Spring is on its way and although there is still a chill in the air, the sun is now making an appearance.

or some of us that means hitting the shops for an addition to our wardrobe for the new season, however, for others it means the challenge of creating a new sweater, cardigan, shawl or dress to meet the seasons fashion trends and styles. Wearing a light T-shirt and sandals may be a bit premature, however with a bit of thought (and some knitting!) you can introduce some key pieces to your wardrobe that won't break the bank, max out your credit card or leave you shivering at work if temperatures plummet.

Trends in knitwear seem to be in two opposing camps this season - in one camp you have the designers who are looking to the future and bringing us very futuristic designs whilst the other camp looks back to the ancient past. This shift between designers brings us a really lovely mix of delicate pastels, lacy loveliness, big and bold stripes alongside rustic textures and handcrafted crochet.

Rowan - right up there on the leader board with these trends is showcasing yarns to knit or crochet into whispy garments that take their inspiration from ancient landscapes and rock formations. According to their website www.knitrowan.com, their linen yarns are made from $100 \%$ natural linen, that has a soft sheen and a relaxed drape, so they are a dream to work with.


Linen yarns are a good choice for spring and summer knitted garments, as are silk yarns or silk/linen mixtures. ‘Rowan’s ‘Silkystones’ yarn produces a very pretty silken sheen when knitted up.

## Crochet

In the forefront (and still looking at the ancient and the past) is the return to traditional crafts such as Irish crochet making. According to Wikipedia: "Irish lace has always been an important part of the Irish needlework tradition. When times were hard, women had to find ways of supporting their family. This was particularly true during and after the great potato famine of the 1840s. During that time period, most women could do needlework, so it was only a short step to lace making. Irish Crochet and Tatting travelled particularly well as equipment needed was simple, a ball of cotton and a shuttle for Tatting and simple crochet hook and cotton for Irish Crochet lace"

This form of crochet is a joy to look at and is reasonably easy to learn. Check out www.irishcrochetlab.com for some inspiration and instructions.

## Knitwear Essentials - Patterns

Often a mainstay of design - stripes are again popular along with fine knits in flower designs, contrasting edgings and colour blocking. Also in the frame (and in the futuristic style) are irregular dying, space-dye optics and hand-knitted optics. Meshes and dropped stitches (l know I can do that one!), checks and zigzags flaunt the catwalks. The crochet look, which doesn't ever seem to go out of fashion remains a mainstay of the fashion scene has been given an uplift with 3-d high relief and textured look with bright embroidered details, again a futuristic look.

## Yarns

The yarns to work with this season come in an array of textures and colours
including yarns where the surface reflects light or shows off a superfine transparency. Coarse yarns too are in the mix along with lustrous chainette and cord yarns, narrow ribbon and metallic yarns. Sequined yarns are also still around (although this may be waning) interspersed with mercerised cotton, silk and other cotton mixtures.

## Colours

Bright colours, shaded rainbow colours and intense pastels rule the roost and are put to good use in brightly coloured tunics showcasing trapezoid and asymmetric shapes. Some of the colours to work with this season promoted by Pantone include: -

Knitted handbags and totes are so quick to make and can use up some of your odd bits and bobs that seem to lurk in the corners of your yarn stash. Patterns can be very simple for the beginner or of course, for the more experienced knitter an intricate design can be undertaken.

Handles can be bought in haberdashery/craft shops or online and are not expensive. There are a plethora of knitted bag patterns around from the vintage styles with wood, plastic or metal clasps, to the up-market 'Hermes' style bag. You can knit a tote, handbag, drawstring, boho or shoulder bag. The choice is yours and knitting bags is addictive!

## TENSION

22 sts by 31 rows over st st on
4.00 mm needles to 10 cm

## WORKING PATTERN

COLOUR BLOCK CARDIGANS
ROUND AND V NECK

## BACK

Using 3.25 mm needles and $M$, cast on 71 (77, 83, 89, 93, 99, 107, 117)
sts.
Row 1: RS - K1, *P1, K1; rept from * to end.
Row 2: P1, *K1, P1; rept from * to end.
Rept the last 2 rows 7 (8, 8, 8, 9, 9, $10,10)$ times more, then 1 st row again.
Next Row: inc row - Rib 3 (5, 2, 6,
$3,6,2,7)$, *inc in next st, rib $6(5,5$, $4,4,4,5,5)$; rept from * to last 5 ( 6 , $3,8,5,8,3,8)$ sts, inc in next st, rib to end. 81 (89, 97, 105, 111, 117, $125,135)$ sts.
Change to 4.00 mm needles and work in st st, starting with a K row until back measures 16.5 (19, 21.5, 24, $25.5,27.5,29,31) \mathrm{cm}$.
Change to $C$ and cont in st st until back measures 24 (27, 29, 31, 33, $35,37,39) \mathrm{cm}$, or required length to armhole, ending with a $P$ row.

## Shape Raglan Armholes

* Cast off $2(4,4,4,4,4,4,5)$ sts at beg of next 2 rows. Work 2 rows straight.
Row 5: K1, sl 1, K1, psso, knit to last 3 sts, K2tog, K1.
Row 6: Purl *.
Rept the last 4 rows $2(3,3,3,2,3$, $3,3)$ times more. 71 ( $73,81,89$, $97,101,109,117$ ) sts remain, then repeat the last 2 rows only until 27 $(29,31,33,33,35,37,39)$ sts remain ending with a purl row.
Next Row: K1, sl 1, K2tog, psso, knit to last 4 sts, K3tog, K1.
Purl 1 row.
Cast off remaining 23 (25, 27, 29, 29, 31, 33, 35) sts for V-Neck Cardigan, slip sts onto a holder for Round Neck Cardigan.


## SLEEVES (BOTH ALIKE)

Using 3.25 mm needles and $M$ cast on 41 (43, 45, 47, 49, 53, 57, 61) sts and work 17 (19, 19, 19, 21, 21, 23, 23) rows in rib as for Back.

Next Row: inc row - Rib 2 (3, 1, 2, 1, $3,5,2)$, *inc in next st, rib $6(6,5,5$, $4,4,4,4)$; repeat from * to last 4 ( 5 , $2,3,3,5,7,4)$ sts, inc in next st, rib
to end. 47 (49, 53, 55, 59, 63, 67, 73) sts.

Change to 4.00 mm needles and C , and work 4 rows in st st, starting with a K row. Inc 1 st at each end of next and every following 6th (6th, 6th, 6th, 6th, 6th, 5th, 5th) row until there are 69 ( $75,81,87,93,99,107$, 115) sts. Work straight until sleeve measures 31 ( $35,38,42,44,46$, $47,48) \mathrm{cm}$ or required length, ending with a purl row.

