 5lb. I've lost 11st 5lb – half my original body weight. It felt surreal. I'd really done it!

Now, I wear a size 12. At 37, I feel like I've got my life back. To celebrate, a friend arranged for me to have a photoshoot – in the vintage style I love.

I would never have agreed to something like that before. I'd have worried the clothes wouldn't fit me, and I hated having my picture taken. But my new, slim self loved it!



I've even become a parttime Slimming World consultant, and I love helping other people get to their ideal target weight.

My husband is thrilled
– but I always say he loved
me before, during and after.

By far the best thing is losing the guilt and shame I'd felt because I knew I was letting Eve down. Now, I feel I can finally be the mum I want to be.

Warm chicken and white bean salad

This summery salad is loaded with delicious things, and the chicken and beans will keep you feeling satisfied long after the last mouthful.

Serves 4 PREP: 35 mins

4 boneless chicken breasts, thawed if frozen, skinned and cut into small chunks 1 red onion, cut into wedges 1tsp fresh rosemary, chopped

1 garlic clove, crushed Low-calorie cooking spray 250g cherry tomatoes,

Small bag of salad leaves 1/2 cucumber, halved lengthways, deseeded and sliced

400g can white beans, such as cannellini, drained and rinsed

1tbsp balsamic vinegar, to serve

1 Preheat the oven to 200°C/180°C fan/gas 6. Put the chicken in a bowl with the onion wedges, rosemary, garlic and some seasoning, and spray generously with low-calorie cooking spray. Toss well, spread out in a small roasting tin and roast for 20-25 mins, or until the chicken is cooked and the onion is tender.

2 Meanwhile, put the cherry tomatoes into another roasting tin, spray with low-calorie cooking spray and season lightly.

Roast on the shelf under the chicken for the last 10 mins of the cooking time.

3 Remove both tins from the oven and leave to rest for 5 mins. Divide the salad leaves between plates or shallow bowls and scatter over the cucumber and beans.

4 Arrange the roasted chicken, onion wedges and tomatoes on top and drizzle with the balsamic vinegar to serve.



Jerk chicken legs with rice and peas

Bring some Caribbean sunshine to your table with this fab roast.

Serves 4 PREP: 45 mins, plus marinating

2tbsp dark soy sauce 1tbsp tomato purée 3cm piece fresh root ginger, peeled, grated 1tbsp Schwartz Jamaican **Jerk Seasoning** 4tbsp lime juice 4 frozen chicken legs, thawed and skinned Low-calorie cooking spray 1 onion, finely chopped 2 garlic cloves, crushed 1/2tsp dried chilli flakes 250g dried long-grain rice 200ml chicken stock 1/2tsp dried thyme 1/4tsp ground cinnamon 400g can kidney beans, drained

FOR THE SALSA

1 red pepper, diced 100g pineapple, diced 1 red onion, chopped 1 cucumber, diced 2tbsp fresh coriander, chopped

1 Mix soy sauce, purée, ginger, jerk seasoning and 2tbsp lime juice in a bowl. Slash each chicken leg with a knife, add to the marinade and coat well. Set aside for 1 hr. Preheat the oven to 200°C/180°C fan/ gas 6. Line a roasting tin with foil and spray with low-calorie cooking spray. Put the legs in the tin and roast for 30 mins, until cooked. 2 Meanwhile, spray a

pan with low-calorie cooking spray and place over a low heat. Add onion, garlic, chilli and 2tbsp water, cover and cook for 5 mins. Uncover and stir in rice. stock, thyme, cinnamon, beans, 300ml boiling water and 1/2tsp salt. 3 Bring to the boil over a high heat then stir, cover and reduce the heat to low. Cook for 15 mins, turn off heat and leave to steam for 5 mins.

4 Mix the salsa ingredients and remaining lime juice in a bowl. Uncover the rice and fluff up the grains with a fork. Serve with chicken and salsa.



Barbecue-style meatloaf

Enjoy the flavours of a good barbecue all vear round with this meaty feast!