## Shape Raglan Top

Work as given for Back from * to *. Repeat the last 4 rows $1(2,2,3$, 2, 3, 3, 4) times more, 61 (61, 67, $71,79,83,91,95)$ sts remain, then rept the last 2 rows only until 11 (11, $11,13,13,15,17,19)$ sts remain, ending with a purl row. Cast off for V-Neck Cardigan, slip sts onto a holder for Round Neck Cardigan.

## V-NECK LEFT FRONT

Using 3.25 mm needles and $M$, cast on 41 (43, 49, 51, 53, 57, 61, 65) sts and work 4 rows in rib as for Back.

## HIS FRONT ONLY

Next Row: buttonhole - Rib to last 6 (6, 7, 7, 7, 8, 8, 8) sts, cast off next 2 sts, rib to end.
Next row: Rib to end casting on 2 sts over buttonhole.

## HIS AND HER FRONT

Continue in rib until 17 (19, 19, 19, $21,21,23,23$ ) rows have been worked in all, thus ending with a RS row.
Next Row: Rib 8 (8, 10, 10, 10, 12, $12,12)$, slip these sts onto a safety pin, rib $2(2,4,2,1,4,4,3)$, *inc in
next st, rib $6(4,5,4,4,3,4,4)$; rept from * to last $3(3,5,4,2,5,5,5)$ sts, inc in next st, rib to end. 38 (42, $45,49,52,55,58,63)$ sts **.
*** Change to 4.00 mm needles and work in st st, starting knit, until front measures same as back to colour change.
Change to $C$ and cont until front measures same as back to start of armhole shaping ending at side edge.

## Shape Raglan Armhole and Front Neck

Cast off 2 (4, 4, 4, 4, 4, 4, 5) sts at beg of next row. Work 3 rows straight (work 1 row less here for Right Front). Next Row: K1, sl 1, K1, psso, knit to last 3 sts, K2tog, K1.
Dec 1 st at front edge as before on every following 6th row, at the same time dec 1 st at raglan edge as before on every following 4th row 2 (3, 3, 3, $2,3,3,3$ ) times, then every alt row until $16(11,26,26,32,32,43,43)$ sts remain.
Now dec 1 st at front edge on every following 8th row, at the same time dec 1 st at raglan edge on every alt row until $6(6,6,6,7,7,8,8)$ sts remain. Keeping front edge straight continue to dec 1 st at raglan edge on every alt row until 3 sts remain. Dec 1 st at neck edge only on following alt row. Cast off.

## V-NECK RIGHT FRONT

Using 3.25 mm needles and $M$ cast on $41(43,49,51,53,57,61,65)$ sts and work 4 rows in rib as for Back.

## HER FRONT ONLY

Next Row: buttonhole - Rib 4 (4, 5, $5,5,6,6,6)$, cast off next 2 sts, rib to end.
Next Row: Rib to end casting on 2 sts over buttonhole.

## HIS AND HER FRONT

Continue in rib until 17 (19, 19, 19, $21,21,23,23$ ) rows have been worked in all, thus ending with a RS row.
Next Row: Rib 2 (2, 4, 3, 1, 4, 4, 4), *inc in next st, rib 6 (4, 5, 4, 4, 3, 4, 4); rept from * to last 11 (11, $15,13,12,17,17,16)$ sts, inc in



## Family Cardigan continued.

next st, rib $2(2,4,2,1,4,4,3)$, turn and slip remaining $8(8,10,10,10$, $12,12,12)$ sts onto a safety pin. 38 (42, 45, 49, 52, 55, 58, 63) sts ${ }^{* * * *}$. Complete as given for Left Front from *** to end working 1 row less where indicated.

## ROUND NECK LEFT FRONT

Work as given for V-Neck Left Front to ${ }^{* *}$. Change to 4.00 mm needles and work in st st, starting knit, until front measures same as back to start of raglan shaping, ending with a purl row and noting colour change.

## Shape Raglan Armhole

Cast off $2(4,4,4,4,4,4,5)$ sts at beg of next row.
Work 3 rows straight.
Next Row: K1, sl 1, K1, psso, knit to end.
Dec 1 st at raglan edge as before on every following 4th row 2 (3, 3, 3, 2, $3,3,3)$ times more, then every alt row until 16 (17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 24) sts remain ending at front edge.

## Shape Neck

Row 1: P3 (4, 3, 4, 4, 4, 4, 4), slip these sts onto a safety pin, purl to end.
Continue raglan decreases as before, at the same time dec 1 st at neck edge on next $3(3,3,3,3,5,5,5)$ rows, then following $2(2,3,3,3,2$,

2, 3) alt rows. 4 (4, 4, 4, 5, 5, 6, 6) sts remain. Keeping neck edge straight continue to dec 1 st at raglan edge until 3 sts remain. Dec 1 st at neck edge only on following alt row. Cast off.

## ROUND NECK RIGHT FRONT

Work as given for V-Neck Right Front to ${ }^{* * * *}$. Change to 4 mm needles and work in st st, starting knit, until front measures same as back to start of raglan shaping ending with a knit row and noting colour change.

## Shape Raglan Armhole

Cast off $2(4,4,4,4,4,4,5)$ sts at beg of next row.
Work 2 rows straight.
Next Row: Knit to last 3 sts, K2tog, K1.
Dec 1 st at raglan edge as before on every following 4th row $2(3,3,3,2$, $3,3,3)$ times more, then every alt row until 16 (17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 24) sts remain ending at front edge.

## Shape Neck

Row 1: K3 (4, 3, 4, 4, $4,4,4$ ), slip these sts onto a safety pin, knit to last 3 sts, K2tog, K1.
Complete as given for Left Front.

## FINISHING AND BANDS

V-Neck Cardigan only
Join raglan seams.

## BUTTON BAND

Using 3.25 mm needles and $M$, cast on 1 st and with right side of left front facing or WS of right front facing, rib across sts on safety pin. 9 (9, 11, 11, $11,13,13,13)$ sts. Continue in rib until band, when slightly stretched, fits up front, across sleeve top and round to centre back neck. Cast off in rib. Sew band in place stretching evenly and mark positions for $4(4,5,5,5$, $5,6,6)$ buttons, the first to match existing buttonhole in front welt and the top one to be 1 cm , below start of neck shaping. Space remainder evenly between.
Buttonhole Band: Work as given for Button Band, at the same time making buttonholes to match markers on right side rows as before. Sew buttonhole
band in place and join at centre back. Join side and sleeve seams by top sewing. Sew on buttons.

## MAKING UP

## Round Neck Cardigan only

Button Band: Using 3.25 mm needles and M, cast on 1 st and with RS of left front facing or wrong side of right front facing, rib across sts on safety pin for front band. 9 (9, 11, 11, 11, $13,13,13)$ sts. Continue in rib until band, when slightly stretched, fits up front to start of neck shaping ending with a wrong side row for left front band or right side row for right front band. Slip sts onto a safety pin.
Sew band in place stretching evenly and mark positions for 6 ( $6,7,7,7$, $7,8,8)$ buttons, the first to match existing buttonhole in front welt and allowing for a 7th (7th, 8th, 8th, 8th, 8th, 9th, 9th) to be 1 cm , above sts on safety pin. Space remainder evenly between.
Buttonhole Band: Work as given for Button Band, at the same time making buttonholes to match markers on right side rows as before.
Join raglan seams by top sewing.
Neckband: Slip sts of right front band and right front neck onto a $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needle. With right side facing rejoin yarn and pick up and K10 (10, 12, $12,14,14,16,18)$ sts up right front slope, knit across sts at right sleeve top, back neck and left sleeve top, pick up and K10 (10, 12, 12, 14, 14, $16,18)$ sts down left front slope, knit across sts at left front neck and rib across sts of left front band. 89 (93, $101,109,113,123,133,143)$ sts. Work 7 ( $7,7,8,8,8,9,9$ ) rows in rib as for Back starting with the 2nd row, at the same time making buttonhole as before on 4th and 5th of these rows. Cast off in rib. Sew buttonhole band in place. Join side and sleeve seams by top sewing. Sew on buttons.
See Ball band for washing and care instructions.

## Shape Top

Cast off $3(4,4,5,5)$ sts at

## MAKING UP

Do not press. Tie a coloured thread $12(13,14,16,17) \mathrm{cm}$ down from cast-off edges on back and fronts to mark armholes. Placing centre of sleeve to shoulder seam, sew in sleeves evenly between coloured threads. Join side and sleeve seams. Lap right front over left front for 3 cm and attach a large press stud to secure or fasten with an embellished kilt pin.

Cut the loops then trim the pompom to give it a nice dense shape. When you've finished one, weave the plait through the holes in the bootee top and then repeat the pompom procedure for the other end.

Still keeping patt correct cast off 6 (6, $7,7)$ sts at beg of next 2 rows and 4 $(4,2,2)$ sts at beg of foll 2 rows.
Next Row: K3, K2tog, K to last 5 sts, sl 1, K1, psso, K3.
Next Row: K3, patt to last 3 sts, K3. Rept the last 2 rows to 26 (28, 32, 34) sts.

Cast off.

## LEFT FRONT

Using 2.50 mm needles cast on 45 $(45,51,51)$ sts and work 5 rows in garter st. Change to 3.25 mm needles and patt keeping centre 7 sts in garter st for front band throughout. Keeping patt correct dec 1 st at end of the 9 $(9,11,11)$ th row then every foll 8 (8, $10,10)$ th row to $39(39,45,45)$ sts.
Work straight to same length as Back to armhole shaping, ending at side edge.

## Shape raglan

Keeping patt correct cast off 6 (6, $7,7)$ sts at beg of next row and 6 $(3,4,1)$ sts at beg of next alt row. Work 1 row.
Next Row: K3, patt 2tog, patt to last 7 sts, K7.
Next Row: K7, patt to last 3 sts, K3.

* Rept the last 2 rows to 20 (22, 24, 26) sts ending at front edge.


## Shape neck

Place the 7 garter sts for front band a holder, patt to end. Continue raglan dec as set but at the same time dec 1 st at neck edge on every row to 7 (7, 6,7 ) sts. Dec at raglan edge only to 2 sts, K2tog and fasten off.

## RIGHT FRONT

Using 2.50 mm needles cast on 45 $(45,51,51)$ sts and work 5 rows in garter st. Change to 3.25 mm needles and patt keeping centre 7 sts in garter st throughout dec 1 st at beg of the 9 $(9,11,11)$ th then every foll $8(8,10$, $10)$ th row to $39(39,45,45)$ sts but at the same time make 6 buttonholes in garter st band on right side rows,

one approximately $7.5(9,9,9) \mathrm{cm}$, from lower edge, the last one at top of neckband the others spaced evenly between.
Buttonhole Row: K2, cast off 2 sts, K2, patt to end.
Next Row: Patt to last 7 sts, K3, cast on 2, K2.Work straight to same length as Back to armhole shaping ending at side edge.

Using 2.50 mm needles cast on 44 $(44,50,50)$ sts and work 6 rows in garter st. Change to 3.25 mm needles and patt working extra sts into patt inc 1 st at each end of the next and every foll right side row to 50 (50, 56, 56) sts.
Work straight until sleeve measures 4 $(4,5,5) \mathrm{cm}$, ending on a WS row.

## Shape raglan top

Keeping patt correct cast off 6 (6, 7, 7) sts at beg of next 2 rows.

2nd, 3rd and 4th sizes only Work 2 rows patt.

Repeat the last 4 rows twice more. 36 sts

## All sizes

Now work the 2 dec rows as given for back raglan shaping to 8 sts. Cast off.

## NECKBAND

Join raglan seams by top sewing. Using 2.50 mm needles and with right side of work facing pick up and K12 $(14,14,16)$ sts round right front neck (do not work sts on holder) 6 sts across right sleeve top, 24 (26, 30,
32) sts across back neck, 6 sts across left sleeve top and $12(14,14,16)$ sts round left front neck. 60 (66, 70, 76) sts. K6 rows. Cast off.

Rejoin yarn to sts on holder of left front and cont in garter st until band

Sweater and Button Through Tunic continued.
reaches top of neckband. Cast off. Work buttonhole band in same way but making last buttonhole near top of band. Cast off. Neatly join bands to neckband.

## SWEATERBACK

Using 2.50 mm needles cast on 74 ( $80,86,92$ ) sts and work 3 cm , K 1 , P1, rib. Change to 3.25 mm needles and patt as for Tunic. Work to $15(16.5,18,19) \mathrm{cm}$ from beg ending on a WS row. Now work raglan shaping as for Back of Tunic.

## FRONT

Work as Back to $40(44,48,52)$ sts ending on a WS row.

## Shape neck

Next Row: K3, K2tog, K9 (11, 12, 14) turn; leave remainingarter sts on a holder. Cont dec at raglan edge as before but at the same time dec 1 st at neck edge on every row to 6 sts. Now
dec at raglan edge only to 2 sts, K2tog and fasten off. Rejoin yarn to sts on holder
Next Row: Cast off the next 12 (12, $14,14)$ sts, patt to last 5 sts, sl $1, K 1$, psso, K3. Rejoin yarn to remaining neck edge and work to match other side.