Serves 6 PREP: 1 hr 15 mins

250g lean beef mince (5 per cent fat or less) 500g lean pork mince (5 per cent fat or less) 400g can green lentils in water, drained and rinsed 1 onion, finely chopped 2tbsp barbecue seasoning **2tbsp Worcestershire** sauce 1/2tsp dried thyme 1/2tbsp garlic granules 2tsp onion granules 6tbsp tomato purée 2 medium eggs*, beaten 2 garlic cloves, crushed 500g passata



1tsp smoked paprika Dash of Tabasco sauce 1/2tsp celery salt (optional) 3tbsp red wine vinegar 2 level tsp sweetener aranules

1 Preheat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas 4 and line a 23cm x 12cm loaf tin with non-stick baking paper. In a large bowl,

gently mix together the beef, pork, lentils, onion, barbecue seasoning, Worcestershire sauce, thyme, half of the garlic granules, half of the onion granules and half of the tomato purée. Stir in the eggs, taking care not to overmix them.

2 Spoon the meat mixture into the loaf tin, making

sure you push it right down into the corners, and lightly level the surface. Place the tin on the middle shelf of the oven and bake for 1 hr, or until cooked through. Meanwhile, make the sauce. Put all the remaining ingredients into a saucepan, partcover and simmer over a medium-low heat for 20 mins, stirring now and then, until reduced and thickened nicely. Season, cover and keep hot.

3 Remove the meatloaf from the oven, cool slightly then turn out and spread a few tbsp of the tomato sauce over the top. Slice thickly and serve hot with the remaining tomato sauce and your choice of vegetables.

Egg and potato hash

Potatoes are a great way to fill up when you're cooking on a budget, and serving them with eggs and a spicy tomato sauce makes this Spanish-style dish a real treat.

Serves 4 READY: 1 hr

1kg floury potatoes,
peeled and cut into
small chunks
Low-calorie cooking spray
½tsp dried oregano
3 roasted red peppers
in brine from a jar, cut
into thin strips
8 large eggs*
Fresh chives, chopped

FOR THE SAUCE

2 garlic cloves, crushed 500g passata 3tbsp tomato purée
1tsp smoked paprika

½tsp celery salt
1tsp onion granules
1tsp garlic granules
3tbsp red or white
wine vinegar
2 level tsp sweetener
granules
Vegetables, to serve

1 Drop the potatoes into a large saucepan of boiling water over a high heat, bring back to the boil and simmer for 7 mins or until almost tender. Drain well. Meanwhile, put all the tomato sauce ingredients in a saucepan and simmer over a medium-low heat for 20 mins or until reduced and thickened to a good sauce consistency, stirring now and then. Season, cover and keep hot over a low heat. 2 Spray a large, lidded non-stick frying pan with low-calorie cooking spray. Add the potatoes and crush them lightly with a potato masher so that they just about burst open. Season, spray with more low-calorie cooking spray and place over a

high heat.

Fry for 10 mins or until crisp and golden brown, turning every 2-3 mins. Sprinkle the oregano over the potatoes, add the red pepper strips and fry for 3-4 mins or until heated through.



BEST'S CELEB INSIDER TALKS TO LEO SAYER

eo Sayer is one of the most successful singers of his time, with hits including You Make Me Feel Like Dancing. He turned 70 last month, and is still making music. He's topped the charts and faced financial ruin over a colourful 45-year career, but says he wouldn't change a thing.

You have never stopped working since the 70s, have you?

It feels that way. I've just turned 70 and I think doing what I know best keeps me young. I always imagined this latter part of my life would be the best of times, and it is.

Do you ever think about retiring?

No. Not for one moment. I think once you take on that mindset, you just give up and grow old. I am still learning how best to live my life and I'm not finished yet. I want to keep giving – I think there's a bit of destiny about it.

You have written songs for so many artists, including Cliff Richard. Do you still enjoy the writing process?

I love it. I have two new albums ready to go. I write and produce them all myself. I have so many loyal fans, particularly in the UK. I'm also writing my memoirs at the moment, which is keeping me busy and making me remember all the things that happened in my life. It's also about putting the record straight.