## SLEEVES (BOTH ALIKE)

Using 2.50 mm needles cast on 38 $(38,44,44)$ sts and work the garter st edging as given for Sleeves of Tunic. Change to 3.25 mm needles and patt. Working extra sts into patt inc 1 st at each end of the $9(9,11,11)$ th then every foll $8(8,10,10)$ th row to $50(50,56,56)$ sts. Work straight until sleeve measures 15 (18, 20.5, 23) cm from beg ending on a WS row.

## Shape raglan top

Work as sleeve raglan of Tunic

## NECKBAND

Join raglan seams by top sewing leaving open one front raglan seam for approx
2.5 cm at top. Using 2.50 mm needles and with RS of work facing pick up and K7 sts from right sleeve top, 22 (24, $28,30)$ sts across back neck and 7 sts across left sleeve top. $36(38,42,44)$ sts. K 6 rows in garter st. Cast off. Using 2.50 mm needles and right side of work facing pick up and K34 (38, 40, 44) sts round front neck.
Work same edging as for back neck.

## MAKING UP

Pin out all pieces to measurement given. Press as instructions given on ball band.
Tunic: Join side and sleeve seams by top sewing. Sew on Buttons.

Round 2: Join B, 5 ch (counts as 1 tr and 2 ch ), miss st at base of 5 ch , * 1 tr into next tr, 2 ch, repeat from * to end, ss to 3rd of 5 ch at beg of round. Break off B.
Round 3: Join C, ss into first ch sp, 3 ch (counts as first tr), *(2 tr into next ch sp$) 3$ times, 1 tr into next ch sp,

10 ch $^{* *}, 1$ tr into next ch sp, rept from *to end, ending last rept at ${ }^{* *}$, ss to top of 3 ch at beg of round. Fasten off.

Motif forms a square shape. In each corner there is a 10 ch loop and along each side there are 8 trs. Join motifs whilst working round 3 by replacing corner ' 10 ch ' with ' 5 ch , ss to adjacent corner loop, 5 ch', and central pair of ' 2 tr' with ' 1 tr , ss between central trs along side of adjacent motif, 1 tr'.

Using $C$ and 2.00 mm hook, make 140(148, 156, 164, 172,180) ch.

Row 2: 4 ch (does NOT count as st), miss (dtr at end of previous row, 1 tr and 1 ch ), * 1 tr into next tr, 1 ch , miss 1 ch, repeat from * to last 3 sts, 1 tr into next tr, miss $1 \mathrm{ch}, 1 \mathrm{dtr}$ into next tr, turn. 117(125, 133, 137, 145,153 ) sts.
Repeat last row 5(6, 7, 7, 8, 9) times more. 97(101, 105, 109, 113, 117) sts.
Cont straight until armholes measure $10(10,11,11,12,12) \mathrm{cm}$.

## Shape neck

Row 3: 4 ch (counts as 1 tr and 1 ch), miss (tr at end of previous row and 1 ch ), * 1 tr into next tr, 1 ch , miss 1 ch, rept from * to last 3 sts, 1 tr into next tr, miss $1 \mathrm{ch}, 1 \mathrm{dtr}$ into last tr, turn. 25(25, 27, 27, 29, 31) sts.
Repeat last 2 rows 3 times more. 19(19, 21, 21, 23, 25) sts.

Turn work and cast on an extra 40 sts. Knit 1 row.
Change to main colour.
Row 1: knit to last st, w\&t.

Row 3: knit to 1 st before previous wrapped st, w\&t.
Repeat row 3 until all sts have been wrapped.

## SEGMENT 3

With RS facing you, change to contrast colour (main colour can be left
attached as it will be used again soon) and knit to end of row.
Turn work and cast on an extra 30 sts. Knit 1 row.
Change to main colour.
Row 1: knit to last st, w\&t.
Row 2: knit to last st, w\&t.
Row 3: knit to 1 st before previous wrapped st, w\&t
Repeat row 3 until all sts have been wrapped.

## SEGMENT 4

With RS facing you, change to contrast colour (main colour can be left attached as it will be used again soon) and knit to end of row.
Turn work and cast on an extra 20 sts. Knit 1 row.
Change to main colour.
Row 1: knit to last st, w\&t.
Row 2: knit to last st, w\&t.
Row 3: knit to 1 st before previous wrapped st, w\&t.
Repeat row 3 until all sts have been wrapped.

## SEGMENT 5

With RS facing you, change to contrast colour (main colour can be left attached as it will be used again soon) and knit to end of row.
Turn work and cast on an extra 10 sts. Knit 1 row.
Change to main colour.
Row 1: knit to last st, w\&t.
Row 2: knit to last st, w\&t.
Row 3: knit to 1 st before previous wrapped st, w\&t.


Repeat row 3 until all sts have been wrapped.
Cut main colour yarn and tie off.

## EDGING

Transfer remaining sts from segment 5 into right needle so that now all stitches are in a long row. With RS facing you, use contrasting colour yarn to knit whole row, placing markers between each of the two stitches of the contrasting colour yarn. You should have 5 markers placed by the end of the row.
Row 1: knit to 1 st before marker, kf\&b, sm, kf\&b, (repeat for each marker) knit to 10 sts before end of row, w\&t
Row 2: knit to 10 sts before previous wrapped st, w\&t.
Row 3: knit to 1 st before marker, kf\&b, sm, kf\&b, (repeat for each
marker) knit to 10 sts before previous wrapped st, w\&t.
Repeat rows 2 and 3 four times. On the last row, instead of w\&t, continue knitting to the end of the row. Cast off loosely by using the stretchy bind off method as follows -

* k2togtbl, slip stitch back to left needle*. Repeat from * to * to end.
Design note: Using a 5.50mm needle to cast off will give you a nice, loose edge.


## MAKING UP

Use tapestry needle to sew in all ends. Block shawl strongly, pulling points of edging out. (See picture)

## Knitch

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Row 3: K10, *K2tog, yfwd, K1, yfwd, sl1, K1, psso, K1; repeat from * to last 9 sts, K9.
Row 5: K9, K2tog, yfwd, *K3, yfwd, sl1, K2tog, psso, yfwd; repeat from * to last 14 sts, K3, yfwd, sl1, K1, psso, K9.
Row 7: K11, *yfwd, sl1, K2tog, psso, yfwd, K3; repeat from * to last 8 sts, K8.
Row 9: As 1st row.
Row 11: K9, *yfwd, sl1, K1, psso, K4; repeat from * to last 10 sts, yfwd, sl1, K1, psso, K8.
Row 13: K10, *yfwd, sl1, K1, psso, K1, K2tog, yfwd, K1; repeat from * to last 9 sts, K9.
Row 15: As 7th row.
Row 17: As 5th row.
Row 19: As 11th row.
Row 20: K8, P to last 8 sts, K8. ** These 20 rows form patt, rept these 20 rows 4 times more.

## COMMENCE NECK BORDER

Row 1: K8, (K4, yfwd, sl1, K1, psso) $4(5,6,7)$ times, $\operatorname{K60}(60,66,66)$,
(K4, yfwd, sl1, K1, psso) $4(5,6,7)$ times, K11.
Row 2: K8, P27 (33, 39, 45), K57
(57, 63, 63), P27 (33, 39, 45), K8.
Row 3: K10 (K2tog, yfwd, K1, yfwd, sl1, K1, psso, K1) $4(5,6,7)$ times, K60 (60, 66, 66), (K2tog, yfwd, K1, yfwd, sl1, K1, psso, K1) $4(5,6,7)$ times, K9.
Row 4: K8, P27 (33, 39, 45), K57
(57, 63, 63), P27 (33, 39, 45), K8. Cast off.

## FRONTS (BOTH ALIKE)

Using 3.25 mm needles, cast on 43(49, 55, 61) sts.
Work as given for back from ** to**. These 20 rows form patt, rept these 20 rows 12 times more. Cast off.

## MAKING UP

Sew cast off edges of back and fronts together at shoulders using top sewing
Sew side seams 5 cm , up from cast on edge of back.

When making a stitch after this slipped stitch, make sure you pull enough yarn through, so that your work stays flat, and does not pull.
To remember which side of your work is the right side, pin a small safety pin on it as a reminder.
You may wish to use two balls of yarn at a time, to prevent any particular colour appearing in a block.

Next Row: WS - SI 1, K to end. Rep last 2 rows until 5 sts remain.
Next Row: RS - SI 1, K2 tog twice.
Next Row: WS - SI 1, K 2.
Next Row: RS - SI 1, K2 tog, psso. Fasten off.


## RIGHT FRONT

Cast on 3 sts.
Row 1: SI 1, M1, K to end of row.
Rep this row until you have 68 (74 80 86) sts. Mark next row as RS row.

Next Row: RS - SI 1, K2 tog, K to last st, M1, K1.
Next Row: WS - SI 1, K to end.
Rep these 2 rows until long side (end of WS row) measures 15 (18 20 20) cm . Make first buttonhole.

## MAKE BUTTONHOLE

Next Row: RS - SI 1, K2 tog, K2, cast off 2 sts, K to last st, M1, K1.3/4 Next Row: WS - SI 1, K across to buttonhole, turn, cast on 2 sts over the 2 sts cast off on previous row, turn, K to end.

## Shape Armhole

Working a buttonhole every 8 cm twice more.
Next Row: RS - SI 1, K2 tog, K to last 3 sts, K2 tog, K1.

## SLEEVES

Cast on 37 (39 41 43) sts.
Row 1: RS - SI 1, K to end.
Rep this row throughout, increasing 1 st at beg and end of the 5th row, and then every following 6th row, until there are 73 (73 8181 ) sts. Continue without shaping until work
measures 43 (43 46 46) cm or desired length to underarm.
Cast off 8 sts at beg of next 2 rows: 57 (57 65 65) sts.
Dec 1 st at beg and end of every RS row 8 times: 41 (41 49 49) sts.
Work 1 row.
Dec 1 st at each end of next 6 rows: 29 (29 37 37) sts.
Cast off remaining sts.

## MAKING UP

Sew centre back seam. Sew shoulder seams. Sew side seams. Sew sleeve seams. Matching underarm seams, and centre of sleeve top to shoulder seam, sew in sleeves. Sew on three buttons to left front, and one each to folded back lapels.

Work as given for Back from** to **. Repeat last 4 rows twice more, then 1 st and 2 nd rows again.

Change to 4 mm needles and work 1st to 8th rows of border pattern as given for Back.
Now work in twist rib pattern as given for Back, shaping sides by inc 1 st at each end of 5th and every foll 4th row until there are 102 (116, 116,108, 108, 118, 118) sts, taking inc sts into patt. $81,97,102,107$ and 112 cm . Inc 1 st at each end of every foll 6th row from previous inc until there are 110 (120, 120, 124, 124) sts, taking inc sts into patt.

## All Sizes:

Work straight until sleeve measures $45(46,46,47,47,48,48) \mathrm{cm}$ from beg, ending with a WS row.

## Shape Top

Keeping patt correct, cast off 3 sts, at beg of next 10 rows, then 4 sts at beg of foll 10 rows.
Cast off rem 40 (46, 46, 50, 50, 54, 54) sts.

## NECK BORDER

*** Join right shoulder seam by top sewing.

Cast off evenly in patt.

Join left shoulder seam and Neck Border by top sewing. Sew sleeve tops in place to armhole shaping. Join side and sleeve seams by top sewing.

Next Row: WS - P2, P2tog, P to end.
Next Row: K to last 4 sts, K2tog, K2. Repeat last 2 rows ( $0,1,2,2$ ) times more. 3 sts.

Next Row: P1, P2tog.

## All Sizes

Next Row: K2tog and fasten off.

## SLEEVES (BOTH ALIKE)

Using 4.00 mm needles, cast on 66 (66, 70, 70, 74, 74) sts.
Work 4 rows in rib as given for Front. Cont in 2 row patt as given for Front. Keeping patt correct continue in patt shaping sides by inc 1 st at each end of next and every following 3rd row until there are 82 (86, 86, 90, 90, 94) sts.

Continue without further shaping until Sleeve measures 17 cm , from cast on edge, finishing on a WS row.

## Shape Raglan

Cast off 3 sts at beg of next 2rows 76 (80, 80, 84, 84, 88) sts.
Next Row: RS - K2, sl 1, K1, psso, patt to last 4 sts, K2tog, K2.
Next Row: P2, patt to last 2 sts, P2. Repeat last 2 rows 30 (31, 32, 33, 34, 35) times more.
Leave remaining $14(16,14,16,14$, 16) sts on a holder.

## BACK (WORKED IN 2 HALVES AND JOINED AT NECK)

 RIGHT BACK${ }^{* *}$ Using 4.00 mm needles, cast on 52 (56, 60, 62, 64, 68) sts.

Row 1: RS - *yon, K2tog tbl, repeat from * to last 6 sts, rib 6.
Row 2: Rib 6, *yon, P2tog, repeat from * to end.

Next Row: Patt to last 4 sts, P2tog tbl, P2.
Repeat the last 2 rows ( $0,1,2,3,4$ ) times more. $(26,28,28,28,30)$ sts.