How supportive were your parents when you told them you wanted to be a singer?

At first, my dad wasn't really very happy about it. He wanted me to do something sensible with my life – and





being a pop singer wasn't very sensible. My parents were religious, so my childhood was kind of restricted. The house was always full of nuns and priests. Dad wanted me to be a graphic artist, which is what I trained as initially.

How old were you when you first realised you wanted to sing?


When I was six, one of the priests at church picked me out to sing in the choir, and he taught me how to sing properly. But I was a very ambitious child. I didn't go straight into singing because

my parents stopped me. In the end, I ran away from home and started a career designing record covers for artists like Bob Marley. But I knew I could sing, so I joined a band and then got my own record deal. I had my first hit in 1973.

You suffered from dyslexia as a child, didn't you?

I did, yes. I couldn't tie my shoe laces until I was 21. I still have a problem knowing my left from my right – but you know what? Having dyslexia helped me to develop creatively.

How do you look back on the 70s?

It was an amazing period. I had a very pushy manager in Adam Faith. The first thing he did was sell one of my songs to Roger Daltrey of The Who. I always knew I had talent, but I needed to learn from people like Roger Daltrey and Paul McCartney. Rod Stewart became a friend, as did Elton John.

Later, you found success in the US – did that completely transform your life?

Yes. When my song When

I Need You went to No.1 in 1977, I was suddenly thrown into this huge arena – it was like my own little version of Beatlemania. But I think I was a bit naive back then. I didn't really understand what was going on. Then, the same year, You Make Me Feel Like Dancing, was No.1.

This time round it feels like we're watching a young team playing good football and crossing everything for how far they can go.



TRAVEL SNAPSHOT

With its sandstone buildings. colourful fishing boats, baroque architecture, picture-postcard villages and bustling harbours, it's little wonder that Malta is visited by over two million tourists a year. Though everything here is done at a leisurely pace, you can enjoy many of Malta's highlights in one weekend. The capital, Valletta, is unmissable, and it's European Capital of Culture 2018 so at its best right now. A must-see is the dazzlingly baroque St John's Co-Cathedral, which houses work by Italian master Caravaggio, as is the impressive new City Gate created by Italian architect Renzo Piano. Visit the 'Silent City' of Mdina, or simply grab a table in a pretty square and people watch to your heart's content.

INSIDER'S GUIDE

For a whistle-stop tour of the Three Cities – the ancient fortified cities of Birgu, Senglea and Cospicua – jump in an electric car (rolling-geeks.com), complete with GPS and narration. Enjoy getting lost, and lapping up everything from the yachts at Grand Harbour Marina to the famous Malta Film Studios. If you fancy a harbour cruise, check out Luzzu Cruises (luzzucruises.com) – it's a more relaxed experience than other tours on offer. And, if you fancy soaking up some nightlife, the area of St Julian is where the party's at.





Sit back and watch the world go by in Republic Square

DON'T MISS

If it's unique experiences you're after (and you aren't scared of heights), you need to try Dinner In The Sky (dinnerintheskymalta.com) a restaurant that straps in up to 22 diners and elevates them some 40m up into the sky. Offering panoramic views over the Maltese rooftops as the sun slowly sets, this is pretty special.

As an island, it's no surprise that Malta does seafood very well. If you're feeling adventurous, roll vour sleeves up and make vour own lunch at the Mediterranean Culinary Academy (mcamalta.com), where vou'll learn how to cook fab local dishes. After dinner, enjoy a delicious shot of limuncell - a Maltese version of the Italian limoncello. Cheers!



For Game Of Thrones fans wanting to relive some of the show's iconic scenes, Malta should be their destination of choice. Six different locations on the island have been used for HBO's smash-hit fantasy series – including Valletta's Fort Ricasoli, which doubled as the Red Keep. The Azure Window on Malta's sister island, Gozo, can be seen in the scene where Emilia Clarke's Daenerys married her Dothraki husband, Khal Drogo. Sadly, the Azure Window collapsed into the sea last year.