## All Sizes

Leave remaining $24(26,28,28,28$, 30) sts on a holder.

## LEFT BACK

Work as instructions given for Right Back from ** to **.
Row 1: RS - Rib 6 *yon, K2tog tbl, repeat from * to end.
Row 2: *yon, P2tog, repeat from * to last 6 sts, rib 6.
Cont as instructions given for Right Back noting the bracketed exception.

## MAKING UP

Join both front and right back raglan seams by top sewing. Overlap 12 centre sts of right back over 12 centre sts of left back and tack in place.

## NECK BORDER

With right side facing using 4.00 mm needles, $K$ across 14 (16, 14, 16, 14, 16) sts on left sleeve st holder, pick up and K20 $(21,21,22,22,23)$ sts down left side of neck, $K$ across 16 $(14,18,16,20,18)$ sts from front neck st holder, pick up and K20 (21, $21,22,22,23$ ) sts up right side of neck, K across 14 (16, 14, 16, 14, 16) sts on right sleeve st holder, then K across 36 (40, 44, 44, 44, 48) sts on back st holder going through both stitches of centre 12 sts which are over lapped together. 120 (128, 132, 136, 136, 144) sts.
Work 4 rows in K1, P1 rib. Cast off in rib. Join left back raglan. Join side and sleeve seams by top sewing.

Next Row: knit across both sections, including cast on sts.
Next Row: purl.
Continue working in pattern, creating a yo, $k 2$ tog in the centre of each rs row until work measures 20 cm from neck edge, ending with a WS row.
Next Row: knit, decreasing 1 st at
each end of next and every 6th row until 50 sts remain.
Continue working straight until right sleeve measures 59 cm from neck edge, ending with a RS row.
Next Row: knit.
Next Row: as for row 5. Knit 2 more rows, then cast off loosely.

FRONT AND BACK (WORK TWO THE SAME).
Cast on 100 sts. Knit 4 rows. Continue in stocking stitch until work measures 44 cm .

Round 3: SI st along 3ch of next 7 ch sp , 3ch, 6tr in base of 3ch (beg cluster made), * 7 tr in 4 th ch of 7 ch sp (cluster made), rep from * to end, join with a sl st to top of beg 3ch.
Round 4: SI st across next 3 sts (3 sts rem in beg cluster), 7ch (counts as 1 tr and 3ch), 1tr in same place as 7ch (corner made), * 3ch, tr2tog in the 6th st of same cluster and 2nd st of next cluster, 3ch, miss next st, 1 dc in next st, 3ch, miss next st, tr2tog in the next st and 2 nd st of next cluster, 3ch, miss next st, (1tr, 3ch, 1tr) in next st (corner made), rep from * until 4 corners have been made, join with a sl st to 4th of beg 7ch.
Round 5: SI st to first 3ch sp, 1ch, (3dc, 1ch, 3dc) in same sp (corner), * 3dc in each 3ch sp to next corner, (3dc, 1ch, 3dc) in corner, rep from *
to end, join with a sl st to dc at beg of round.
Round 6: 1 ch, * (1dc, $1 \mathrm{ch}, 1 \mathrm{dc}$ ) in corner sp, 1 dc in each st, rep from * to end; join with a sl st to beg dc. Joining squares together to form strips Place 2 squares on top of each other WS against WS, and crochet them tog as follows: Work 1 dc in ch-space in the corner on 1st square, ch 3, 1 dc in ch-space in the corner on 2nd square, * ch 3, skip 2 dc on 1 st square, 1 dc in next dc on 1st square, ch 3 , skip 2 dc on 2 nd square, 1 dc in next dc on 2 nd square ${ }^{*}$, repeat from *-*, finish with ch 3,1 dc in ch-space in the corner on 1st square, ch 3, 1 dc in ch-space in the corner on 2nd square. Finish off. Continue joining squares in this manner until 8 squares form a strip, x 6 ( $6 \times 8$ square strips)

## JOINING STRIPS TOGETHER

Place 2 strips on top of each other WS against WS, and crochet them tog as you crochet your squares together

MAKING UP EDGING
Round 1: join into any cnr square dc *dc into each stitch down side of throw, 3 dc in cnr dc repeat from * to end, join with sl st ro beg dc
Round 2: ch5 (counts as 1 tr, ch 2), tr in same $\mathrm{sp},+^{*}$ in next dc, v-st ${ }^{*}$, miss next 2 dc, repeat * to * join with a sl st into 3rd ch of first ch 5.
Round 3: ch3 (counts as 1st tr) 2tr, ch2, 3tr, ch 2, 3tr in same space (corner made) *miss next v st, in next v st 3 tr, ch2, 3tr,* repeat until next cnr sp (3tr, 2ch, 3tr, 2ch, 3tr) next cnr made, repeat from + to + around rest of throw. Join with a sl st into top of first tr.
Weave in ends and block lightly if needed

Cast off $2(3,4,6,8)$ sts at beg of next 2 rows. $68(68,78,82,88)$ sts. Dec one st at each end of next row, then in every foll alt row until 62 (56, $70,70,76)$ sts rem, then in every row until $28(30,32,36,38)$ sts rem.
Cast off $4(4,4,5,5)$ sts at beg of next 2 rows.
Cast off rem $20(22,24,26,28)$ sts.

twice, K1, (K2tog) twice, yon, K1, yon, rep from * to last st, K1.
Row 14: Purl
Row 15: Knit.
Row 16: Knit.
Row 17: *(K1, yno) twice, (ssk)
twice, K1, (K2tog) twice, yon, K1, yon, rep from * to last st, K1.
Row 18: Purl.
Row 19: Knit.
Row 20: Knit.
Row 21: Knit.
Row 22: Knit.


Row 23: *K1, P1, rep from * to last st, K1.
Row 24: *P1, K1, rep from * to last st, K1.
Last 2 rows form rib pattern, rep these
2 rows 10 times more. Cast off loosely.

Sew seams using top sewing. Start

## NEEDLES AND TOOLS

- 5.50 mm knitting needles
- 5.00 mm circular knitting needles 60 cm long
- 5.50 mm circular knitting needles 60 cm long
- 1 stitch-holder
- Wool sewing needle


## MEASUREMENTS

Size: S, M, L
To fit bust: 75-80, 85-90, 95-100cm
Finished fit: 192, 204, 216
Garment length: 68, $70,72 \mathrm{~cm}$
Sleeve length: 80, 82, 84cm

## TENSION

16.5 sts by 22 rows over stocking st, on 5.50 mm needles to 10 cm .

## WORKING PATTERN <br> BACK

Using 5.50 mm needles, cast on 81 ( 87,93 ) sts.
Purl 1 row - WS
Working in stocking st (beg with a knit row), inc one st at each end of next row, then in every foll alt row until there are $101(107,113)$ sts.
Tie a coloured thread at each end of last row.
Work 17 rows. **

## Beg Shaping

Next Row: K2, K2tog, knit to last 4 sts, sl 1, K1, psso, K2. 99 (105, 111) sts.

Dec one st (as before) at each end of every foll 4th row $1(1,2)$ times, then in every foll alt row until $31(33,35)$ sts rem.
Work 1 row.
Cast off.

FRONT
Work as for Back to **.

## Beg Shaping

Next Row: K2, K2tog, knit to last 4 sts, sl 1, K1, psso, K2. $99(105,111)$ sts.
Dec one st (as before) at each end of every foll alt row until $39(41,41)$ sts rem.
Work 1 row.

## Shape Neck

Next Row: K2, K2tog, K8, turn. Cont on these 11 sts for left side of neck.
Next Row: Cast off 3 sts, purl to end.
Next Row: (K2, K2tog) twice. 6 sts.
Next Row: Cast off 2 sts, purl to end.
Next Row: K1, K3tog. 2 sts.
Next Row: P2.
Next Row: K2tog. Fasten off.
Slip next $15(17,17)$ sts onto stitchholder and leave for polo collar.
With right side facing, join yarn to rem sts, knit to last 4 sts, sl 1, K1, psso, K2. Cont on these 11 sts for right side of neck.
Next Row: Purl to last 2 sts, P2tog.
Next Row: Cast off 3 sts, K3 incl st rem on right-hand needle after casting off, sl 1, K1, psso, K2. 6 sts.
Next Row: P4, P2tog.
Next Row: Cast off 2 sts one st rem on right-hand needle, sl 1, K1, psso. 2 sts.
Next Row: P2.
Next Row: K2tog. Fasten off.

## LEFT SLEEVE

Using 5.50 mm needles, cast on 46 $(50,54)$ sts.
Row 1: K2, * P2, K2, rep from * to end.
Row 2: P2, * K2, P2, rep from * to end.
Last 2 rows form rib.
Cont in rib until cuff measures 22 cm from beg, ending with a 2 nd row.
Work 8 rows stocking st, beg with a knit row.
Tie a coloured thread at each end of last
row to indicate end of sleeve seam.
Cont in stocking st until Sleeve measures 16 cm from coloured threads, ending with a knit row.
Tie a 2nd coloured thread at each end of last row.
Work 17 rows.

## Beg Shaping

Next Row: K2, K2tog, knit to last 4 sts, sl 1, K1, psso, K2. $44(48,52)$

## sts.

Dec one st (as before) at each end of every foll 6th row until $36(36,30)$
sts rem, then in every foll 8th row until
$26(28,28)$ sts rem. ${ }^{* * *}$
Work 2 rows.

## Shape Top

Next Row: (wrong side) Cast off 8 $(9,9)$ sts, purl to end.
Next Row: Knit to last 2 sts, K2tog.
Rep last 2 rows once.
Work 1 row.
Cast off rem 8 sts.

## RIGHT SLEEVE

Work as for Left Sleeve to ${ }^{* * *}$.
Work 3 rows.

## Shape Top

Next Row: (right side) Cast off 8 (9, 9) sts, knit to end.

Next Row: Purl to last 2 sts, P2tog. Rep last 2 rows once.
Cast off rem 8 sts.

## BACK LOWER BAND

With RS facing, using 5.50 mm circular knitting needle and beg at coloured thread, knit up $124(128,132)$ sts evenly around lower edge of Back to other coloured thread.
Row 1: WS - P3, * K2, P2, rep from * to last st, P1.
Row 2: K3, * P2, K2, rep from * to last st, K1.
Rep last 2 rows 4 times ( 10 rows in all).

Row 11: WS - P3, * inc knitways in next st, K1, P2, rep from * to last st, P1. 154 $(159,164)$ sts.
Row 12: K3, * P3, K2, rep from * to last st, K1.
Row 13: P3, * K3, P2, rep from * to last st, P1.
Rep last 2 rows until band measures 16 cm from beg, working last row on WS.
Cast off very loosely in rib.

## FRONT LOWER BAND

Work as for Back Lower Band, working around lower edge of Front.

## POLO COLLAR

Join sleeve seams to first coloured thread. Placing bottom corner of lower band to end of sleeve seam and matching other sleeve threads to threads on Back and Front, sew in sleeves, noting that tops of sleeves form part of neckline. With right side facing and using 5.00 mm circular needle, beg at left back raglan seam, knit up $25(27,30)$ sts evenly across top of left sleeve, knit up 8 sts evenly along left side of front neck, knit across sts from front stitch-holder, knit up 8 sts evenly along right side of front neck, knit up $25(27,30)$ sts evenly across top of right sleeve, then knit up $31(33,35)$ sts evenly across back neck. 112 (120, 128) sts.

Round 1: * K2, P2, rep from * to end. Rep last round until polo collar measures 10 cm from beg.
Change to 5.50 mm circular needle and cont in rib until polo collar measures 27 cm from beg.
Cast off very loosely in rib.

## MAKING UP

Do not press. Fold Polo Collar to right side, as pictured.

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## GLOSSARY

## BEGINNER'S TOOL KIT

## PINS

Plastic-head pins are useful
for checking
tension and
blocking out
items. Pins with coloured heads are best because they do not get lost in your work.

## ROW COUNTER

A row counter is helpful for keeping track of rows worked, particularly where increases, decreases or other kinds of patterning occur.


## KNITTING IN ELASTIC

Elastic yarn prevents sagging in cuffs, collars and waists. You can work it in with knitting yarn on knitted or crocheted garments.

## TAPE MEASURE

A basic tape measure is essential for checking your garment measurements.


## STITCH GAUGE

A stitch gauge is a flat piece of metal or plastic with a ruler marked on one side and/or a window
cut out in the centre. It allows you to mark and measure easily and accurately.

## KNITTING BAG

A knitting bag is essential for those who like to knit 'on the go'. Not only is it a practical way to keep all your knitting paraphenalia together, it also helps keep the yarn clean and tangle-free.


## CIRCULAR KNITTING NEEDLES

Circular needles have two working ends joined by a thin nylon wire. They are more balanced than straight needles and allow the weight of your work to rest in your lap.

## KNITTER'S NEEDLES

Knitter's needles need to have a large eye and a blunt point so they do not split stitches when sewing up your knitting


## STITCH HOLDER

A stitch holder is used to secure stitches not in use. You can also use safety pins for holding a small number of stitches.

|  | CASTING ON |  |

|  | Casting on is creating a row of loops on a knitting needle to form the base row for your knitting. One of the most popular methods of casting on is the cable cast on. Form a slipknot about 25 cm away from the end of the yarn. <br> Place the slipknot on a knitting needle and pull gently to secure. Hold this needle in your left hand. Insert the right-hand needle through the slip knot. Pass the yarn over the point of the right-hand needle (see Diagram 1). | Pull a loop through the slip knot with the right-hand needle (see Diagram 2). Place this loop on the lefthand needle and gently pull the yarn to secure the stitch. For the remaining cast-on stitches, insert the right-hand needle between the slip knot and the first stitch on the left-hand needle. Wind the yarn around the point of the right-hand needle. Draw a loop through and place this loop on the left-hand needle. Continue in this manner until you have cast on the desired number of stitches. |



## PURL STITCH



The purl stitch is basically the reverse of the knit stitch. Hold the needle with the stitches on in your left hand, with the loose yarn at the front of your work. Insert the right-hand needle from right to left into the front of the first stitch on the lefthand needle (see Diagram 1). Wind the yarn from right to left over the point of the righthand needle (see Diagram 2). Draw the yarn through the

stitch to form a new stitch on the right-hand needle. Slip the original stitch off the left-hand needle, keeping the new stitch on the right-hand needle. To purl a row, repeat these steps until all the stitches have been transferred from the left-hand needle to the righthand needle. Turn your work, transferring the needle with the stitches on into your left hand to work the next row.

## CASTING OFF

## KNITWISE

Knit two stitches. Use the point of the left-hand needle to lift the first stitch on the right-hand needle over the second, and drop if off the needle. Knit the next stitch on the left-hand needle so that there are two stitches on the right-hand needle
 again, and repeat. Continue in this manner until all the stitches have been worked off the left-hand needle and only one stitch remains on the right-hand needle. Cut the yarn, leaving a tail and thread the yarn through the loop and pull it firmly to fasten off.

## PURLWISE

Purl two stitches. Use the point of the left-hand needle to lift the first stitch on the right-hand needle over the second, and drop it off the needle. Purl the next stitch on the left-hand needle so that there are two stitches
 on the right-hand needle again, and repeat. Continue in this manner until all the stitches have been worked off the left-hand needle and only one stitch remains on the right-hand needle. Secure this last stitch as described in casting off knitwise.

## SUBSTITUTING YARNS

If you substitute or spin a yarn for a project, you can compare the weight of the yarn to the project yarn by comparing wraps per inch. Wrap your yarn around a ruler for one inch and count the number of wraps. If you have more wraps per inch than the project yarn, your yarn is too thin; if you have fewer wraps per inch than the project yarn, your yarn is too thick.


## PROVISIONAL CAST ON (INVISIBLE CAST ON)

Place a loose slipknot on the needle in your right hand. Hold the waste yarn next to the slipknot and around your left thumb. Hold your working yarn over your left index finger.
*Bring the needle forward under the waste yarn, over the working yarn, grab a loop of working yarn (Diagram
1), then bring the needle to the front, over both yarns, and grab a second loop (Diagram 2). Repeat from * until you have the desired number of stitches on your needle. When you're ready to work in the opposite direction, pick out the waste yarn to expose the live stitches.

## KNITTING TENSION

Checking your knitting tension, that is, the tightness or looseness of your knitting, is important. To check your tension, cast on 30 stitches using the recommended needle size. Work in the pattern until your work measures 10 cm from the cast on edge then cast off. You now have a "swatch". Measure your tension by placing a ruler over your swatch and counting the number of stitches
across and rows down (including fractions of stitches and rows) in 10 cm . Repeat these measurements two to three times on a different parts of the swatch to check your measurements. If you have more stitches and rows than called for in the instructions, you should use larger needles; if you have fewer, use smaller needles. Check your tension again before starting your project.

## BACKSTITCH

This is the stitch most commonly used for joining knitted garments. With the right sides of your work together, pin the knitted fabric together with the edges even. The seam should be sewn one full stitch from the end of the row. One stitch should be worked over every row. Thread the yarn needle. Insert the needle through both layers and sew two stitches to the left then one stitch back to the right. Keep stitches at an even distance. Continue working from right to left in this circular motion. (Diagram 1)

## TASSELS

Cut yarn twice the length of your desired tassel plus a bit extra for the knot. According to the desired thickness of the tassel, select a number of lengths of yarn. Fold the lengths of yarn in half over a crochet hook. On the wrong side, insert the crochet hook from the front to the back through the edge of the work. Grab the yarn and pull through and tighten. Trim the ends to the same length.

## KNOTTED FRINGE

After working a tassel, take one half of the strands from each tassel and knot them with half the strands from the neighbouring tassel. Trim.



Make a slip knot on your hook.
Pass the yarn over the hook and catch it with the hook and draw it through the loop on the hook. Repeat, drawing yarn through the last loop formed.
DOUBLE CROCHET
(DC) (US SINGLE
CROCHET SC)


Insert the hook through the top two loops of a stitch. Pass the yarn over the hook and draw up a loop so that you have two loops on the hook (Diagram 1).
Pass the yarn over the hook and draw through both loops on the hook (Diagram 2). Continue in the same way, inserting the hook into each stitch (Diagram 3).

## TREBLE CROCHET

 (TR) (US DOUBLE CROCHET DC)

Pass the yarn over the hook. Insert the hook through the top two loops of a stitch (Diagram 1). Pass the yarn over the hook and draw up a loop so that you have three loops on the hook (Diagram 2). Pass the yarn over the hook and draw it through the first two loops on the hook, pass the yarn over the hook and draw through the remaining two loops. Continue in the same way, inserting the hook into each stitch (Diagram 3).


HALF TREBLE CROCHET (HTR) (US HALF DOUBLE CROCHET HDC)


Pass the yarn over the hook. Insert the hook through the top two loops of a stitch (Diagram 1). Pass the yarn over the hook and draw up a loop so that there are three loops on the hook (Diagram 2). Draw through all three loops on the hook (Diagram 3).

## SLIP STITCH CROCHET (SLST)

Insert your hook into the stitch. Yarn over the hook and draw the loop through the stitch and loop onto the hook.

## I-CORD

With double-pointed needles, cast on the desired number of stitches. *Without turning the needle, slide the stitches to the other end of the needle, pull the yarn around the back and knit the stitches as usual. Repeat from * until your work measures the desired length


## PICKING UP DROPPED STITCHES

A dropped stitch can be picked up using a crochet hook and don't be put off by stitches that have unraveled several rows down into the work. To pick up knit stitches, insert the crochet hook into the dropped stitch, draw through the bar lying above the dropped stitch and pull it through the loop of the dropped stitch.
